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POISON GAS NOW BEING USED FOR PURIFYING WATER

British Scientists Have Found Way to Use Chlorine Produce to the Greatest Advantage in Safeguarding Lives.

MANY LIVES ARE SAVED Water Borne Disease Practically Banished From the Western Front by Medical Corps.

London.—Chlorine gas, which the Germans brought into the field of battle as a means of poisoning their opponents, is now largely used for purifying the water supply of the British army.

The effort to secure pure water for the British armies in the field makes one of the fine stories of the war. It has saved very many thousands of lives by practically banishing water-borne disease from our principal front.

Chloride of lime was at first the standby for water purification. It is efficacious, but water chlorinated with it is not very nice. Now chlorine gas has taken its place at big water supply points.

Food is as carefully looked after by the British Royal Army Medical Corps as water. Food has to be not only pure but appetizing and scientific.

BOSTON TAXI FARES ARE CUT WITH DODGE BROTHERS CAB CARS

Cabs of New Line Especially Built on Standard Chassis; Rate Reduction Averages Thirty-seven Per Cent. Boston has now joined hands with Chicago, New York and Pittsburgh in the matter of cheaper taxi fares. The mediums whereby this move has been accomplished were a consolidation of the city's two large taxi companies and a fleet of 50 new taxicabs, with especially built bodies mounted on Dodge Brothers chassis. Taxi rates have been soaring in Boston, in common with everything from soap to sole leather. But travelers to Boston may now ride from the railroad station to their hotels for a quarter instead of the usual 40 cents, and an extra passenger only costs a dime more. At that, the passengers ride the meters themselves, for these are mounted in plain view in the passenger compartments of the new cabs. First delivery of 19 of the new cabs was made about the first of December by the Henshaw Motor Company, Boston representatives for Dodge Brothers cabs, and they were immediately put into service by Town Taxi, Inc., a consolidation of the Rockett and Franklin companies. By this time all the cabs have been put into service. They are distinguished as finely built, upholstered and appointed, and by their green paint, with orange stripes. In Chicago and several other cities, taxi service has made use of Dodge Brothers cars for the last several years.

Lost "Stubby" White May Be in Gd. Rapids

Mother Has Received a Telegram From Grand Rapids as it is Gone There to See Child Mrs. Lester White, of Rapid River, left yesterday morning for Grand Rapids in answer to a telegram stating that a boy calling himself "Stubby" had been located there and that the lad might be her son, who mysteriously disappeared from home about two and a half years ago. The history of the disappearance is well known that almost everybody is familiar with the strange case. "Stubby" as he was familiarly called, left the home of his parents one day and efforts of hundreds of searchers to locate the boy or his body failed. The mother steadfastly refused to believe her son was dead and recently offered a reward of \$500 that would lead to some clue as to the boy's whereabouts. Numerous papers throughout the state helped the cause along by printing the offer and the Grand Rapids telegram came in response. Details are lacking, but the boy says that his parents did not want him any longer and another family gave him a home. He says his name was "Stubby" as long as he could remember and that he had been living in many places. Mrs. White will arrive in Grand Rapids today and it is hoped the boy is hers.

FORD TRACTOR WILL BE MARKETED MAY 1

Production Manager Says the Canadian Contract Has Been Filled; Making Fifty Daily. The Ford tractor will be put on the American market May 1. This announcement was made by Ernest Kanzler, production manager of Henry Ford & Son, in an address at the Michigan Agricultural college. Mr. Kanzler said that the English contract has been filled and that the Canadian contract would be completed by May 1, after which the tractor would make its appearance on the United States market. The tractors are being manufactured at the rate of 80 a day, according to Mr. Kanzler. He spoke on "The Ford tractor—what it will do," in connection with the celebration of "farmers' week" at M. A. C. L. K. Edwards, the local dealer, will be one of the first to receive the new tractors in the upper peninsula.

WAR DEPARTMENT ADOPTS FAIR SEX FOR POLICE WORK

Are Going to Use Women as Police to Take Care of Girls Who Live Near Military Camps. FIFTY-SIX ARE APPOINTED Many Girls Flock to Camps, Thinking They Can Secure Work; These Will Be Sent Home.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) Washington, March 9.—The War Department has established a woman police force. With more than a million and a half men already in khaki, and millions more awaiting the call to the colors, the department has turned to the so-called weaker sex for assistance in disposing of a vital war-time problem. Thousands of young women have gone to the vicinity of the military camps. To see that these girls are protected from dangers, the department's commission on Training Camp Activities has appointed fifty-five women deputy sheriffs to do scouting and patrol work. In all parts of the country the women are on duty under the supervision of especially established Girls' Protective Bureaus. Girls actually residents in the vicinity of the camps are protected. Runaways are restored to their parents, and amusement places are scrutinized carefully. The work offers an opportunity for the officer to exercise discretion, sympathy, and a knowledge of human nature that particularly are her own. These women are trained sociological workers and so peculiarly equipped for efficiency service. Their duties are intensely personal in character and are concerned chiefly with individuals. Although co-operating closely with the military authorities and local police, they wear no uniform, badge of distinguishing mark of any kind. "Often," says Miss Maude Miner, chairman of the Committee on Protective Work for Girls, "the women protective officers find girls in the vicinity of the camps who are attracted by the presence of the uniform. Some of these are girls who have answered advertisements and who arrive in camp cities with insufficient funds; others are runaways from their homes in nearby cities and country towns. A girl resident of the town, who is disposed to resist discipline, is taken to her home by the woman officer and her mother warned of her danger. The officers also visit nearby amusement places to discover young girls who seem to need protection and to see that local ordinances are obeyed."

SUPPLIES FOR R. G. ARE NOW ASSURED

Secretary J. E. Byrns Wires That He Has Bought Large Quantity—Trying to Get More. T. M. Judson has received a telegram from J. E. Byrns who is in Chicago purchasing supplies for the local Red Cross to the effect that he has been successful in getting quite a large quantity of goods, but he is not satisfied yet and will not return until he can get the promise from some Chicago wholesaler that future shipments will be made as their is a demand for materials. Delta County chapter is using far more material and doing more work than any other chapter in this state outside of the very larger cities. It takes great quantities of gauze and yarn to keep the workers supplied and Secretary Byrns has already bought up about all there was to be had within the limits of a hundred mile area. NOTICE. Denver, Colo.—John Pershfield, Jr., aged one day, saved Private John Pershfield, Sr., of Company G, One Hundred and Fifty-seventh infantry, from being court-martialed on a charge of desertion from Uncle Sam's forces. Private Pershfield secured a furlough from Camp Kearney, Linda Vista, Cal., where his company is training, to visit his home in Denver. When he failed to return to camp at the expiration of the leave, Col. Patrick Hamrock, commanding officer, wired Denver authorities to arrest Pershfield as a "deserter from the army." The charge was changed to "absent without leave" when local authorities notified Hamrock that Pershfield, Jr., failed to arrive as soon as expected, so the soldier-daddy overstayed his leave waiting for Mr. Stork to put in an appearance.
