BELGIAN ORDERS TO UNITE IN CHECKING DUPLICATING FLAGS

Intense Indignation Over Plans of Germans to Use the Same Colors.

Brussels, June 20. (By Mail) Belgian patriotic societies are forming to take action to prevent the German republic from adopting the Belgian national colors—black, yellow and red—for its flag. Intense indignation is manifested and this is a bit heightened by the plea that the colors in the new German emblem will be disposed of horizontally instead of vertically.

It is generally supposed that the Belgian colors of today were chosen by the patriots of 1830, but the revolutionists of that year merely took for themselves the black, yellow and red which had been legendary in Flanders and the Brabant since the Middle Ages.

Dates Back Many Years

The princes of Flanders bore on their arms a black lion on a field of gold, and those of Brabant a golden lion on a field of black. The trappings of both were red. From the thirteenth century, therefore the Belgian colors have been black, yellow and red.

An argument against the use of the colors by Germans is that the Belgians have actually employed the black, yellow and red horizontally in their emblems—notably in their mercantile flags—so they consider they still have a priority on that disposition of the colors as well as the vertical use.

The horizontal bars were adopted by the patriots who overthrew the Austrians in 1789. In 1830, the first flag to fly from the Hotel de Ville in Brussels was the horizontal-barred flag, yellow and red.

The Belgians scorn the plea of the Germans that they have the right to use the colors because of their use by the ancient Germanic Empire, of which Austria was the center. They assert that the confusion resulting from the employment by Germany as well as Belgium of the black, yellow and red would be embarrassing to the nation which had fought four years to keep its colors unsoiled.

SERBIA IS INVADED BY TEUTONS, TELLS BELGRADE VISITOR

Serbia Flooded With Cheap Hun Goods; Belgrade Is Bitter Toward Austrian.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)

Belgrade, May 10. (By Mail).—The German and Austrian peaceful infiltration of Serbia has begun. The hotels of this city harbor guests whose identity is revealed by their heavy Teutonic cast of features. They talk in German and laugh loudly over their beer. Indeed if one does not speak German in Belgrade one sometimes finds himself misunderstood. The waiters do not know English or French in the majority of cases.

"My friends in Basle told me I would be modded in Belgrade if I spoke German there," declared a self-styled Swiss salesman. "However, I found that when I spoke Italian I was treated with disrespect, that when I spoke French I was ignored and that when I spoke English I was smilingly but politely told, in German, that I could be best served by speaking the tongue I know best."

"Made in Austria."

Serbia from one end of the country to the other has been flooded with cheap Austrian and German goods. How they got in one cannot learn but every shop window in the villages from Uskub to Semendria contains cheap mirrors, toilet articles, knives and grimecracks of every description "made in Austria." Many of the articles are backed with colored pictures under celluloid of the former Austrian and German emperors in all their regalia. There seems to be little prejudice against German and Austrian goods among the peasants and village dwellers of Serbia.

The Serbian hates the Bulgarian as venomously as ever but he does not sing a morning hymn of hate against Germany or Austria. The country is flooded with pictures of atrocities committed by Bulgarians upon Serbians. The former Emperor Charles' picture still adorns the local police headquarters.

Homes Systematically Robbed.

In Belgrade there is bitterness against the Austrians, especially among the better class of people whose homes were systematically despoiled by Austrian officers who shipped sixty trains of household goods from Belgrade across the Danube into Austria. Each train was composed of approximately thirty cars. Three hundred pianos were included in the loot. Belgrade and northern Serbia are flooded with the depreciated Austrian currency, in fact there apparently is more Austrian money in circulation than Serbian.

The American Red Cross employs a number of German prisoners in transporting its supplies. They are better clothed than many Serb soldiers and go about the streets laughing and joking and in general quite at home.

The American Red Cross has for its warehouse the Palace Hotel which, just finished before the war, was intended to be the best hotel in Belgrade. When the Austrians entered the town, however, they deliberately smashed the plateglass mirrors, marble wainscoting and stabled their horses in the drawing room and dining saloon. The woodwork was torn out for firewood and the mahogany furniture wantonly hacked with axes.

Red Cross Big Aid.

Major G. H. Edwards of Orlando, Fla., who has been in charge of the American Red Cross work in northern Serbia distributed help to local orphanages and hospitals, started workrooms for needy women, gave out supplies to hospitals and has equipped medical staffs which travel through northern Serbia.

NOT GERMAN BUT AMERICA BEST FOR STUDY, SAY JAPS

Tokyo, July 15.—A committee to encourage postgraduate study on the part of Japanese students in American scientific institutions has been formed here. That Japanese medical students should go to the United States instead of Germany is one of the ideas behind the project.

Dr. R. B. Teusler, head of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, and now Red Cross Commissioner to Siberia, is one of the originators of the plan. The American Committee to handle the question has already been formed.

McINNIS ONE OF BASEBALL'S WONDER MEN NOT BUILT ACCORDING TO STANDARD



Nifty First Baseman of Boston Red Sox.

John (Stuffy) McInnis, first baseman of the world's champion Boston Red Sox, has been for many years now past one of the striking wonders of the game. If one were looking for a first baseman among a crowd of unformed men on the bench McInnis is about the very last man he would suspect of class for the position. Physically he is a living refutation, in appearance, of everything a good first sacker is supposed to be in these times of highly developed specialities. To begin with he is a chunky looking fellow who belies his five feet ten inches. He is somewhat deliberate of action off the field. His arms are short and he does not appear possessed of the reach or "stretch" which has come to be associated with the first base type. He is a right-handed thrower in a day when southpaws are in demand for the position.

Class of First Basemen.
Yet McInnis comes very near to being the class of first basemen of the American League, a circuit which boasts of a number of rare professionals of exceptional merit, Wally Pipp and George Sisler among them, the last two mentioned of the southpaw variety of course.

To begin with McInnis is one of the niftiest and surest infielders of the game, for if he lacks any way in physical handicaps he more than makes up for the deficiency in agility. And if he fumbles a wild throw now and then that a bigger man—a Chase or a Pipp—might get he more than makes up the difference in the deadly punch he carries at bat. For McInnis is a .300 hitter in every accepted sense of the word.

In the last nine campaigns, since he first gained recognition as a regular player in fast company, McInnis has failed but twice to bat better than .300. His successful campaign last season with the world's champions witnessed his lightest hitting performance. He batted only .272 in Boston. Once before, only, he failed to qualify in the charmed circle. That was in 1916. He clubbed for .295 that year as a member of the Athletics. But it was only a remnant of the old machine with which Connie Mack had won four championships and three world championships. McInnis at the time was the sole survivor of the illustrious "hundred thousand dollar infield."

Best Hitting Year.
In 1912, the year Jake Stahl's Red Sox nosed out the Athletics, McInnis had his best hitting year, a .327, and that year, too, he stole the most bases, 27. The next year, when the Quakers beat the Giants for the second time in the world's series, McInnis hit .326. In 1911 he clubbed .321. He hit .314 in each of the seasons of 1914 and 1915, and .303 in 1917, his last year with the Athletics. It can be seen, then, that Stuffy is a consistent as well as a brilliant hitter.

McInnis was one of many brilliant phenoms unearthed and schooled by Connie Mack for the purpose of reconstruction after his great team of 1905—which was beaten by McGraw's Giants in the world's series—had gone to seed. The list included such other illustrious personages as "Home Run" Baker, Jack Barry and Eddie Collins, all of them still in the game and going strong as ever, apparently.

HOW SISLER LEARNED TO PLAY INITIAL BAG

"Pitching came natural to me; batting, too; but I was positive that first base would not be so easy. I didn't ask many questions; simply watched the other fellows in the league. I thought if I could catch them with one hand like Stuffy McInnis I'd be satisfied. I saw how Walter Pipp shifted his feet and stretched for yards, and I saw how Chic Gandil went in the dirt for the low throws. McInnis, Pipp and Gandil taught me how to play first base. I studied them and used them for my teachers.
