

# MRS. KABER TELLS OF HUSBAND'S DEATH

## "THOUSAND OR A MILLION" HE DIDN'T KNOW

### Eight or Nine Piles of Money Were in the Newberry Headquarters.

#### Roger M. Andrews Appears Before Investigating Committee in Washington Today.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Roman F. Glochek a witness before the senatorial committee which is investigating the indictment made by Henry Ford against Truman C. Newberry, said he saw eight or nine piles of currency, in ten, twenty and fifty dollar bills in the Newberry campaign headquarters in the 1918 election.

"I said before the grand jury," the witness testified, "that I could not tell whether the amount was a thousand or a million."

Continuing he stated, "The money was stacked about a quarter of an inch deep." Further along Glochek admitted that he had received \$300 salary and expenses for campaigning among the Polish voters.

Roger M. Andrews of the Menominee Herald-Leader told the committee this morning that he had urged Senator Newberry to enter the campaign and made the local fight for his interest.

William Connelly of Grand Haven said he received \$1200 for campaign work and expenses but only reported \$200 as his receipts.

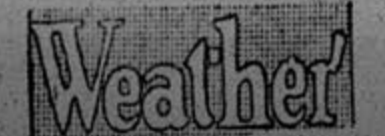

## HOME BREWERS IN WISCONSIN OUT OF LUCK

### Governor Enforcement Bill Prevents Making "Suds" at Home.

#### Amendment Offered Before Bill was Voted Upon Crossed Out Permission to Make Your Own.

MADISON, Wis., June 10.—The Illinois enforcement prohibition bill was passed in the senate today by a vote of twenty to ten, after an amendment had been added striking out the words, "permitting the manufacture of home brew for home consumption." The vote voted against this amendment after it had been scratched out. An amendment was also adopted which prohibits children under 21 years of age from obtaining liquor on prescriptions unless they are obtained from the parents or guardian and upon the affidavit of a physician that the liquor is necessary for the health of the child.

## THOUSANDS GO TO MEET BODY OF COMMANDER

### Funeral of Late Colonel Galbraith Will Be Held Saturday Afternoon in Cincinnati.

As the first warrant served on Thomas Morgan after he was found not guilty of the charge of stealing a large amount of automobile tires was not sufficient to hold him until extradition papers would be secured, a warrant was issued by Judge C. In all probabilities he will be released on bonds to await extradition if the court decides to hold him.

## LOAFING KILLS WHILE WORKING PROLONGS LIFE

### British Manufacturer Says It Is Hustling That Promotes Old Age.

LONDON. Lord Leverhulme, one of Great Britain's largest manufacturers, asserts that more people shorten their lives by dawdling in England than by hustling. He is a living proof that hustling promotes hale old age. He has always led the strenuous life and at 70 is still going strong.

He presided at the annual meeting of the British Industrial Safety First Association the other day. In his address he drew largely upon his American experience. Steps had been taken, he said, to ascertain whether it was the hustling, bustling business man who was supposed to shorten his days, or the man who crawled and dawdled through life.

He declared there were men in the United States today of 80, 90 and 100 years of age who were still in good health and actively engaged in business, whereas men who had retired early from business had shortened their lives thereby.

## HIRED TWO MEN AS 'GHOSTS' TO FRIGHTEN HIM

### Husband Attacked Men and Was Stabbed to Death in Struggle.

#### Mrs. Kaber Is Being Returned to Cleveland From New York; Daughter Accompanies Her.

NEW YORK, June 10.—Jan F. Kaber a wealthy Lakewood, Ohio publisher, who had been engaged by Mrs. Kaber to pose as spirits into frightening him into a better attitude toward her, according to a statement which the New York World published today, also stating that the Chief of Police Carlensen of Lakewood, obtained a confession from Mrs. Kaber.

The newspaper says according to the police chief, Mrs. Kaber contacted a medium for advice as to how to change her husband's attitude toward her.

By advice of this medium Mrs. Kaber was to have employed two foreigners to appear at the bedside of her husband as ghosts in order to, as she expressed it, "try to shake a little civility into him."

Aroused from his sleep Mr. Kaber was alleged to have attacked the two men and to have been stabbed to death by them in the struggle.

According to the story published here this morning, Chief Christenson said Mrs. Kaber told him she had refused to pay the two foreigners when they reappeared after the funeral asserting they had not fulfilled the role of ghosts as she had intended, and that she would not involve herself by paying for murder.

Mrs. Kaber was then said to have fled to New York to escape the foreigners, without advising the Cleveland police for fear of involving herself.

It is said that Mrs. Kaber implicated her daughter as well as her aged mother Mrs. Rachel, who are now in jail on the charge of first degree murder.

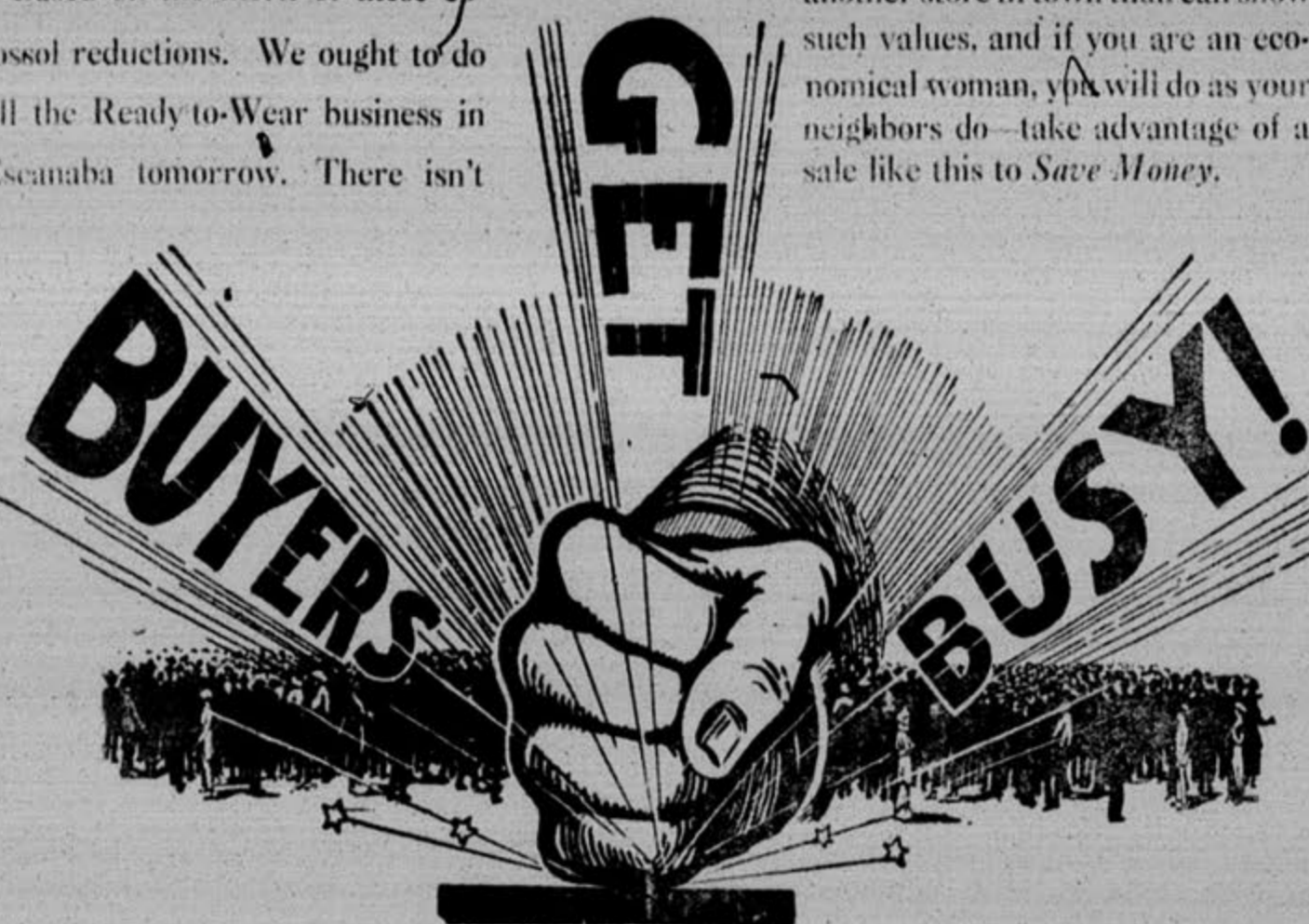
## Present Term of Court Ends Today

### NO STATISTICS ON ACCIDENTS

Not Positively Known How Many Workers Are Disabled Yearly.

### SHOULD HAVE ACCURATE DATA

Figures Would Show to What Extent Compensation Laws and the Safety Movement Have Mitigated Conditions in Industries.

It is not known how many industrial accidents occur yearly in the United States, says Margaret Gabley, writing in the Monthly Labor Review, published by the United States bureau of labor statistics, on "Inadequacy of Industrial Accident Statistics Published in State Reports."

"To what extent have workmen's compensation laws and the safety movement mitigated the accident evil in American industries? We are unable to determine with any degree of certainty. What are the causes of industrial accidents? What is the accident-frequency rate in the leading industries; the accident-severity rate? We do not know. Where can preventive measures be most effectively applied? It has never been adequately determined; there is no adequate comparable data.

"How many industrially disabled are there in the country who will be affected by the recent legislation extending the rehabilitation to the industrial cripple? No authoritative statistics are available. What is the annual loss in productive efficiency through industrial accidents? What is the annual cost in time and money lost through accidents in industry. We do not know; there are no figures available by which it can be determined.

"Accurate data as to the number of accidents, the causes, nature of injury and degree of disability of accidents occurring in each industry are essential for effective prevention work, as well as for the establishment of adequate and reasonable compensation insurance rates.

"Not only is there no uniform method of tabulating statistics of accidents for the entire country, but few states can be said to have accurate knowledge of the total number of accidents occurring within their borders.

**Want Wage Reduction in Indiana.** Recommendation that building craftsmen accept a reduction of from 15 to 20 per cent in wages was made by the general labor committee of the Associated Building Contractors of Indiana.

Charles J. Kern, president of the State Building Trades council, declared to the executive board of the council at a recent meeting held there was no justification for such a decrease. At the meeting, it was pointed out, some increases were recommended. J. H. Owens, secretary of the labor committee, said the proposed reductions would result in a decrease in building costs of from 5 to 10 per cent.

### TRADERS REACH OUTPOST FIRST TIME IN YEARS

It Has Been Four Years Since Outsider Visited Outpost in Alaska.

JUNEAU, Alaska, June 10.—Points more than 400 miles up the Kilyma river of northern Siberia, which had not been visited by traders for four years, were reached last summer by a

party of American traders, headed by Captain S. R. Gudmundson, master of the trader schooner Polar Bear, according word received here.

The Bear left Nome, Alaska, June 27, 1920, sailed around the Siberian coast and East Cape into the Arctic and arrived at the mouth of the Kolyma, August 4. The schooner was towed up the river 120 miles and anchored while the traders took a small boat 200 miles farther up.

"We were still 400 miles from the head of the river," Captain Gudmundson said in writing of his trip to a Juneau friend. "We found trading very good as no boat had visited that vicinity in four years, and we soon disposed of our wares and loaded up with goods of the country."

Last winter the Polar Bear and its company was frozen in at the mouth of the Kolyma, having failed in an at-

tempt to reach Nome before the ice came.

Her cargo of furs and ivory will be taken to Nome this spring and shipped out to Seattle.

### "Sidewalk Banquet" In Havana Proves Attractive to All

HAVANA, June 10.—A "sidewalk banquet" was one of the features of the post-inauguration ceremonies attended by President Alfred Zayas. It was given by an organization known as "The Boys of the Louvre Sidewalk," a group accustomed to meet daily under the portico in front of a building formerly occupied by the Hotel Louvre.

The hotel no longer exists, nor are

the members of the organization any longer boys, but they still gather at the old meeting place, which fronts on Central Park.

Since they come from among the best families of the capital, their influence is not inconsiderable, nor do they lack for publicity.

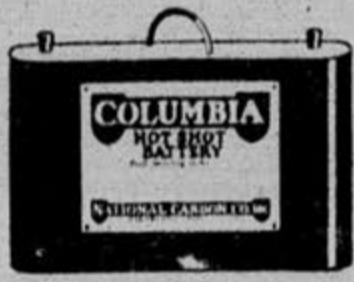

**IT TOOK AN ARMY  
TO PUT END TO A  
TOLEDO 'BAD MAN'**

Even the Fire Department Was  
Called Out to Help Dis-  
lodge Him.

Newspaper Men Get in House  
With Him and Cannot Get  
Out Because of Heavy  
Gun Fire.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)

TOLEDO, June 10.—Thomas Kelly, aged 48 years, of Oklahoma, was killed by the police this morning following a battle which lasted two hours and in which machine guns and hand grenades were brought into use, to dislodge him from his barricaded room in the attic of his boarding house at 612 Baldwin street.

Two policemen were shot to death by Kelly who barricaded himself in the dwelling. Urgent calls for the police reserves were received in the central police station and all detectives and patrol men were rushed to the scene.

At 10:15 a. m. the chief of police ordered two machine guns and a high-pressure fire hose to the scene of the battle and an attempt was made to crash in the walls of the house with the high pressure hose. Attempts were also made to drive the man from his barricade by the use of sulphur candles burned on the lower floor.

The trouble started when the man refused to pay his room rent and drew a gun on the son of his landlady. The police were then called and hundreds of shots were exchanged between the policemen and the solitary gunman. At 10:40 the roof of the house was being demolished by machine guns and hand grenades.

Two newspaper reporters who entered the house shortly before the machine guns were put into action were obliged to remain inside and took advantage of their position by using the telephone to advise their papers how the battle was progressing.

A shell from one of Admiral Dewey's guns, after lying for twenty-two years in a vacant lot in Manila, exploded when a lad picked it up and hurled against a rock. The concussion knocked three boys to the ground and painfully injured them.

In sympathy with the striking seamen the Norwegian National Federation of Trade Unions declared a strike of all its members except railway men, firemen and hospital workers, beginning May 26. One hundred and twenty thousand persons are affected. Approximately 80 per cent of the car men employed by the Detroit United Railway in Detroit, Port Huron, Flint, Ann Arbor, Pontiac and Mount Clemens voted to accept a wage reduction. The new scale will be 55, 68 and 89 cents an hour. The men have been receiving 70, 73 and 75 cents.

In the meantime the activity at Fort McMurray and Peace River crossing is growing in intensity daily. Every train to the north is crowded and travelers from both points say that accommodations are at a premium. One party leaving here for Fort McMurray took along their own bedding and shelter tents, reports being that they would be unable to obtain them on arrival. River craft are taking the water daily at both these points. That dominion authorities anticipate some difficulty with parties of "cheebogs" or newcomers in the country is evident from the stringent regulations governing entry into the new lands. At all police points manned by the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, oil seekers and others are compelled to show their entry permits. These permits are not issued unless the applicants satisfy the police patrol, composed of hardened "mushers" and "stour-doughs," that they are physically capable of enduring hardships, are properly equipped for the long journey, and are assured of being able to earn to civilization at the end of the season's work. Failing in this they must show that they have a grub stake sufficient for a full 12 months or that they have the necessary orders on the trading posts already established to carry them through for a year's supply of food. This for two of those applying for permits have been refused by police officials. Later on, when the real rush begins, police officials say, considerable weed-ing out will have to be done. The 16 pile portage between Fort Fitzgerald and Fort Smith is expected to show considerable congestion when the rush starts, old timers say, notwithstanding the presence of 50 teams and several powerful tractors which have been sent to this strip of land to cope with the influx. The two natural routes leading to the Fort Norman fields are via Peace River Crossing and Fort McMurray. There are two other routes, however, which would land the travelers in the new fields from six weeks to two months earlier than by either the Peace of McMurray lines, but both these routes call for long portages and considerable outfit.
