CAMBRAI AND LAON BOTH ENDANGERED

BRITISH CAPTURE OVER 4,000 PRISONERS IN A DRIVE NEAR ST. QUENTIN

Pursuit of Germans Fleeing From Lens Region Brings British to the Important Railway East of Great Coal City.

COUNTER ATTACK FAILS

German Attempt to Recover Lost Ground Between Cambrai and St. Quentin Meets With Reverse and Heavy Loss to Foe.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)

London, Oct. 4.—British pursuit of the retreating Germans in the Lens area has reached the railway east of Lens, Field Marshal Haig's statement today says. To the southeast the British have made progress between Oppy and Mericourt.

More than 4,000 prisoners were taken yesterday by the British north of St. Quentin. The point of the British wedge in the region north of St. Quentin had been pushed at the end of yesterday's fighting to the high ground a mile northeast of Sequahart. The British in holding this ground repulsed vicious counter attacks.

German forces last night delivered a strong counter blow near Guoy and Le Catelet, midway between Cambrai and St. Quentin. The French in the St. Quentin region have scored another advance east of Lesdins, says today's war office report.

American and French troops in Champagne have made further advances northwest of Blanc mont and Medah farm. North and northwest of Rheims the French have increased their gains and improved their positions in the region of Bethany.

Concerning British activity on the Italian mountain front the war office today issued a statement that last night Warwickshire troops carried out a successful raid on the enemy trenches facing Asaigo, capturing 142 prisoners and four officers. British casualties numbered 12.

The French in Champagne have captured Orfeuil and Belmont Chateau, northeast of Somme-Py. Mont Blanc, a position of considerable tactical importance, was also taken.

Pershing Reports Progress.
Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—The capture of Blanc Mont and other positions in Champagne is reported by Gen. Pershing in his communique for Thursday, announcing further gains by the Americans fighting with the French.

American Aviators Busy.
With the Americans Northwest of Verdun, Oct. 3 (Thursday)—American aviators were busy all day carrying out bombing attacks against Comblans, Longuin and many other places. They dropped 37 tons of bombs. In the 12 days' fighting on this front 34 suc-

American Tanks Do Wonderful Work In Region Near Verdun

With the American Army in France, Oct. 4.—When the German forces advanced Tuesday in an attempt to capture Apremont on the front northwest of Verdun, American tanks emerged from the town in all directions. The tanks went lurching through the German ranks spraying bullets from all sides and spreading the utmost terror and consternation. The enemy losses were extremely heavy.

MAN AND CHILD HURT WHEN AUTO TURNS TURTLE

Edward Jernstrom and Edward Douglass are Unfortunate Participants in a Rather Unusual Automobile Accident.

One of the most unusual automobile accidents of the season occurred yesterday afternoon at about 5:00 o'clock, when a sedan driven by Edward Jernstrom turned turtle on the Ford River road near the cemetery, injuring Mr. Jernstrom and one of the three little children whom he was taking for a ride.

Just how the accident happened is not clear, but it seems that when near the cemetery, one of the children spoke to Mr. Jernstrom, who is not used to driving a car and in some manner the car turned over. Little Edward Douglass fell through the glass and was cut about the face and Mr. Jernstrom was cut and bruised. He had no assistance at the time of the accident, but was able, alone and unaided, to right the car and drive back to town where the little Douglas boy was taken to his home on South Fannie street and the family physician summoned.

The shock of the accident, and the fear that the youngster was seriously injured, coupled with the damage done to the car, which had been loaned to him by a friend, has prostrated Mr. Jernstrom and he has been unable to leave his home today. The boy who was hurt is recovering and the chances are that he will be fully recovered in a day or two.

Rome, Oct. 4.—An American submarine chaser destroyed two enemy submarines yesterday during the bombardment of Durrazo.

Havre, Oct. 4.—British aviators operating in Flanders yesterday destroyed four enemy machines, according to authentic reports received here.

Rome, Oct. 4.—After the capture of Berat by the Italians, cavalry joined in the pursuit of the retreating Austrians and made a considerable advance.

London, Oct. 4.—Austro-Hungarian forces in Albania are retiring in disorder before the Italians. The Austrians are blowing up depots as they retreat.

London, Oct. 4.—In the leveling of forts and depots of Durrazo, Wednesday, the entente squadron, according to a Central News dispatch from Rome, destroyed much material in Albania.

CROWDER ISSUES A CALL TO 29,999 TO TAKE SCHOOL WORK

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)
Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—Provost Marshal General Crowder today issued a call for 29,999 grammar school graduates from 42 states and the District of Columbia. The men are to entrain Oct. 15 for technical schools. Of the total, 980 will be negroes. Voluntary induction will remain open until Oct. 12.

The call is the first issued since the suspension of the October entrainment as the result of the epidemic of Spanish influenza. None but registrants found physically fit will be accepted. The state and number of men to be furnished, together with the educational institutions to which they will be assigned, include Michigan, 200; Michigan School of Mines, Houghton, Mich. and 840 to the University of Michigan. Two hundred Wisconsin boys will be sent to Beloit college and 550 to the University of Wisconsin.

Local Boy Says He Has Yet To Meet Americans Who Can't Find Something to Laugh About In and Out of Battle.

AIR RAIDS THRILLING

Has Only the Warmest Praise For the Magnificent Fighting Men Michigan and Wisconsin Have Sent Forth.

Ralph Cabourie, one of Escanaba's fighting sons who is with Pershing's forces in France has written his mother, Mrs. A. Gabourie, of this city, a most interesting letter describing some of the things he has seen and been through since he joined the colors. The young man is well known here and his letter should prove very interesting to his friends and all others who are following the experiences of the local boys who are indulging in the present world-wide pastime of chasing the Hun.

The letter follows:

September 3, 1918.
My dear mother:
I just finished writing a letter to a girl friend in Milwaukee, and it really required some effort. Have been carrying the burden of thought that I owed her a letter from some weeks ago and tonight decided to relieve my mind. There is only one girl in the world that I love to write to, and I find, oh, so much pleasure in writing this letter to that "girl." Yes, mother, I am just the same as ever, as I can about picture you saying to the family. The war has changed many things, but my views on that subject, nix!

I received a letter from Stella. Tell her that the boys had no trouble in picking her out as my sister, and I wish to thank her for that picture. Just a little suggestion, mother. Why not have some taken of the family? They would please me, oh, so much. You will notice that this letter bears a September date. This month is known for bright moonlight nights

Turkish Minister Of Interior Quits; New Foe Chancellor

Amsterdam, Oct. 4.—The Turkish minister of the interior has resigned, according to a Constantinople message received here today. Prince Maximilian of Baden has been appointed German chancellor, says an official announcement, received today. Deputies Goebel, Centris and Scheidemann, Majority Social Democrat, have been appointed secretaries of state without portfolios. The official statement says that Prince Maximilian has also been named Prussian Foreign secretary. He will announce his program at a full meeting of the Reichstag on Oct. 5.

FIFTY MEN LOST IN A COLLISION BETWEEN SHIPS

The Herman Frasch Collides With an Oil Tanker 700 Miles Off American Coast And Sinks in Seven Minutes.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—The sinking of the American steamer Herman Frasch, as a result of a collision with the George Henry, was announced by the navy department today. The Frasch sank in seven minutes. Forty-one survivors have so far been accounted for.

The collision occurred 700 miles off the American coast. First reports gave few details. The Henry had her bow crushed in but stood by all night to pick up survivors and then continued on her voyage. Both were cargo carriers in the service of the United States army.

The Frasch, a ship of 4,000 tons gross, carried a crew of 90 officers and men. The Henry is an oil tanker.

NEARLY TWO MILLION AMERICAN FIGHTING MEN SENT OVERSEAS

Spanish Influenza in Camps Will Check Further Shipments for a Time, It is Officially Stated from Washington.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—Americans abroad now number 1,800,000, the members of the house military committee were told today at the weekly meeting. Spanish influenza in military cantonnments will retard the shipment of men somewhat in the future, as the war department has adopted a policy of not sending any men overseas who have been exposed or are likely to communicate the disease to others.

BRITISH FIGHTING IN THE OPEN NORTHEAST OF ST. QUENTIN NOW

Mayor Proclaims Week of Oct. 6 to 12 Child Welfare Week

Our Government has declared this Children's Year in an effort to bring before the Nation the necessity of conserving Child Life and of insuring to our children the proper mental, moral, and physical training, leading to good citizenship. Therefore, that Escanaba may demonstrate its spirit of co-operation with the Government in this important undertaking, I hereby proclaim the week of Oct. 6-12 CHILD WELFARE WEEK. Signed CLARK M. ESCANABA BOYS HAVE WONDERFUL CHANCE OFFERED

Can Get College Education and Army Training at Marquette at Government Expense if They Act Quickly.

HASTE VERY NECESSARY

Branch Will Be Established at Marquette Normal if Sufficient Interest is Shown in Upper Peninsula.

If there are still a sufficient number of boys between 18 and 21 in the Upper Peninsula to constitute a force of 100 who desire to enter the Army Training Corps, in colleges, the government will establish a course for such training at the Marquette Normal school.

Word to that effect was received this morning by P. E. King, superintendent of the Escanaba schools. Mr. King wants this information spread as widely and as rapidly as possible, as he must be in a position to furnish information as to the number of boys Escanaba may be able to send to take advantage of this splendid opportunity. Interest in the Army Training Corps feature of college work has been deep in this city and already Mr. King has had about 40 inquiries for information and has helped many boys fill out their applications.

Requirements Not Too Strict.
The requirements are not such that graduates of the high school cannot meet them. It is necessary, however, that the applicant be a graduate of a high school. High school graduates between 18 and 21 years of age, even though they be in the draft, are still eligible to take this course, the government paying all expenses and allowing the boys the regular army pay of \$20 a month while they are taking their training which constitutes a good portion of their college work.

This would seem to be the greatest opportunity any local boy could wish. He can get his college work as well as army training at the same time, the government paying the expenses and also paying the student for his time.

Hurry Is Necessary.
But they must hurry. Every boy or every parent of a boy wishing to have this course established at Marquette which is near this city, will do well to communicate with Supt. King at once and get all the particulars. This should be done before Monday as Mr. King must make his report on that day.

Boys of 18, who meet the requirements, will receive a nine months' course, boys of 19 will be educated and given military training until next March and boys of 21 can go until January, at government expense and draw government pay. But it is a case requiring quick action. The proposition may not be open after Monday. If sufficient interest is shown in the upper peninsula, the government will give upper peninsula boys a chance. If they delay, the chance will be gone.

Allies are Bending Back the German Flank From Lens North and From Rheims Eastward to Argonne.

USING STRONG PRESSURE

Gen. Foch in Positions Pour Troops Through the Wide Breach and Take Cambrai And Laon in the Rear.

(Associated Press War Summary)

Northeast of St. Quentin the British are today reported as fighting in the open country beyond the Hindenburg line after pushing ahead five miles since Monday. From Lens northward and from Rheims east to Argonne, the allies are bending back the German flank.

The breach in the German defenses south of Beurevoir is on a front of five miles. To the north the British have plunged a wedge east and southeast of Le Catelet while on the front of attack between Sequahart and Lesdins the German resistance is bitter, but there is no let-up in the strong allied pressure.

With the British in the open country northeast of St. Quentin, the cavalry and tanks are pouring through the breach, and German positions about Cambrai and Laon are most precarious. The situation now makes it possible for Gen. Foch to pour troops through and take both Cambrai and Laon in the rear.


West of Lillie the British are pressing the Germans to the east while extending their lines south of Lens to Mericourt where a good advance has been made. Meanwhile the British and Belgians in Flanders have widened the salient east of Ypres, which threatens the German positions on the coast and the network of railways west of Chent.

There is no indication that the Germans have halted their retreat in the Lille salient. The enemy is still several miles west of the Dule canal north of Armentieres which runs through Lille and to the north of Lens and which will probably form a part of the German defense before Lillie. It is not considered probable that the Germans will give up Lille without heavy fighting.

In Albania the Austrians are retreating in disorder.

FARMERS BECOMING FIGHTERS AT M. A. C. TRAINING SCHOOL

Nearly all Freshmen have Enrolled in The Army Training Corps Since Opening of Fall Term.

East Lansing, Oct. 4—With the commencement of the fall term at the Michigan Agricultural college, the M. A. C. has turned almost overnight from its sixty-year old business of producing farmers, foresters and engineers to training fighters.

Almost without exception the 600 freshmen enrolled on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday have become enlisted in the student army training corps and are now wearing the regulation khaki of U. S. privates. All are being held under strict military discipline, just as the would be in any training camp. With the 540 men in the vocational truck and tractor unit, and others in the engineering and veterinary reserves, the college now is housing and training more than 1200 men. Many other boys who sought entrance had to be turned away.

Some of the usual college work is being offered this fall (this is entirely true in the case of the several hundred young women students) but most of the courses have been changed over for war purposes as the war department has requested. This is true of the agricultural, engineering, veterinary medicine and forestry courses without distinction. About 550 members of the training corps are being lodged in new barracks. The others are being housed in the dormitories of the college.

Why Study the Science of Sawmills?

Sawmills all over the world are at in war work, turning the state's timber tracts into many different kinds of machinery used in the rear. J. W. Calland of the department of forestry of the Ohio experiment station reports many mills are working on government orders.

Several orders are for oak and hickory dimensions to be used in making artillery and escort wagons. Bending oak and elm go to firms making auto trucks. Select ash, walnut and quartered oak are used in the manufacture of airplanes.

Considerable good white oak from northeastern Ohio is being sawed into ship timber and boat units. One Ohio firm has an order for a million test stakes to be made from hardwood.

SHOULD EAT MORE EULACHON

Why Department of Commerce Urges People to Make Use of Fish as a Food.

The eulachon, a species of fish much like the smelt, which lives in the water of the Pacific coast, and, like the smelt, has the habit of running into rivers and brooks for spawning, is suggested by the bureau of fisheries of the department of commerce as a war substitute for more expensive and less nutritious foods.

In a booklet distributed by the bureau of fisheries the eulachon is described as "the finest fish in the world; tender, fragrant and digestible." The booklet says it is the fattest of fishes, and that its oil has a peculiarly delicate, agreeable flavor, and, when extracted, is solid at ordinary temperatures.

The eulachon is found from Oregon north to Alaska in great quantities, and has been placed on the market fresh, frozen, brine salted, kippered and hard smoked and canned. The frozen fish is as good as the fresh, says the booklet, but the consumer should buy them still fresh and thaw them in cold water before using.

MOTOR LIFTS GREAT WEIGHT


How Mysterious Power is Employed to Do the Work of Great Number of Men.

Almost, if not equally, as famous as the immortal "man with the hoe" is the "man with the magnet"—the man we see in all the leading industrial plants nowadays. The modern electric magnet described in a recent issue of The Experimenter, lifts a ten-ton billet just as easily as a man would lift a 25-pound sack of flour.

At the touch of a switch the magnet loses its magnetic power and the billet drops or lays where it is. Attached to traveling cranes, the amount of work one of these electromagnets in the larger size can accomplish in one day is astonishing. It will unload a freight car full of pig iron in less time than a gang of men, and at a fraction of the cost.

The larger sizes of electro-magnets are capable of lifting single pieces weighing as much as 60,000 pounds, or 30 tons. Such a giant electro-magnet as this measures 62 1/2 inches in diameter, consumes 72 amperes, at 220 volts, and weighs 7,500 pounds net.

WAR OF SERVICE AS WELL AS MEN

Italian Editor Visiting in This Country Speaks of the World Food Situation.

Crisis is Passed But Storehouses Must Be Filled For The Future Safety of Our Allies.

Washington Oct. 4—One of the Italian editors visiting this country said: "We are not here in the service of Italy. We are not here in the service of the United States. We are here in that greatest of all services, the service which ennobles all who engage in it—the service of mankind."

It is this service, the service of mankind, that is demanding the conservation and fair distribution of our foodstuffs.

A crisis has been successfully passed. Due to the awakening of her collective conscience, America last year saved enough wheat to share her breadstuffs with Europe and tide over her own supply until the present abundant harvest.

These past months of conservation discipline will enable her to keep below the pre-war consumption of wheat until her storehouses are again filled and a surplus built up for her own and friendly Europe's future protection.

Because the light-weight cattle are now moving so rapidly to market; due largely to the extreme drought in the south-west, the American people are now being urged to demand meat from the lighter weight animals, those that dress below 475 pounds. This will relieve the drain on the heavier beef needed abroad and will help producers.

The present sugar allotment of two pounds per person per month still gives us half a pound more than France's ration and a pound more than Italy's. Fair play demands that we keep within this amount in order to share with them.

This war cannot be won without a symmetrical distribution of food. Selfishness and individual taste must be forgotten in the broader service of mankind.

RALPH GABOURIE DESCRIBES LIFE

According to weather men, but according to us, it is noted for air raids. The other night I sat down to read a book entitled "The Autobiography of an Elderly Lady." I agree with you that it is strange rearing for a soldier, but nevertheless, I got quite interested in it when along came a flock of Huns with their usual loads of bombs, so I took to the "abri" and you may rest assured I was not lonesome down there, as there were many others who beat me to it in spite of the fact that I was making about a hundred yards in what I should judge, ten seconds! These bombs tear a hole in the ground about ten feet in diameter and six or eight feet deep, so you can understand why we establish records every day in getting to where they can't reach us.

There is usually a lot of kidding the next day over the scramble to get there, but then I have yet to meet the American who couldn't find something to laugh about even when things are not going just right.

While writing about the horrors of our moonlight nights, I believe I have not told you of a particularly bright night when we were in another sector. Well to make it short, the Boche came

over and I never in my life felt so sorry to think that Uncle Sam would have to pay out so much money and lose lives, etc., when the Boche flew away. I am sure you can grasp the idea of it all, and to say we weren't sorry to see them go would be putting it mildly. Oh, yes, we wished him a safe return voyage—into the battery of anti-aircraft or something worse if possible.

The feeling one gets during an air raid when unable to seek shelter is indescribable. You get a feeling you want to go somewhere, anywhere, but where to go that is the question. You can usually hear the hum of the motor as it is so different from that of the allied planes, and all one can do is to sit tight and think of some short prayer or a Y. M. C. A. song that is appropriate to the occasion. Now, mother, I don't want to worry you or anything like that, and if I knew or thought you would worry, I would never write anything like I have, but I believe you will be glad to know that your son who used to be so slow and fussy about things and have never got to school until the "last bell" rang is now beginning to move somewhat faster and with plenty of evidence that practice makes perfect.

It is getting dark and I just lit the candle and closed the windows and shades to screen off the light, for there is no need of inviting the Huns over.

It may seem strange to you to have mention windows and shades, too, but it is the truth anyhow. We are pretty well up along the front, and as you know, follow the troops as they advance. Oh, what a thrill that last word "advance" gives me and doubtless every one of us. Yes, we are repeating just what we did in the other sector, and with the grace of God shall continue to do. What a fine bunch of fighting men these two states of Michigan and Wisconsin have produced and are producing.

Please remember mother dear, that I am not inflated with a sense of self-importance or self-praise, for I said "fighting men," and we are classed as non-combatants. It is true that medical men go along with the infantry, and are worthy of esteem, and are a great credit to any mother and the cause that brought them here. Of course a medic or in fact any non-combatants don't get much credit from the fighting men, but as we are doing our share, we are perfectly contented, without being praised up, to let all of the praise go to the men who "do it" for they are the most deserving. I have been right up on the field and picked up wounded men and never saw a detter lot of fellows. All seemed to take their fate in a real American way, and can give a good account of themselves. Then and there is where our part begins.

As has been said before, the Medical Department is sort of a salvage for men. Yes, that's it in a nutshell. They are taken to the hospital, then the rest camp, hardened up again, given additional training, and there you have him all ready to go "up" again, and there's only one thing wrong, or rather that is hard to accomplish, and that is the additional training. The men simply want to get at 'em again, and that's the real spirit, isn't it?

"I just rave over this division of ours, and who wouldn't after seeing how we made those Huns run in the last sector and how they run in this one. Yes, they just, in plain English, beat it, leaving guns, ammunition, and loads of other things that would in any way delay their retreat. I can remember how we looked at our first divisional review down in Texas, so green, so awkward, but so determined. Little we realized then that we are worth four or five Huns each, or better I should say, get credit for that many. But now, figures are the facts that verify, and it just makes the blood run "double time" through one to even think about it. I am indeed very proud to belong to such a division, and from what the French soldiers say, the civilians in the "big city" are also praising the work done. Now, I don't mean to say or even intimate that we are the "it" over here for the other divisions are also doing good work, but you appreciate how a fellow feels to be able to say, "Well, see what we've done—messed up a bunch of Huns!" (Sort of rhymes, doesn't it?)

In a letter of some time ago, I mentioned something about a German offensive about to begin, but they've cut that propaganda to camouflage their retreat and their disorganized army, and now, the next thing we look for is a German peace negotiation, but for the time being and for some time to come, we've got ours from President Wilson, and are satisfied with "pieces" of Germans and not German "pieces." We've got a lot of men over here and plenty to eat and enough ammunition to "carry on," and as we sing "Hall, Hall, the Gang's All Here" and "On to Berlin," old Kaiser Bill is probably figuring on eating his Xmas dinner at home this time.

The morale of the German army in this sector, and probably all sectors, is very poor. Stories told by doughboys of giving a Boche a cigarette in exchange for the whereabouts of officers, dugouts, etc., are very common, and strange to say, the stories are most usually true. Occasionally, they let the Boche go back to get the comrades, and it's a pretty swell dish for a Hun to get fed up and dressed a la Americaine. The Huns often tell us that they are told the Americans take no prisoners, and that if the rest knew how we treat them, they would come over also. Papers and diaries found on prisoners verify that. A lad of about seventeen who had been teach-

ing in a grade school wrote in his diary that he was awaiting his chance to come over to our lines. They are simply "fed" up, or as we say now, "all ketch'd up" on the war, and some are "wised" up on the present situation and foresee their fate if they don't give up. Now, the men higher up in the German army must know the facts about things. They must know that their submarine is an absolute failure now, that their morale is of the poorest, that conditions at home are growing worse, that they are losing in a few days what it took them weeks and months to gain, and still, in spite of all this, they are too cowardly to admit they are beaten. It takes a man to face defeat, but we are not fighting the men of Germany except indirectly—we are fighting those few who are taking things easy away back from the horrors of it all and not suffering a bit.

You perhaps have read that the Kaiser has taken his last son away from field service, and hid him with the others of his family for fear he might get scratched up a bit. He has often been said that the end of Bill will end the war, and believe me, he knows it as well as the tens of thousands of soldiers who would like a chance to bring about his end.

Mais come on dit, c'est la guerre. N'est pas, ma chere Mere?

It is getting rather late and I must be rolling in soon. I really did not intend to write so much, but somehow or other just had to break loose with some of it.

It is really a shame to impose upon our censor this way, but I trust he will forgive me for this time.

I am receiving magazines regularly, and certainly enjoy reading them, but letters are doubly interesting. Wish I'd ever get more of them—can't get too many.

My wishes are that this letter finds you all in good health. As for myself, I really never felt better.

BATTLE CREEK CAMP SELECTING TIMBER FOR OFFICERS NOW

Great Need Exists For Men to Officer Divisions Which Uncle Sam is Preparing for Overseas.

Camp Custer, Oct. 4.—The need of men to officer the divisions which Uncle Sam is getting ready in record smashing time for overseas service is evidenced in instructions received at Custer from the war department requiring all officers to select officer timber. Officers are under instructions to make monthly reports to the war department, to include the names of men who would make good officers. Special emphasis is laid on the need for officers in the artillery and gunnery sections, the call issued urging an unlimited number, although no sacrifices will be countenanced as to qualifications. In the infantry section the total number of eligibles shall not exceed four per cent of the strength of all units contributing men.

PROVED POOR BUSINESS MAN

Why "Reformed Crook" Found Himself Unable to Keep in Straight and Narrow Path.

O. Henry could have written this: James Doyle broke into the home of Frederick C. Buckout, March 17, 1915, poked his gun into the face of Buckout and started to garner valuables. Then Mrs. Buckout talked to him, got his promise to reform, gave him a recommendation and her husband the next day got him a job.

Eighteen months later a masked bandit pulled off two first-class "jobs" in New York. About the same time Doyle got money which he invested in a legitimate business. The business did not go. A few weeks ago police grabbed Doyle, found a burglar's kit and got his confession. He had gone straight for months, but then got hard up, robbed a house and turned over a new leaf, using the proceeds of the robbery. Still he couldn't stick "straight." "Five years," said the judge.

How Birds Dress Own Wounds.

Many birds, particularly those that are prey for sportsmen, possess the faculty of skillfully dressing wounds. Some will even set bones, tucking their own feathers to form the proper bandages.

A French naturalist writes that on a number of occasions he has killed woodcocks that were, when shot, recovering from wounds previously received. In every instance he found the old injury neatly dressed with down plucked from the stem feather and skillfully arranged over the wound, evidently by the beak of the bird. In some instances a solid plaster was thus formed, and in other bandages had been applied to wounds or broken limbs.

HOGS AND WAR.

If an army really "travels on its stomach" the American hog has done its bit in wiping out the St. Mihiel salient, for statistics just completed show that the Yanks in France have broken the world's record as bacon eaters.

From President Edward Morris, Jr. of Morris & Company, packers, it was learned that statistics of the company, after checking past meat records with late government figures, have discovered that the exports of bacon in the first seven months of this year are almost equal to the total exports for five years preceding the war. The figures are 736,959,292 pounds as compared with 912,370,461 pounds.
