MAN ARRESTED WHO LED PARTY TO THE GRAVE

Later Rifle and Bloody Rags Found in His Room by Officer.

Told Police Story of How a Woman Had Told Him How He Was Killed and Buried.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—(Special)—A search this afternoon of the rooms occupied by Hightower, who showed the police where the body of Rev. Father Hegin was buried, revealed a rifle, pieces of bloody buff and clothing from local newspapers in which the amount of reward for the recovery of the priest was published.

The police said they would confront Hightower with their find late this afternoon.

Fr. Hegin has been murdered. There was a bullet hole through his heart and through his head, the latter having torn away part of the skull. The body was examined at 11 o'clock last night by a jury consisting of Chief of Police Daniel O'Brien of this city, Joseph J. Collins and four Escanaba men and William Hightower, the man who discovered the grave.

The searching party left last night on a tip furnished by Hightower, who said he had discovered the grave and the body was later dug up by the light of a kerosene lantern. Hightower says he had proven successful in his search for the priest's remains.

The police are searching for both Hightower and the woman, who she is alleged to have received the information from. In talking with the police office in his story to the police, Hightower asserted that the woman showed her a revolver and she pretended to shoot him in the forehead, said, "You do right to be afraid of that man. It is a life or death matter."

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UNIFORM SYSTEM NOT FAVORED BY CLERKS OF STATE

Campaign Started Now to Have 1923 Legislature Repeal Law; System Does Not Work Out

(By Associated Press) LANSING, Mich., Aug. 11.—An active campaign to bring about the repeal of the 1922 legislation of the state uniform accounting system has been planned by boards of supervisors and county clerks who have taken the lead in the move to abolish the new method of keeping the state books.

The first campaign literature will probably be the resolution passed some time ago by the board of supervisors of Berrien county. This resolution calls for a uniform system to start to wards a centralized government at Lansing which will deprive counties of their rights to keep their own books and to make their own laws in maintaining county accounts and cost the state and the affected counties hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

The uniform accounting system was first authorized in 1915 when a small original amendment to permit its installation in the state was adopted. On that date however, the new system has not been mandatory upon the state or the counties. The constitutional amendment which authorized it without stating that it should be installed in 1921, in line with the general plan of state government re-organization and centralization advanced by the incoming administration, enabling laws making the installation of uniform accounting mandatory.
