### SHIPPING BOARD URGES BOYS TO GO TO SEA

Chairman Hurley Says Hope of Merchant Marine is American Boy.

Chairman Edward N. Hurley of the United States shipping board has issued an appeal to American boys to take up seagoing, which is a part of a nation-wide movement by the board to interest the American people in the manning of the great new merchant fleet which resulted from the war.

Mr. Hurley points out that the new ships must be manned by Americans if they are to remain an asset worthy of the country's greatness.

"The backbone of the merchant marine is the men who are in it," he says. "It is as vital to the nation's prosperity that we have efficient American crews for the ships of the new merchant marine as it is for the railroads to have skilled and loyal train crews."

"The American boy is the hope of the merchant marine, according to Mr. Hurley.

"Our present greatest need," he says, "is to get in touch with the American boys who should man our new ships. I hope that every newspaper in the country will take notice of it; that every preacher will mention it from the pulpit; that every city and town, through its officials, will make a canvass of the young men of the community who might be available for training as merchant mariners, with a view to becoming officers, or shipping agents, or foreign trade representatives for American interests."

Mr. Hurley adds that the shipping board will give its fullest co-operation to any community wishing to send its boys to be trained for the merchant marine, and requests that communications on the subject be sent to Henry Howard, the shipping board's director of recruiting at Boston, Mass.

### All Lakes Higher Than Ever Before

Taking a general average the Great Lakes have risen to a depth greater than they have ever since the beginning of the twentieth century. A bulletin just issued by the United States Lake Survey service from Detroit shows that in the month of June 1919, Lake Superior was .20 feet higher than in May, Lakes Michigan and Huron, .12 foot higher; Lake Erie, .80 foot higher; and Lake Ontario, .68 foot higher than in May 1919. The bulletin as compiled by the Survey shows the feet above mean sea level for the month of June 1919 to be as follows:

The head of a Jibero Indian of southern Ecuador, it was obtained from a trader in South America by a brother-in-law of Mrs. Parker. Instead of scalping their victims, as was the custom of the Indians of North America, they remove all of the bones from the head and embalm the remaining flesh.

### New Opera to Be All Yankee One

Rome, June 16, (Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Pietro Mascagni, composer, expects a great American opera to be produced by American composer, with an American theme which shall crystallize America's musical attainments. This work, he said, was shaping itself in the efforts America was now making in her music halls and conservatories.

"I am looking forward with some amount of anxiety to the production of a great musical work in America in the near future," said Signor Mascagni. "There will certainly be produced soon a great American musical composition. I believe it will reflect the life of America. I feel that it will be built up out of the music of America, music which is so popular there. The strains which take the popular ear will repeat themselves in this new work, I am expecting. It will be the expression of America in all her social, economic and artistic life and will be another step and another contribution to the great musical productions.

"It will symbolize America, just as Russian music symbolizes Russia, and Italian, Italy.

"The music of the negroes is so entrancing," said the Maestro. "I like to hear it so much. I think it, too, will have its part in the musical achievements of America." Ragtime, he said, too would have its great part in American productions.

### Desings Medal for American Troops

Rome, July 11.—Dora Ohlfsen, designer of the Anzac medal, has produced in her Rome studio, a new medal dedicated to the American air force. The face side consists of the head of an American aviator, the model for which had served in the American air-force operating on Italy's fronts, surrounded by an allegorical design

symbolical of America's will and power.

The reverse side of the medal is symbolical of the task America accomplished in transporting her fighting forces across the seas and bearing an inscription taken from President Wilson's message to Congress which reads:

"There is therefore but one response possible from us: Force, force, to the utmost; force, without stint or limit, the righteous and triumphant forces

which shall make right the law of the world, and cast every selfish dominion down in the dust."
