**EXPLANATION OF CHANCES OPEN TO MEN IN THE ARMY**

How Registrants of Sept. 12 May Enter New Officers' Training School At Camp Fremont, Cal.

"Class 1 Registrants who registered prior to September 12th, 1918 are eligible for individual induction for admission to Line Officers' Training Schools; Infantry, Field Artillery, Machine Gun and Coast Artillery. The Adjutant General of the Army Washington, D. C.

In explanation of the above telegram it should be stated that at the new Officers' Training School, at Camp Fremont, Cal., exception of those registrants between the ages of 18 and 45, with the exception of those registrants in deferred classifications on account of Industry, Occupation or Employment including Agriculture are eligible.

All civilians desiring to submit their applications should do so at once, and full information and application blanks may be obtained at the nearest Educational Institution where there is an

Army Officer or Professor of Military Science and Tactics.  
 There is a great need for Field Artillery and Machine Gun Officers, and applications for the Field Artillery Officers' Training School at Camp Zachary Taylor, Ky., are being received. These schools are open to civilians and information regarding the necessary qualifications for entrance to these schools may be obtained from any S. A. T. C. unit at the Colleges throughout the State.

A scientific and technical education is valuable in the Field Artillery and Machine Gun Branches, but any civilian having a thorough understanding and working knowledge of arithmetic algebra to include quadratic equations and plane geometry is eligible. A knowledge of trigonometry to include solution of triangles and logarithms is desirable. A refresher course in mathematics under competent instructors will be given all candidates.

Pay, et Cetera.  
 All civilians while at these schools will receive the pay of a private—\$30.00 per month and when commissioned Second Lieutenants they will receive \$118.67 per month. All accepted civilian applicants will be sent to the schools by their draft boards at the expense of the government.

**SIBERIANS FEAR A FOOD SHORTAGE IN NEXT SUMMER**

Have Asked the City Council of Nome, Alaska, to Send Merchandise From There and Some Is Sent.

Nome, Alaska, Nov. 2—Siberians across the Bearing Sea from here, fearing that unsettled conditions in Vladivostok will cut them from their Russian source of supply next summer have asked Nome's City Council to send merchandise from here.  
 The request was made in a letter received today by the council from the "Peoples Administration" of Anadyr, a Siberian town on the gulf of Anadyr, an arm of the Bearing Sea. The letter was written in Russian and was sent over in a trading boat. Nome responded to the request as far as it could. A committee of councilmen was named to communicate with the Russian municipal officers and render as much assistance as possible.

IMPORTANT

1. It is especially important to beware of the person who coughs or sneezes without covering his mouth and nose. It also follows that one should keep out of crowds and stuffy places as much as possible, keep homes, offices and workshops well aired, spend some time out of doors each day, walk to work if at all practicable—in short, make every possible effort to breathe as much pure air as possible.

"Cover up each cough and sneeze, If you don't you'll spread disease."

2. Where crowding is unavoidable, as in street cars, care should be taken to keep the face so turned as not to inhale directly the air breathed out by another person.

3. In guarding against disease of all kinds, it is important that the body be kept strong and able to fight off disease germs. This can be done by having a proper proportion of work, play and rest, by keeping the body well clothed, and by eating sufficient, wholesome and properly selected food.

4. It is very important that every person who becomes sick with INFLUENZA should go home at once and go to bed. This will help keep away dangerous complications and will, at the same time, keep the patient from scattering the disease far and wide.

5. Call a physician and take only such medicine as is prescribed by the doctor. It is foolish to ask the druggist to prescribe and may be dangerous to take the so-called "safe, sure and harmless" remedies advertised by patent-medicine manufacturers.

6. The ordinance relative to spitting on the sidewalks and in public places, will be rigidly enforced.
