

NO TRACE OF MISSING BODIES

ABANDON HOPE FOR LOCATING LOST HUNTERS

Men About Given up as Drowned; Searching Party Continues.

Hundred Men, Boats, Lights and Equipment Being Used in Water Search.

BULLETIN 4:15 RAPID RIVER (Special)—No success has been attached to the search for the bodies of the two missing hunters up to this time.

Hope for the safety of John Knutsen and Leo Vanterberghs has been abandoned. Every indication now points to the fact that the two men who went duck-hunting Tuesday morning have been drowned.

A searching party equipped with flash lights, drag nets, grappling hooks and gasoline boats is working to every ounce of efficiency in hopes of finding some trace of the lost men.

This morning the party led by prominent business men and members of the Elks club set out early in order to be on the scene as soon as it was light enough to start work.

Efforts were made to secure a current chart from the weather bureau department but none was available. The water is deep in some places and shallow in others—extending to fishermen and hunters who are familiar with the place.

When the searchers arrived at the bay this morning a thin sheet of ice was in evidence. This was easily broken and the boats set in the water. Several charges of dynamite were thrown into the water in hopes of bringing the bodies to the surface.

It is in that they were clad in heavy clothing and wore hip boots which are also exceedingly cumbersome. It is believed their chances of being saved were few.

Many predict that with the cold weather getting a stronger hold each night the water will freeze thus making impossible to conduct the search much longer.

Searchers working on the bay have been provided with warm clothing and food to guarantee their endurance until they return.

No death, no accident or mishap in years has affected the people of Escanaba to the extent of this one. Both Mr. Knutsen and Mr. Vanterberghs were held in the highest esteem in the community and were active in many branches of industry and civic advancement.

Both are married and have families who sit anxiously awaiting news word of their lost sons and fathers.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING
The fact that a person has a well-trained mind after the ways of old-time education, does not prove that he can go into a factory or on a farm. The world has millions of people whose brains are educated beyond their hands. They feel their mental powers are such that they will enable them to get results comparing with their general intelligence. Some people become dissatisfied with their jobs because they feel they are getting results below their abilities.
The majority of people leave in the by performing some mechanical process with their hands, or directing others who perform it. These people need to learn precise observation of the physical condition of the object they handle, to manipulate tools with delicacy and precision, and to perform processes quickly, neatly and accurately.
Millions of people are given a training of mental faculties that they can use in daily work, while mechanical facilities on which their whole life career depends, are left undeveloped.
Some people say the business of the school is to train the mind only, and that the development of the mechanical faculties should be left to the student that young people get when they begin work in shops and farms. But training given in that way is completely superficial, and does not give general all-around mechanical skill and habit, or high standards of work. Many have too much of other minds to perform thoroughly the functions of a teacher.
Perception of the truth that training of the mechanical faculties is just as important for the average person as training of mental faculties, has led to a demand for vocational and technical education.

FARMERS WORKING FOR CO-OPERATION

Thousands of Agricultural Men Strive to Better Conditions Thereby.

COLUMBIUS, Dec. 15.—Thousands of Ohio farmers, cooperating in one organization of The Farmers' Commercial Service Company—have placed the buying of practically all supplies needed in farm operation, on the same basis as large manufacturing plants, by employing a highly trained purchasing agent.

"We are cooperating with 412 farmers' cooperative grain elevators and other farm organizations, whose membership while not exactly known runs into thousands," said Fred G. Greene, purchasing agent for the Farmers' Commercial Service company, with an office here. "Thousands of dollars have been saved during the last six months by farmers in northeastern and central Ohio.

"Farmers list their wants with their cooperative elevators, whose managers forward the equivalent orders of farmers to us. With many orders coming in daily, we are able to purchase large quantities of each article, thereby securing it at considerably less than the market price and often less than the wholesale figure."

"Beside securing supplies at the lowest possible cost, occasionally a farmer or farm organization will ask us to assist in disposing of a quantity of grain or produce, which we gladly do," Mr. Greene stated.

"At the end of the year, after all cooperative expenses have been paid, any surplus will be prorated among stock holders on a patronage basis," continued Mr. Greene. "Elevators and organizations which bought heavily of supplies during the year will receive a greater surplus dividend than others whose purchases were less. Cooperative elevators upon receiving this surplus dividend may divide it among their constituents, or retain it in the treasury, just as they wish," he explained.

"The company maintains itself," he said, "by adding a small commission to the best price or deducting it from the selling price, as the case may be."

"An organization or cooperative elevator is not compelled to hold stock in the company in order to secure sup-

plies. However, indications point that shareholding organizations will receive their supplies at less cost because of the prorated surplus dividend.

"We are growing by leaps and bounds and I predict that within a few years similar companies will be working to the farmer's interest in every state, with a national cooperating organization working with them," Mr. Greene declared.

America Minister Says Italy Showing Speed in Building

ROME, Dec. 16.—The American Ambassador, Robert Underwood Johnson

who has returned from a visit to the Triavi, Isonzo and Asiago sectors of the Italian war front, including much of the devastated region, declares that the Italians are progressing well in their efforts to make these war areas again fit for habitation.

"I don't doubt whether any other region of the war would make a better showing of recuperation," said Mr. Johnson to The Associated Press correspondent.

"In April I saw the devastated regions of France from Chateau Thierry to Rheims, an awful sight which may be commended to those who are willing to take the risk of another great war. Save for a few barracks and isolated pieces of repair little had been done to rebuild."

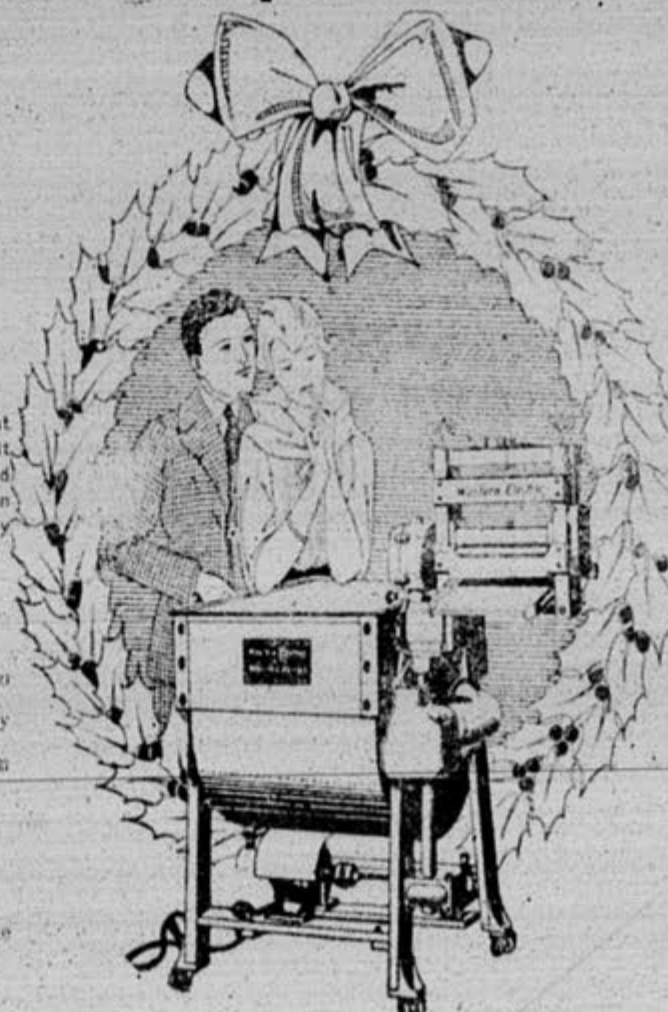
