KING BORIS QUITS THE JOB AFTER SERVING FOR **BUT ONE SINGLE MONTH**

Bavarian Royal Family Claims the Throne in the Event of the Abdication of Kaiser Wilhelm But Emperor Refuses—Takes Refuge At German Grand Headquarters.

NEW BULGARIAN GOVERNMENT LOCATED AT TERNOVIA UNDER M. STAMBOULISKY

Count Julius Andrassy, Who Became Austro-Hungarian Minister on Oct. 25 Has Resigned and New Hungarian Ministry Has Been Formed with Count Karolyi As Premier.

Copenhagen, November, 2.-King Boris, of Bulgaria, who ascended the throne October 3 has abdicated. A new government has been established at Ternova under M. Stambouliwsky, who has been chief of the peasants and agrarians of Bulgaria for some time.

London, Nov. 2 .- M. Stambouliwsky, who is reported to be the head of the new government of Bulgaria, is said to be in command of a representative army of 40,000 men, according to a Zurich dispatch to the Central

BARVARIAN AFTER THRONE

London, Nov. 2.- The Bavarian pre mier has notified Berlin that the Bavarian royal family claims the imperial throne in the event of emperor Villam's abdication, according to the Leipsic Volks Zeitung, which is quoted in a Hague dispatch to the Dally Mail.

KAISER HANGS ON.

Paris, Nov. 2-Emperor William is persistent in-his refusal to abdicate. He took refuge at German-grand freat quarters immediately after the meeting of the war cabinet, at wnich the question of his abdication was raised, says a dispatch to Le Journal from Zurich.

TERMS TO AUSTRIA.

Rome, Nov. 2,-Allied terms to Austria, in response to the appeal for an armistice, have been handed by Gen. Diaz, commander of the Italian armies, to an Austrian officer who entered the lines under a white flag. This was announced officially today.

MUTINY IN AUSTRIAN FLEET

London, Nov. 2.-Members of the crews of the entire Austrian fleet at Pola have mutinied, have seized all the ships of various nations in that port and have declared they will obey only their respective national counoils, according to a Budapest dispatch received here today.

ANDRASSY- RESIGNS

London, Nov. 2.-Count Julius Andrassy, who became Austro-Hungarian Yoreign minister, October. 25 has resigned.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS HERE NEXT WEEK

Necessity for Continued Pre-Cautions Against Influenza and Pneumonia Considered of Most Vital Importance.

Young People of Community Are Violating Spirit If Not the Letter of Present Campaign to Eliminate Danger.

Supt. F. E. King, of the local public schools announced this morning that the schools of the city would not open next week. This is in accordance with must be given up. the wishes of the state board of health branch located here as well as the o-cal board of health. Continued precaution is considered wise at this time and it is contended that it is better to have the schools closed for another week or two than have one death traced to their reopening before safety was absolutely assured.

Down state there is considerable agitation for reopening the churches next Sunday,but Dr. Olin, state health officer is strongly opposed to the action. He is in close touch with sonditions and it is stated that there will be no lifting of the ban until late next week,

Partial Results.

Reports received at the Escanaba branch of the state board from counties in the upper peninsula, show the wide prevalence of influenza and the increasing number of cases of pneumonia indicate that the community is far from being safe yet,

Up to 10 o'clock this new influenza cases and 7 deaths were reported from various upper peninsula counties since 3:00 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

London, Nov., 2-Valenciennes has een captured by the British, Field Marshall Haig reports that Valenciennes was taken by Canadian troops under Gen. Currie and that these troops have passed through the town. The village of Treseau, southeast of Valenciennes, was captured by the British this morning after they had seized the high ground in that region.

Angio-French forces in rlanders yesterday reached the Scheldt river as far north as Eecke, seven miles southwest of Ghent.

Troops of the tenth Italian army have crossed the Livenza river between Monte and Secile and have established a bridgehead on the east side of that river. British troops are fighting with this army.
