Otto Neurohr was 23 years old and enlisted in the navy at Great Lakes and left here June 3rd. He remained at the Great Lakes but a short time until he was sent to the east.

FUEL EDICT SAVES LOTS OF GASOLINE FOR UNITED STATES

Figures Compiled in Lansing Show There is Also Less Pleasure Riding During the Week Now.

Cadillac, Michigan, Sept. 10.—The "gasless" Sunday edict may not be

popular with motorists of Michigan but reports from all parts of the state compiled here show that it is being generally obeyed through patriotic impulse. It is indicated, too, that the request of the national government that gasoline be conserved is having an effect not only on Sunday but on week days, for there is less pleasure riding than normally on other days than Sundays. Although late in the season, it is noted that the summer and watering

results have been rather hard hit by the edict.

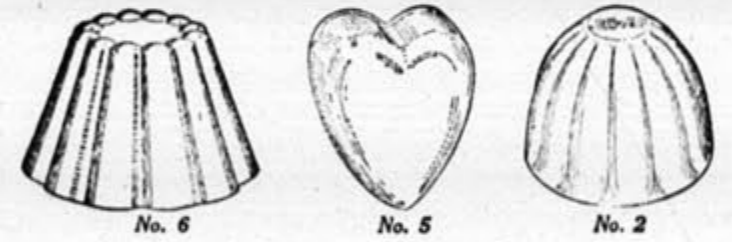
