L-Shaped Garage. Directly behind the display window age proper, an enormous L-shaped cement-floored room 100x30 feet. In the small angle of the "L" is the oil room with two stationary oil tanks and three portable tanks. The large room will be used to run cars in and

for storage over night and for cars that are finished in the repair shop. The repair shop is parallel to the garage proper, being separated from it by sliding doors. In this section of the building, with a floor space of 90x20 feet 10 cars can be accommodated at a time and a feature is the overhead track upon which motors can be run to the cars. NON-USEFULLINES OF **WORK IT IS EXPECTE** WILL SWELL US ARM

Amendment to Selective Service Regulations by Provost Marshal General Is Most Drastic.

BOARDS HAVE BIG POWER

Gamblers, Bartenders, Waiters and Others Will Be Given Opportunity to Get New Jobs or Fight.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) Washington, May 23.-Every man of draft age must work or fight after July 1, according to a drastic amendment to the selective service regulations, announced today by Provost Marshal General Enoch Crowder.

Idlers and men engaged in what are held to be "non-useful" occupations are to be hailed before local boards and given the choice of a new job or the army. Heading the list are gamblers, race-

track men, fortune tellers, waiters.

bartenders, ushers in theatres, cer-

tain employes of clubs, hotels and stores, domestics and clerks. Deferred classification on the ground of dependents will be dismissed in applying the rule. If a man falls within the regulations of Class II or Class IV and refuses to take useful employment he will be put into Class I and will be indicted forthwith

into the military service. Local boards are authorized to use their discretion on cases which would result in disproportionate hardship in cases of dependents.

that some such plan had been submitted to President Wilson, but it was not known how far-reaching this plan The war department and the labor bureau believes the amendment will go a long way toward solving the la-

and munition workers. It will not mean a conscription of labor. The announcement today gives notice that all non-useful occupations will be extended from time to time,

Short Flashes From All Over the World Bolled Down for Busy

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)

Cairo-The prosperity of Egypt is reflected in the figures produced in the annual Budget reports. The balance of trade for the last three and a half years represents an addition of \$250,000,000 to Egypt's capital resources.

"This prosperous situation," says the report, "is shown on every side. Mortgage companies find their loans paid in advance, and demands for new loans have markedly slackened, enabling these companies to invest large sums in Allied War Loans. Cotton generally are able to carry their hold-

"Apart from the larger cash balances at the bank, it is clear that bank notes are now taking the place of gold for purposes of hoarding. As the increased note issue is now represented by British Treasury Bills, an increase in the hoarded notes repre sents a corresponding increase in the resources which Egypt is placing at the disposal of the Allies."

GREAT BIRDS OF OTHER DAYS

Bones Discovered Prove That In the Miccene Period They Were Truly of Enormous Size.

In so far as birds are concerned? some of the oldest fossils, in the matter of time (Miocene), which have fallen into the hands of science, are those representing the great, flightless, fossil avian giants of Patagonia in South America. They belong to the phororhacidae, R. W. Shufeldt writes in the Scientific American.

Judging from such parts of their fossil bones as have been found, they were evidently great terrestrial birds the fact that he had completed the others; and in the case of one of them (brontornis) it had a thigh bone considerably larger and longer than that

Of all the remarkable flightless birds of this group, however, was the giant phororhacos. It must have been over eight feet in height, with a skull bigger than that of a full grown horse, and much deeper from above downward. We know little or nothing of these birds or what led to their extinction. With its great hooked beak and powerful claws of great size, phororhacos must have been a terror to the animals upon which it preyed. Skulls and some other bones of this bird have been discovered.

STILL IN HOSPITAL.


