

FIND VANLERBERGHE'S BODY

PROVIDE MEANS OF PREVENTING MORE DISEASES

Escanaba Will Have Clinic in Connection With State Health Board.

As soon as possible Escanaba will be protected against the further spread of several diseases by a clinic which will be held in the city on Monday morning at a conference between Mayor J. E. Pray, Dr. H. J. DeMet and W. H. Fraser, representative of the Michigan state board of health.

Under the plan adopted this morning the city will have one clinic for the treatment of many of these cases which have caused the state such heavy expense and increased the death rate and sick lists considerably in recent years.

Because of the exorbitant cost of transporting patients to an certain point in the state, the board of health has acted to meet the emergency.

Last spring Mr. Fraser who is well known here because of the eminent manner in which he overcame the influenza work in the upper peninsula a year or two previous, came to Escanaba and offered the city a proposition which was then rejected.

It had been planned to have hospital treatment in several cities of the peninsula. Escanaba was to provide rooms and equipment in a local institution for the treatment of the disease in question. The proposal was turned down by local officials, because of the shortage of hospital space in which to conduct the work. Mr. Fraser since that time has worked out another plan.

Plan was Rejected
Last spring, it was proposed that Escanaba, Iron Mountain, Ishpeming and Marquette be designated as central places of the upper state and in those four cities all cases were to be treated. The plan here was abandoned because of the reasons stated in a foregoing paragraph.

At this morning's conference Mr. Fraser proposed that The Home Clinic be established. Under the plan the city health department will be in charge. Because of the inability of some persons suffering from the disease to pay their doctor fees, the state has decided to assume the responsibility.

Any person affected will have the privilege of going to the health office, if it is found that the individual is not able to defray any expense of treatment, the clinic will care for this and provide all treatment.

When it is found that cases arise where the individual is able to pay the expense of treatment, the person will be referred back to the family physician with orders that care be given at once.

The San. Ishpeming, Marquette, Ironwood, Iron Mountain, Houghton, and Menominee have been listed as places where the clinics will be established. Each city will care for its own cases.

Cost Provided For
Ishpeming has also given consideration to the proposal and indicates favorable action. Escanaba has already accepted the plan and other cities, it is believed, will follow suit.

The state will provide between \$300 and \$400 worth of equipment to be used and will pay as high as \$50 a month depending on the number of cases attended.

The plan will be put into effect as soon as the health representative returns to the state capital and makes provision for the shipment of the material and equipment can be made effective.

Mr. Fraser returned to Marquette this afternoon where he will take the matter up with authorities in that city.

ARSONISTS SET MORE FIRES TO EASTERN HOMES

PAYETTE, Penn., Dec. 20.—The "fire bug" operation which has been going on in Fayette and Westmoreland counties for the past six months broke out again this morning when arsonists set fire to a large barn and two residences. The barn was destroyed with a loss of \$60,000 but the houses were saved. Loss from fires in the two counties so far have been estimated at approximately half a million dollars.

The barn which belonged to Andrew Brown, president of the Fayette National Bank burned so fast that the flames of the Charlotte fire department, which was called was of no avail.

The fire fighters were unable to get to the scene in time to check the rapidly spreading flames. Besides the building, grain, cows, horses and large amounts of supplies and farm implements were destroyed.

The other fires broke out later in the residential district. The first home to get the effects of the flames was that of George Stark but it was put out with little damage resulting.

The home of Fred Dwyer a member of the city council was then burned. This also was checked before the damage grew to any great extent. State troopers were called from the city Saturday leaving the community without any extra protection which has been afforded them for a long time.

From nearby cities so the other fire departments had to stop and make their way clear before being able to proceed and give the aid which was badly needed.

Constantine's Return Nearly Like Napoleon

ATHENS, Greece, Dec. 20.— Amid the roar and the hum of airplanes and the cheer of throngs, Constantine of Greece returned today to his native land after a long absence. He was hailed as the hero and friend of the people at home.

Immediately after alighting from the carriage in which he was driven, he came to the hospital where services were held and the great return celebration conducted. It was noticeable that none of the foreign ministers of the other countries, who were present at the arrival of the king. The return was not marked by any incidents except those which were planned for the occasion.

The arrival of the royal train was greeted at the Place de la Concorde. The royal car stopped at the station and the king stepped out. Constantine was escorted by a rifle squad who were dressed in purple. To the rear was the royal guard corps in full military attire. A detachment of the government forces was at hand awaiting the arrival of the head of the government.

Long before the time the train drew into the little terminal, a large crowd was gathered.

Among the members of the welcoming party was Mother Orla.

An officer of Constantine emerged from the royal train. Mother Orla walked up to him and he embraced her. Tears could be seen in his eyes as he spoke to the people saying:

"Be with my children. Be with hands with the others of the party and entered the carriage and was taken to the Cathedral.

PARENTS DENY CLARA SKIPPED

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Smith Give Statement to Reporter This Morning.

LE PASEO, Dec. 20.—Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Smith, mother and father of Clara Barton Smith, wanted in connection with the shooting of John L. Hanson, national committeeman in Ardmore, Oklahoma, said they had heard from their daughter and that she desired to give herself up to face the charge of murder which the Oklahoma authorities hold against her for the death of the millionaire of Ardmore.

The parents did not say where Clara was but that attorneys had arranged for her return and they had started making preparations for her trial. The denial of the report that she had been hiding in Oklahoma but said they expected to hear from her in El Paso.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Smith called a local reporter to their home this morning saying they desired to make a statement regarding the disappearance of their daughter and the charges which have been pending since the case was first put before the public.

Their statement:

The newspapers have been full of lies about the case and we deny all reports which have been checked and found false. There is nothing more to do so we have decided to let it go. Some of the news that was printed in papers gave all the same of the papers maliciously published these lies to make a look more sensational. It would have been a sensational had they tried to tear the truth and published the facts.

Her disappearance is another of these mysterious news which Clara has committed before. She went away not to escape justice but to keep away from the notoriety. She does not like publicity. We are sure that she will come back when the time comes here because we know she is innocent.

"We do not know where she is. In a short time she will come back and tell the full truth. Some scandal has been raised and that is one of the reasons Clara has kept out of the way of newspapers."

Hunter Shot Near Powers; Dies Here At Hospital Today

Another hunting tragedy occurred Monday morning in the death of a local hunter at a hospital of Nicholas Lauerman, Nadeau, Mich.

Lauerman was seriously injured Sunday morning when buckshot accidentally discharged from the gun of a friend with whom he was hunting near Spalding struck him about the neck and shoulders.

He was rushed to Powers where first aid was given by Dr. Whitfield. He was brought to Escanaba Sunday afternoon. His condition gradually became worse, resulting in death at 10 o'clock Monday morning.

Lauerman is thirty-two years old. He is survived by his wife and two children. His mother, Mrs. Lauerman a brother and three sisters, live at Marquette.

The body was taken to the Alto undertaking parlors. It will be shipped Tuesday morning to the home town of the deceased. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

WHITEFISH BAY GIVES UP SECOND CORPSE; G. LeMIRE TAKES IT OUT OF WATER

Little Difficulty Encountered in Locating Remains of Leo Vanlerberghe After Knutsen Body Was Found; Taken From Scene of Death at 8:40 Yesterday Morning; Funerals Will Be Held Wednesday Afternoon.

Five days from the time John Knutsen and Leo Vanlerberghe left Escanaba to go on a duck hunting trip, the last of the two bodies, that of Vanlerberghe, was taken from the icy waters of Whitefish Bay.

Sunday morning at 8:45, after the second hole had been chopped in the ice, George Lemire, 420 S. 9th street, pulled the corpse of the second member of the hunting party to the surface of the bay, thus bringing to an end the intriguing search for the two bodies.

A party of Escanaba and Gladstone people left here early Sunday morning, arriving at the bay close to 8 o'clock. Plans were made for the day's search and work started.

Mr. Lemire with his pole and net went to the scene of the first recovery and there cut a hole through the ice. He searched for a few minutes but to no avail. Leaving there he cut a second hole not more than fifteen or twenty feet from the spot in which the Knutsen body was found. Working for only a few minutes he caught the end of the end of his pole and single handed lifted it to the ice.

It was laden with clothing and wading boots and was made exceedingly heavy by the many gun shells which were contained in his coat pockets.

The surprise attached to the finding of the second body was no more as great as when the corpse of his friend was taken from the icy bay.

Were all Optimistic
Searchers expected to locate the second body without any considerable trouble.

According to members of the party who spoke of the work this morning, the water where the two boys were not more than two feet deep. There were logs and "dead heads" in the bottom making it difficult to see what lay on the bottom of the bay.

Leisner Tell Story
Tietman father this morning gave a clear description of the finding of the body of Mr. Knutsen Saturday afternoon.

"After prodding around in several places," he said, "I chopped another hole where I believed it might be found. I placed my pole into the water and could feel logs and dead wood on the bottom. After prying around for a few minutes I struck the pole into something that seemed to be too soft for wood. It appeared to me that I had the body. I pried back and forth for a time trying to get the form loose.

"When I felt more certain that I had the body on my pole, I caught a better hold and got down on my hands and knees to get more leverage. I pulled the pole and then reached into the water. I caught hold of the coat and called the other boys to come and help me.

"Because of the thin ice we were forced to take all precaution lest others go into the water. We placed a rope under the arm pits and then chopped a larger hole in the ice to afford better chance to raise the body. This completed, we carried planks to the hole and took the body out."

"It must have weighed all of 400 pounds. The clothing was so wet and heavy that we could hardly get the body out of the water.

"I arrived at the bay this morning just a few minutes after the Vanlerberghe body was recovered and did not have an opportunity to view it. I understand however that the success was gained without as much trouble as we had the day before. I'm glad they were successful," he declared.

Remains of Pouch From Mail Trains Found at the Bay

The bag was taken from the train in a robbery which is said to have been caused by the shortage of men on the train crew, 699 being going to Channing and Calumet were left when the pouch was stolen. The letters were of no value, postal Inspector George Atlebach stated this morning. The inspector refused to say whether or not any arrests had been made in connection with the case.

Jackson Inmates Have Examination

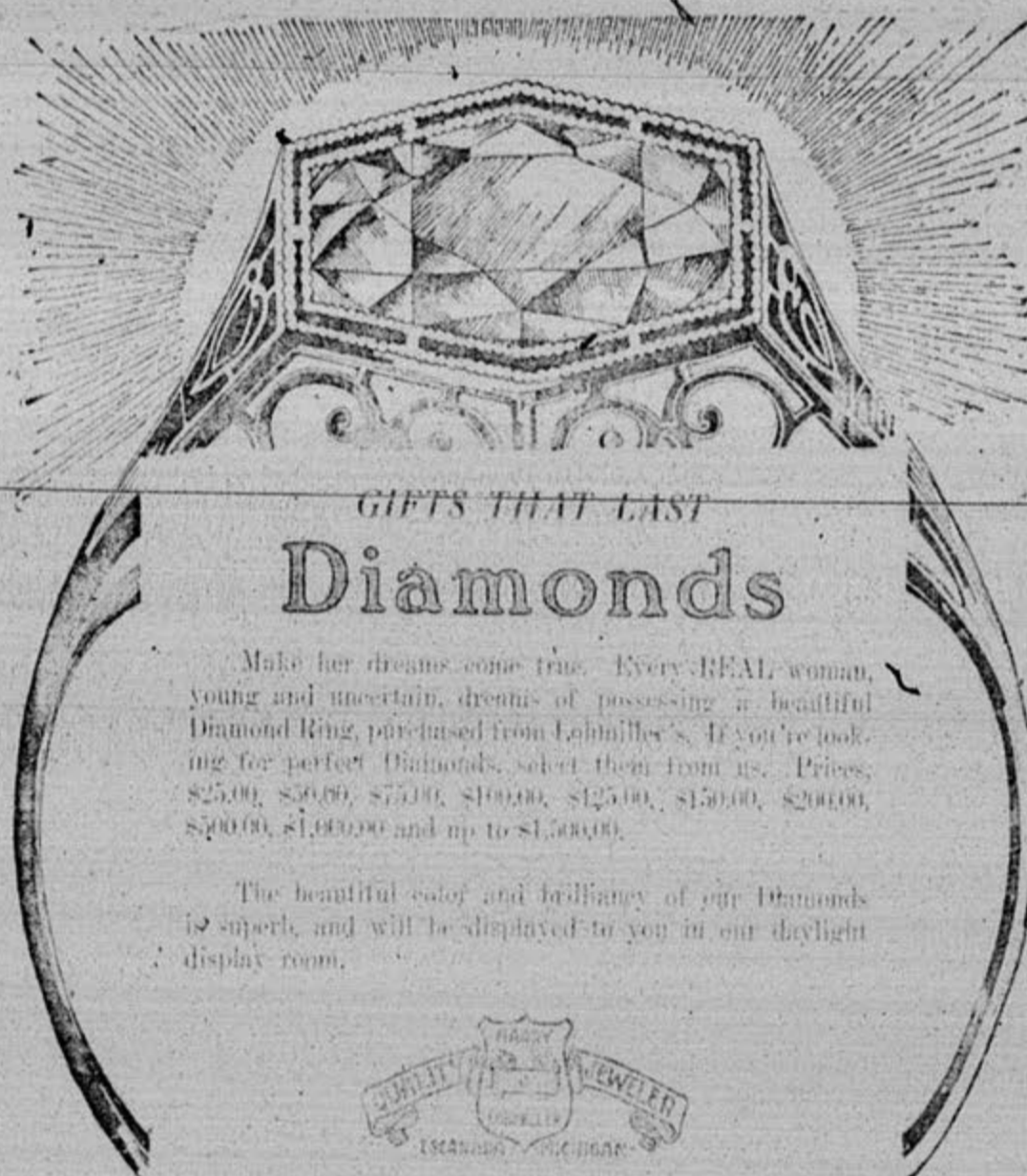

GROESBECK PLANS SIMPLE CEREMONY

No Outward Showing Will Be Made When New Governor Takes Office.

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 20.—Simple dignity will mark the inaugural ceremony of Governor Groesbeck at noon today in the state capitol building. The ceremony will be held in the hall of the state house. There will be no pomp, pageantry and probably no inaugural ball, the actual reception being held in the hall of the state house. In accordance with the Groesbeck wishes no attempt will be made to elate the ceremony with musical splendor.

Gov. John H. Sweeney, who will leave his post as the Michigan governor tonight on the same day, will administer the oath to the new governor and other guests at the inaugural ceremony. There will be the usual inaugural talk, probably very brief, and some musical numbers.

Five Will Take Oaths. It will be in the room of future legislative bodies that Governor Albert E. Steger, will administer his duties as chief executive to make room for Governor-elect Groesbeck.

The committee on arrangements announced yesterday other state officials to meet the coming of the new State. Charles J. DeLeon of Jackson, who succeeds Coleman C. Vaughn of St. Ignace, the latter retiring from public life after six years as head of the department of state. State Treasurer Frank H. Gorman, who succeeds himself, Meritt Wiley, of Sault Ste. Marie, who will become attorney general, succeeding Groesbeck and Auditor General Fuller.

One of the principals will remain in his seventh consecutive inauguration, namely, Auditor General Fuller, who is beginning his thirteenth year in this capacity. While confined to a wheel chair, this affliction does not hamper his ability to efficiently exercise his duties as the faithful of the Michigan Treasury.

Reception Deferred. The customary reception in which the general public comes to the capital to meet the new governor and state officers, and which really consists of an endless round of handshakes, will be deferred until the convening of the new legislature. It is anticipated.

The legislature is scheduled to meet on the first Wednesday of the new year in this instance, January 2. The exact date for the reception has not been set, but it is expected that simplicity that marks the inauguration also will dominate the night of the reception.

Great Lakes Toll Compiled for Year

One hundred and thirty-two wrecks and other marine casualties involving a loss of life of 89 persons and a property loss of \$2,300,850 occurred on the Great Lakes during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1920, says the annual report of Commissioner W. E. Reynolds of the coast guard service.

Six of the accidents were fatal, 16 stranding, 16 collisions, and 19 were attributed to miscellaneous causes.

The total property involved amounted to \$3,872,412 and the property aboard the vessels numbered 4,462, of whom 2,231 were members of crews.

The total tonnage of the vessels was 297,585 tons, more than three times the tonnage involved in similar casualties on the Pacific coast.

Marinette Basket Men Win First at Home City Friday

The Marinette high school basketball quintet won their second victory and game of the season last night at the Marinette high school gymnasium, when they beat the Antigo visitors, who at one time had the score down to 23 to 12, but near the end of the match Antigo rolled up three more points in their favor.

Little has been said about the Marinette basketball squad this season, as it is said to be a new machine. From their start it appears, however, that they will be a formidable contender for the inter-school honors before the close of the season.

Prehistoric Grave Unearthed in Land

In one of the graves the excavators found six black mugs and one red mug with white stripes filled with clay and ashes. Among the remains were some glittering substances which the investigators believe once had been adorns of prehistoric men and women.

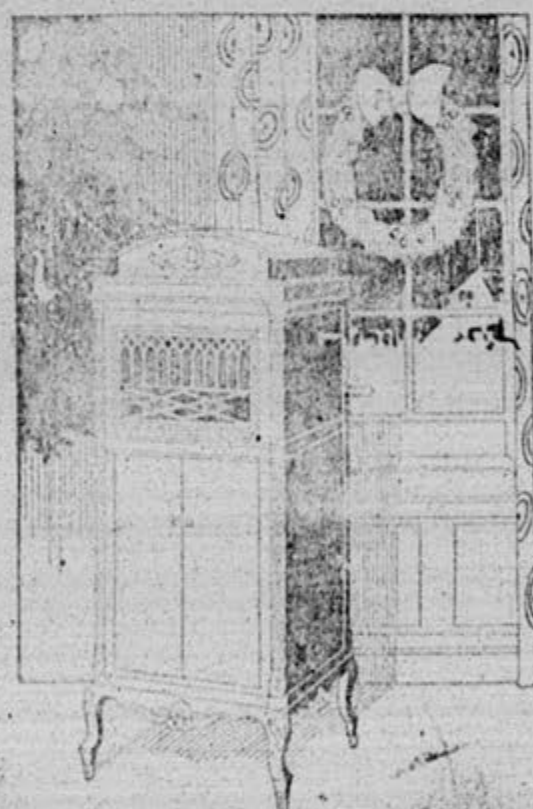

HEALTH ADVICE

Conducted Under Direction of United States Public Health Service.

LUNG TROUBLE

Q. I have been bothered with cough and heavy chest. Besides my cough, I feel pretty good. The cough is not very bad, it settled in my lungs. And will you tell me what is good to get my lungs cleared of that heavy stuff?

The Answer. A little consideration will show how impossible it is to give definite advice as to treatment. In every form of chronic cold, the patient should make sure that the trouble is not tuberculous. If the lungs are found not to be involved, the examination should be directed to the condition of the nose and throat, for that is often the cause of such symptoms.

SKIN TROUBLES.

Q. Have always been troubled with very dry, scaly skin, and eczema about the nipple and leg, and one place on the back. The itching is intense. Please tell me what to do.

The Answer. This affection is quite freely due to some article of diet which caused the peculiar skin reaction. Usually the food substance is some form of "protein" which in general terms, is represented by the white of an egg or lean meat. Since there are many other articles of food which contain protein, it requires a very careful diet and the employment of special methods to determine the type responsible for the eczema.

There is another type of eczema which is of a nervous origin. The patient should lead a regular life, avoid undue excitement and over-fatigue, take plenty of sleep, with the windows open; partake of an abundance of plain, wholesome food, avoid fried foods, pastries and sweets. Pay due attention to condition of the bowels. Drink plenty of water, eat fruit and one or two green vegetables every day.

"MALOCCLUSION"

Q. I have what you called "malocclusion." My jaws are very narrow and the roof of the palate is highly arched. If the adenoids are removed will the jaws grow back to normal again? I am 17 years of age.

The Answer. At your age there is little hope of the "jaws growing back to normal again," even if adenoids are removed. However, it may be that a dentist who makes a specialty of this kind of work (an orthodontist) might still be able to do a great deal towards correcting the condition.

Devastation For the Western Wood

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Forests east of the Rocky Mountains are being devastated so rapidly by cutting and logging that the nation soon will be faced with the bulk of its own supply of lumber. Upon the forests of the Pacific Coast, William H. Greeley, United States forest ranger, in his annual report made public today...

Two-thirds of the original forests of the United States have been cut out, or burnt and three-fifths of their merchantable timber is gone, said Mr. Greeley. The country is taking about 26,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood annually from its forests and is growing about 6,000,000,000 cubic feet. We are cutting timber of every class even trees too small for the sawmill, much faster than they are being replaced in our forests. There are still large quantities of timber in the United States, but they are not in the right place. Sixty-one per cent of what is left lies west of the Great Plains, far from the bulk of our population, agriculture and manufactures. The exhaustion of one forested section after another in the Eastern States has been reflected in rising transportation costs. The distance between the average saw mill and the average home builder is steadily increasing, and we shall soon be dependent for the bulk of our construction lumber upon the forests of the Pacific Coast. These conditions have had a vital bearing upon the high cost of lumber, which during the year, reached a prohibitive figure for many uses and checked the building of homes which is so urgently needed.
