SEWER IS NECESSITY SAYS OLIN

Escanaba May Yet Be Forced To Build Interceptor.

"Order from state department of health for construction of intercepting sewer to protect water supply being mailed today. Immediate action necessary."
"R. M. Olin, health commissioner."

That telegram, received late yesterday afternoon by city clerk Carl E. Anderson, definitely started the movement here for the construction of an intercepting sewer that will divert sewage which now flows into the bay and works out toward the intake pipe. The sewage would be diverted to the disposal plant, erected by the city a few years ago.

To climax the discussion last night, the aldermen decided to hold another meeting next Tuesday night when steps will be taken to place the matter before the people in a special election. The sewer bonding issue as proposed some time ago, involved an expenditure of \$30,000. To build today it is estimated the increase due to higher prices for materials will be about \$8,000.

Board Has Right.

The state board has a right to order the construction of the sewer, declared T. J. Riley, acting city attorney in the absence of Attorney H. R. Dotsch. He asserted a special election would be necessary and because to hold the special election on Aug. 4 would mean a saving of approximately \$500 to the city, due to the fact that the road bonding issue will be voted on at that time, it was deemed advisable to draw up the legal papers in time to hold the special election on Aug. 4.

The repeal of the city ordinance covering the use of fireworks was deemed advisable and acted on favorably so as to permit a general celebration. It was expressed that the state law, which forbids the use of dynamite and high explosives, would be sufficient to keep a general lid on dangerous firecrackers.

Fifteen hundred dollars in personal taxes remain delinquent. City Treasurer Arthur Mayou reported last night, and action will be taken to have the city attorney take up the matter through legal steps, although it was hinted that Mayou's ability to collect taxes should not be curtailed, even if he had to back a wagon up to an institution delinquent in taxes and load enough property on the vehicle to pay for the taxes.

Consider Another Sewer.

The sewer committee and city attorney will consider the proposal for the construction of a sanitary sewer on Campbell and Birch streets and at the I. Stephenson company plant, North Escanaba. Plans and specifications were submitted by the board of public works, which show an expenditure of \$7,686 would be necessary.

Another proposal of the board of public works was that a fence be erected around the property of the public utilities here at an estimated cost of \$700. The public utilities committee will report on this matter at the next meeting. The fence is needed to keep out thieves and avoid contact with high tension wires, it was explained.

CASH AWARDS FOR SERVICE MEN PLAN OF FOURTH PARADE

Shortest Sailor and Soldier and Tallest of Each Branch to Get Prizes.

Four special awards for service men will be given after the parade Fourth of July morning, it was announced this morning by Chairman George F. McEwen after arrangements with officers of the American Legion post, organized here last night. Every effort will be made to secure the largest turnout of service men in history.

It is planned to give cash awards to the tallest soldier or marine and the shortest soldier or marine, as well as to the tallest sailor and the shortest sailor.

Invite All Service Men.

An effort will be made to reach all service men to invite them to take part in the parade, but it will be impossible in the short period of time remaining for officers and committees of the Legion post to personally speak to every service man in the county.

Major L. D. Goddard has been requested to serve as battalion commander for the line of march of the service men. Capt. Ted Kessler has been selected to take command and form the men into companies or platoons, depending entirely on the number of men turning out. Lieut. James Frost, Lieut. Samuel Stephenson and all other commissioned officers of the city have been requested to take charge of platoons.

Ensign Francis Atkins, ranking naval officer in Escanaba, will take command of all sailors. Ensign Atkins this morning requested that all sailors appear in white hats, blue uniforms and white leggings.

Uniforms Are Specified.

All soldiers and marines have been asked to turn out in olive drab uniforms, without the blouses. It was further suggested that every man make it a point to have an olive drab shirt pressed for the occasion and wear a black necktie. Campaign hats will be worn, instead of barracks caps or overseas caps.

Every commissioned officer has been named a member of a committee to visit as many service men as possible with a view to getting the banner turnout of history. Ensign Atkins declared this morning that sailors of the city, in proportion to the number in the service, expect to have the largest turnout.

Not Bolshevik? He Has All Ear Marks

Edward Nieme of Trenary has spent ten years in this county since coming from Russian Finland and has not applied for citizen papers. When asked why he hadn't done so, he replied:

"I can't read and write—too busy to learn."
But Nieme had plenty of time on his hands to give cause for the police to arrest him on a charge of being disorderly. And when he was arraigned in Judge Emil Glaser's court today, Nieme was sentenced to serve ten days in the county jail.

There is nothing particularly wrong with Nieme except that he isn't a desirable citizen, say the police. A card found on him showed that he had made a purchase some time ago at the Worker's Socialist Publishing company plant in Duluth. He has bolshevistic tendencies and although he denies connections with the I. W. W., he has all the ear marks of one, declare authorities.

And the reporter who talked to Nieme in the city cell is of the same opinion.

Increase Bail For Alleged Assaulter

Schumaker has retained Michael Doyle, Menominee's mayor, as attorney.

FREIGHT BY AUTO, PLAN FOR COUNTY

Organization Is Formed Here to Reach Towns With Trucks.

To engage in a general freight business between this city and points throughout several counties, the Upper Peninsula Motor Transit company was formed last night at a meeting held in the office of the Needham Electric company. It is planned to establish a schedule between Escanaba and Menominee and Gladstone, Rapid River and points more distant when the roads are placed in good condition.

An executive committee, to take the place of officers to be elected at a later date, was chosen. The committee includes, W. H. Needham, Mose Buchanan, Charles E. Lewis, F. J. Earle, John Knutson, Henry McFarland and Leo Vanlerbergh.

Mr. Needham first conceived the plan and after considerable study broached the subject with a number of prominent business men of the county, with the result that an organization was formed. Stock will be purchased by residents of Escanaba, Rapid River, Garden, Ensign and Gladstone, the committee was assured. Capital stock of \$20,000 will be procured.

According to present plans, depending largely on the delivery of trucks, the schedule will be opened Aug. 1. Not alone will trucks be purchased, but a regularly established telephone system will be inaugurated to assist the drivers and give them instructions as they proceed along the route.

Without her knowledge the flame went out and the gas filled the stove. When she opened it, a flame from an adjoining torch set fire to the excessive volume of gas. Her burns were declared by the attending physician to be superficial.

AMERICAN LEGION POST OF ESCANABA ORGANIZED AT MEET

Officers Selected to Head New Organization; Plan for Future Meeting.

The organization of an American Legion post in Escanaba, believed to be the first in the upper peninsula, was effected at a meeting of service men held last night at the city hall. Walter C. Janson was named president. The other officers chosen are as follows:

Godfrey Goodman, vice president.
William Ehnerd, recording secretary.

Ed. Moersch, treasurer.
Other officers will be named at a meeting to be called in the near future when other plans of the post will be carried out.

On the suggestion of James Frost, former lieutenant in overseas service, all commissioned officers in attendance at the meeting declined to accept nominations to office. Several other nominations were withdrawn also.

Ted Kessler, former captain overseas, suggested that the drill planned for the Fourth be dispensed with owing to the short intervening time in which to make preparations and on his motion the service men voted favorably.

Only one contest developed during the selection of officers. Allen Buchanan was defeated by William Ehnerd, after Buchanan's nomination was forced on him against his wishes. It was a close vote, showing there was little choice between the two for the office.

Wilson Aboard Ship Prepares to Deliver Message to Congress

On Board The U. S. Steamer George Washington, July 2.—(By wireless to The Associated Press)—The presidential voyage continued under most favorable conditions with a calm sea and mild, sunny weather.

Mr. Wilson has done some work on the message to congress, in which he will submit the treaty protocol and general results achieved at the Paris conference, but on the advice of Rear Admiral Grayson, his physician, the president is giving considerable time to rest and recuperation after strenuous days he has just left behind and for those through which he soon must pass.

While no precise plans concerning the presentation of the message have as yet been announced, it seems probable that if the George Washington arrives in New York Monday as expected, the treaty will be submitted and the message ready by Wednesday or Thursday.

Dr. Walsh Expected to Land in Few Days

Dr. John J. Walsh is expected to arrive in the states in a few days with a shipload of wounded soldiers from France, according to latest advices received from him. Dr. Walsh is a commissioned officer in the medical corps and has been expected for the past several weeks.

Peterson Is Granted Permission to Build

Berne, Switzerland, July 2.—Virtually all of Montenegro is in rebellion against Serbian occupation, according to private advices received here. Bloody encounters are occurring in many places and guerrilla warfare has been revived in the mountains.

OPPOSITIONS OF LEAGUE TO 'STUMP'

Senate Opposition to Talk Against the Covenant.

(By Associated Press)
Washington, July 2.—With the beginning today of a week's recess of congress, it seemed assured that the senate opponents of the league of nations would abandon any plan for a formal senate declaration on the subject before the fight for actual ratification of the treaty begins.

Until the recent plan was suggested, it had been apparent the purpose of the opposition leaders was to press the resolution of Senator Knox to serve notice of the unwillingness to accept the league covenant as an inseparable part of the treaty and that of Senator Fall to declare a state of peace with Germany.

Expect Out And Out Fight.

It is now expected, however, that the treaty will be presented as soon as the recess is over and the general prediction is that from now on it will be a straight out and out fight over unqualified ratification.

Although many senators left the capital today, some of the leaders remained at work on plans for the ratification fight. It was said on both sides that the final strategy of the situation would not be determined until the treaty actually was presented, but in general the opposition line was shaping on the basis of ratification reservations suggested by Elihu Root, while the president's supporters were preparing for the struggle to secure acceptance of the covenant without alteration of a single provision.

Senators Plan "Stump."

A number of opposition senators who left today are to make addresses on the subject during the recess, speaking against the league in many states. There has been an effort by a committee of senators to co-ordinate the speaking dates of various league opponents and a tentative itinerary has been drawn up for a special train to carry senators to answer President Wilson when he goes to the country in support of the league.

Escanaba school garden clubs will meet at 9 o'clock Friday morning at the Franklin school to get lined up for the parade, it was announced this afternoon by M. B. Melican, school garden supervisor. All members of the club will be dressed in garden uniforms.

Jefferson and Washington school clubs will meet at the Jefferson school at 9:30 o'clock Thursday morning when badges will be given out. Badges also will be given to the Webster school club at a meeting to be held at the Webster school at 1:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Nothing was said about practicing before hand, as the alderman himself was seen "warming up" on torpedoes a few nights ago.

No Action so Far by Huns, Ratify Treaty

Berlin, July 2.—The Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung states it is authoritatively informed that no definite steps have as yet been taken by Germany for a speedy ratification of the peace treaty for the reason presumably that a number of preliminary questions, particularly those exactly fixing the frontiers in regions to be ceded, must first be settled.

Paris, July 2.—The Germans are expected to ratify the peace treaty the first of next week, according to a note sent to the allies. The note was one acknowledging the allied stipulation that the blockade will be raised when the treaty is ratified. The Germans expressed hope that German war prisoners would be released at the same time.

NO, FOLKS! DELTA HOTEL HASN'T BEEN SOLD, BUT MAY BE

Chicago Man Visits City With View to Purchase and May Complete Deal.

No, the hotel Delta has not been sold by the Wisconsin Hotel company—that is it has not been sold yet, but the deal may be closed Monday, providing the buyer decides to make the purchase.

Saturday L. S. Hemly, a Chicago hotel man arrived in Escanaba and was favorably impressed with the hotel as well as with the city. He wanted to know if it was for sale and was told that it was for a stipulated price. An inventory was taken and the price agreed upon. A small guarantee was placed in the hands of Mr. Merritt and Mr. Henry returned to Chicago, saying that he would return Monday.

Since he left nothing has been heard from him and whether or not a new management will take over the hotel will not be known until later.

Mr. Hemly said Escanaba was just the kind of a town he would like to live in and that if he buys the hotel he will arrange to make it much larger in order to care for the summer business, which he believes will double within the next year.

100 Deaths Toll Of Italian Quake

Florence, Italy, July 2.—The earthquake in this district Sunday caused 100 deaths and made several thousand homeless and destroyed 200 homes, six churches and several public buildings and schools, according to latest compilations. Work was proceeding with such rapidity today and tonight that virtually all had been given food and shelter.

Bolsheviki Claim Capture of Perm

BALLOON ON VOYAGE TO CROSS SEA

World's Largest Craft Starts Trip to the United States.

(By Associated Press)
East Fortune, Scotland, July 2.—The British dirigible R-34 started on her long heralded trip to America this morning.

Shortly before dawn the great airship was taken out of its air dome and turned around until her nose was pointed west. The command "hands off" was given and the huge envelope rose. Before the height of 500 feet was reached she was lost to view in the mist. The whirling of the propellers could be heard for several minutes. After a short period the large airship went out of sight.

Meet Unsettled Winds.

Weather reports indicated that the R-34 will meet unsettled conditions with variable winds until she is some distance out into the Atlantic. Then it is expected she will have following winds which will assist her.

London, July 2.—The position of the R-34 at 5 o'clock this morning, Greenwich time, was 55 degrees 20 minutes north latitude and 10 degrees 40 minutes west longitude, (about 325 miles off the coast of Ireland) according to a wireless dispatch from the aircraft received by the air ministry this morning. The R-34 was then making 40 knots. Up to that hour she had made an average speed of 45 knots an hour.

Encounters Thick Fog.

Wireless dispatches received from Major Scott at 10:05 o'clock this morning stated the R-34 was passing through a thick fog but that everything on board was going well.

The R-34 is the largest in the world with a length of 634 feet from nose to stern. She carries three boats below the gas bag and has a capacity of 12,000,000 cubic feet. Major G. H. Scott of the Royal Air force is in command. Estimates on the time to cross the Atlantic have been placed at variously from 60 to 70 hours, but the rate of 40 knots she was making for a while this morning indicated the trip might take a longer period. The dirigible will land at Roosevelt field, Long Island, which was placed in readiness recently by a crew of mechanics and workmen under the direction of the United States navy.

London, July 2.—The British dirigible R-34, which left East Fortune, Scotland, at 1:48 o'clock, Greenwich time, this morning on her attempted flight across the Atlantic, had reached 53 degrees and 50 minutes north latitude and 17 degrees and 50 minutes west longitude at 2 o'clock, Greenwich time, this afternoon, (10 o'clock New York time.)

New York Trains Are Endangered in Outbreak at Ferry

New York, July 2.—Fire at the south ferry terminal at the city's elevator structure destroyed a train and part of another today. Both trains carried passengers.

Many on board, a large number of whom were women, narrowly escaped. They were rescued by firemen who rushed ladders to the top of the elevated structure and carried them to the ground.

Reports that several persons had been killed had not been verified a half hour after the fire started.

Lafferty Funeral Conducted Tuesday

Funeral services were conducted yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock for W. E. Lafferty who died at a hospital here after an extended illness. A son W. E. Lafferty, Jr., came here from Canadian Sault Ste. Marie and took charge of the funeral. The body had been held at the Allo parlors pending word from him. Burial was made in Lakeview cemetery.

State Police Guard Maple Ridges Who Are Kept In Fear

A half squad of Michigan police are on guard at Maple Ridge to prevent any disturbances that may threaten to break out in the next couple of days. With their arrival, the vigil of heriff Frank O'Dess and undersheriff Andrew Iverson was terminated.

There are no new developments in the alleged plan to stage a red demonstration in Maple Ridge, according to Prosecutor Torval E Strom through whose investigation the state police were sent to the Delta county town.

Fears for attacks were expressed by members of the temperance union of Maple Ridge, who are asserted to be bitter enemies of the bolshevistic and I. W. W. crowd and who, it was expected, would be the first to be attacked should an outbreak occur. An unexpected development is likely to take place soon, hinted the prosecutor, but he would give out no information.

Horse Drowns in But Three Feet of Water

Stumbling from a scow into but three feet of water, a horse owned by Capt. Stone, was drowned yesterday afternoon before the animal could be dragged from the water. The accident occurred on the shore near the Haring livery barn. Stone was attempting to load the horse on the scow to take it to Summer Island. It missed its footing and fell into the water with the rope still on its head. The rope apparently strangled the animal before it could be pulled out.
