

## AGREEMENT BETWEEN RUSSIA AND UNITED STATES SIGNED BY OFFICIALS THIS MORNING

### Relief Work Will Be Carried Forward at Once, It Is Said.

American Workers Will Be Given Ample Protection While Engaged in Relief Activity.

RIOX, Russia, Aug. 20.—The agreement between the United States and Russia providing for American relief for the famine stricken district of Russia was signed at 7:30 this morning by Walter T. Brown, European representative of the American Relief Administration, and Natan Larionov, representing the Russian famine committee.

Hope that the signing of the agreement will lead to further relations between Russia and America was expressed by Larionov and Larionov.

Mr. Brown confirmed his earlier statement that the agreement would result in the savings of many lives, but said it is by the terms of the contract that the necessary to a far reaching program which includes not only the providing food for the people of the famine stricken districts, but the combating of epidemics and the prevention of outbreaks of contagious diseases among the fugitive thousands who have fled from their homes.

Officials have appeared in various districts and there is many people in danger of an epidemic. Hundreds have been swept away in the past, victims of disease in many sections and contagion has spread to other parts of Europe.

It is understood that word has already been sent to New York, directing that relief ships be loaded with medicine and food for Russia and sent forward with dispatch.

Actual work in Russia may commence in a little less than a week then out of the country and the utmost haste will be maintained.

Political and commercial activities will be outside the realm of the workers duty and any violation of this clause of the agreement will be cause for expulsion from Russia on proof being submitted.

All Americans engaged in feeding and caring for the famine sufferers will be on joy diplomatic rights and will not be interfered with by Russian officials in any way whatsoever.

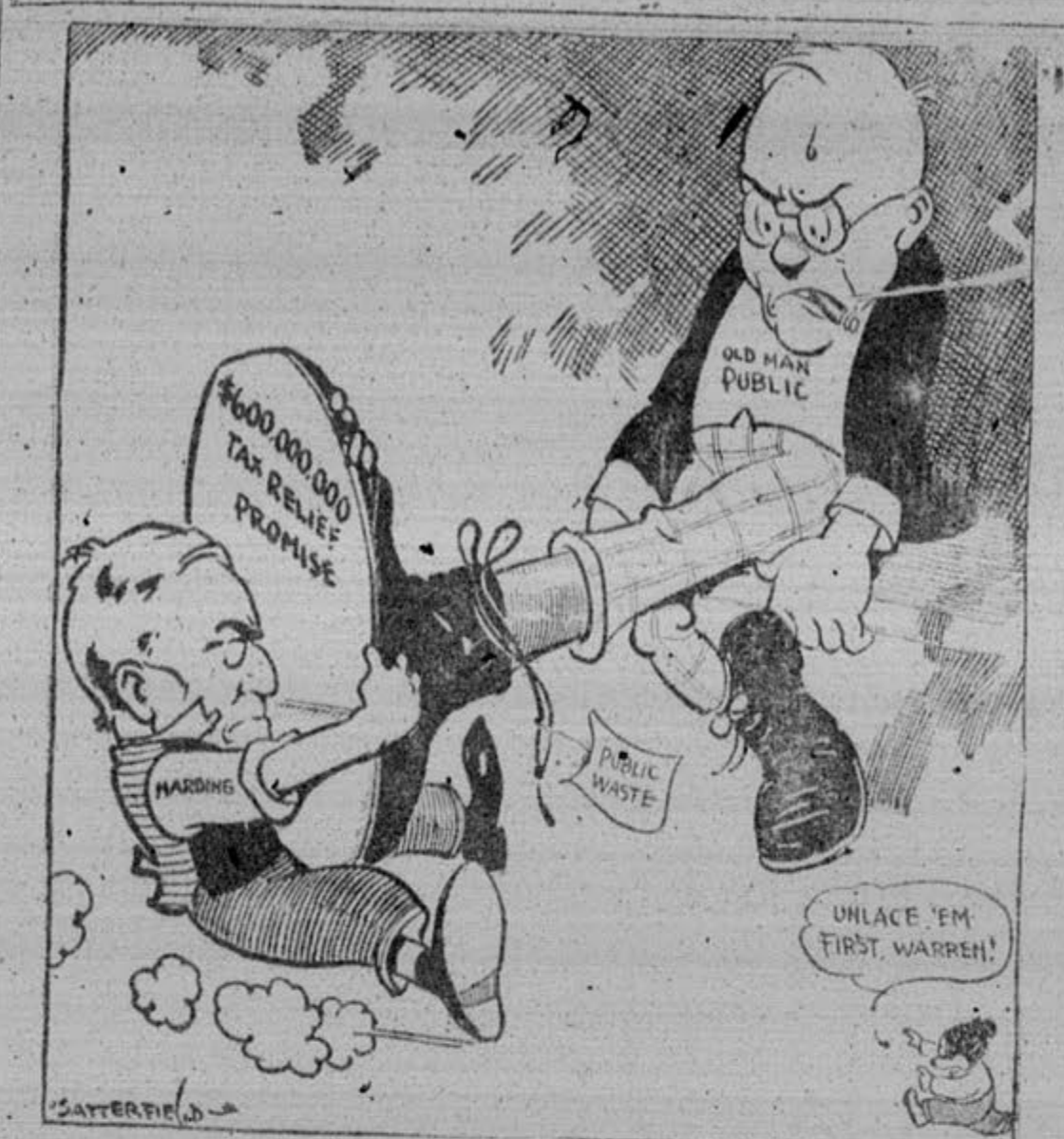

# A NEW SYSTEM OF EQUALIZATION TO GO INTO EFFECT

### Amendments to the Tax Laws Provide for All Annual Instead of Biennial Equalization.

LANSING, Aug. 20.—Immediately after the completion of the taxable property of the state has been arrived at by the state board of equalization, the most comprehensive system of operation between local boards of assessors and assessors of the state is being set on foot. # ORE CARRIERS ARE ALMOST CURIOSITY

### Marquette Shipments About 7 1/2 Per Cent of Last Year's Volume.

A slight spurt in ore shipping has been evidenced in Escanaba, in the past few days by the placing in commission of steam hauling floats at the Chapin mine at Iron Mountain and the Arizona mine at Marquette. The ore from these mines shipped through Escanaba and the beginning of shipments from the stock piles has resulted in a slight increase in the tonnage handled at docks here.

When the Chapin and Arizona mines resumed operations a few weeks ago it was announced, as is likely that any shipments could be made this season. Limited sales of ore have been made by the two mines and steam shovels have been placed at both mines to fill the order as they are received.

Marine Traffic Light.

From the opening of navigation up to July 25 only 15,014 tons of iron ore had been shipped from Marquette docks as compared with 1,233,233 tons during the same period last year. From the South shore dock 41,583 tons were loaded into vessels as compared with 220,575 a year ago. The L. S. & I. shipments to July 21 this year amounted to 91,434 tons, compared with 1,257,785 tons in May, 21,175 in June, 52,141 in July and this month's record up to yesterday, 45,387.

Sixty Per Cent Slump.  
In the Lake Superior basin the tonnage movement up to July 21 slumped 60 per cent. The total tonnage this year has been 10,419,311 tons, compared with 26,079,141 tons last year during the same period, a decrease of 15,660,457 tons.

The season's total tonnage last year was approximately 28,000,000 tons and a total of approximately 25,000,000 tons is predicted for the season in a falling off for the year of about 60 per cent.

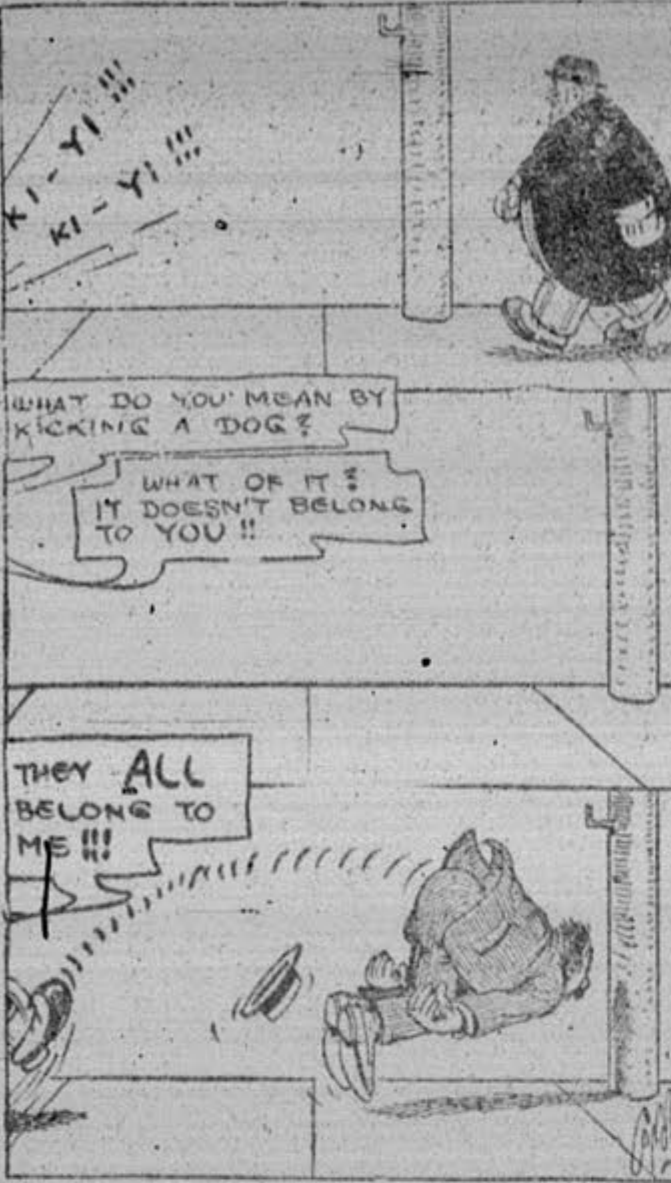

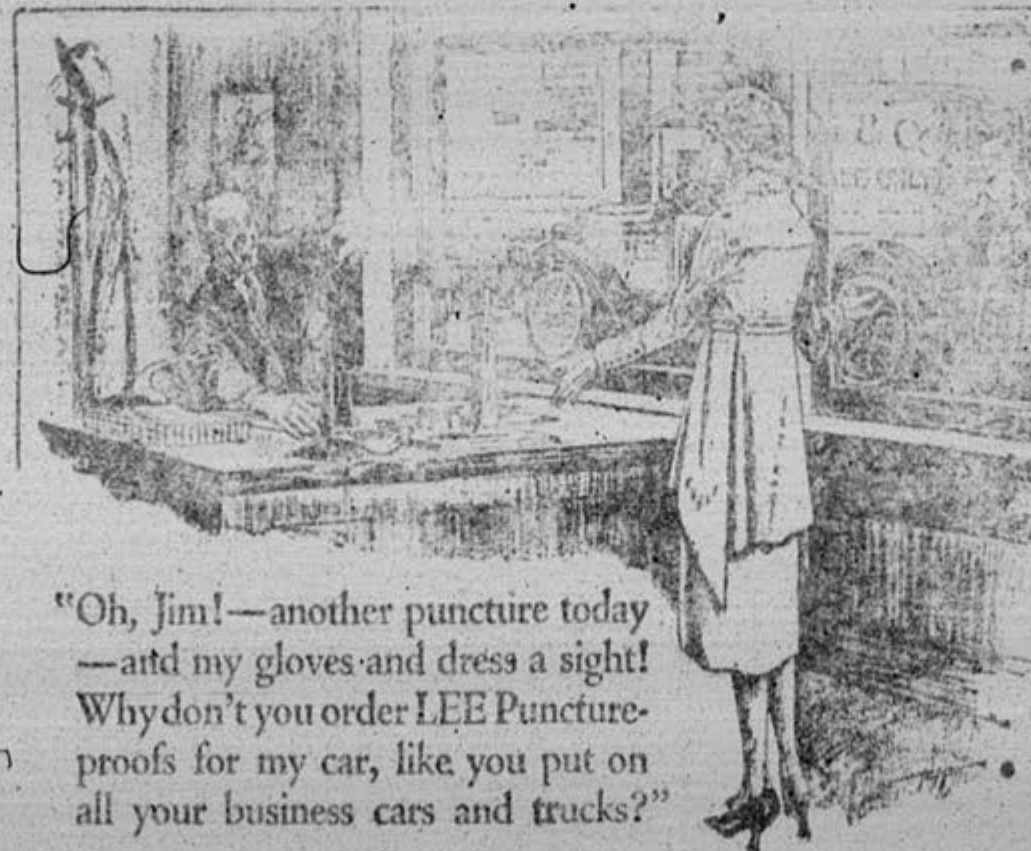

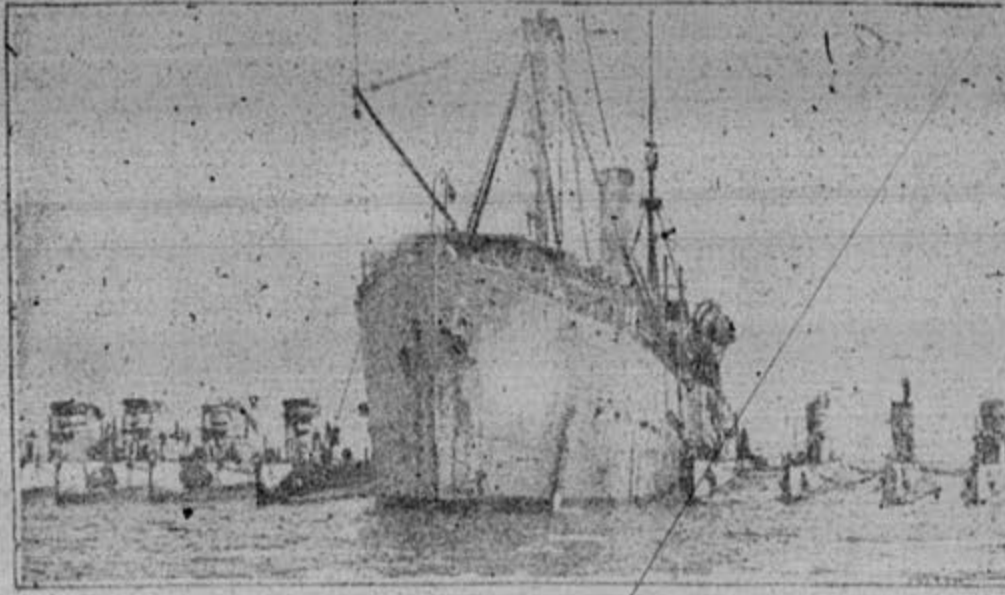

Department of commerce, estimates that the cost of government for Duluth for the year ending June 30, 1921, amounted to \$1,069,516, a per capita cost of \$22.28. In 1917, the per capita cost for 1917 and in 1918, \$20.48, the totals for these years being \$774,710 and \$678,000, respectively. The per capita costs for 1919 consisted of \$1,000,000 of general department, \$11,831,000 of expenses of public service enterprises, \$1,781,000 of payments for library, \$1,000,000 for outlays, \$12.15.

The total revenue receipts in 1920 were \$954,257 or \$20.58 per capita. For the fiscal year the per capita excess of government costs over revenue receipts was, therefore, \$2.88.

Property Taxes Increase Property taxes constitute the greater part of the revenue of cities. In Oshkosh, they represented 77.3 per cent for 1920, 69.2 per cent for 1917, and 67.8 per cent for 1914. The increase in the amount of property taxes was 21.7 per cent from 1919 to 1920, 7.0 per cent from 1917 to 1920, and 10 per cent from 1914 to 1920.

Indebtedness Increasing The net indebtedness of Oshkosh is increasing, being \$11.54 per capita for 1920, \$11.75 for 1917, and \$26.76 for 1914.

British Offer to Sell Clothes Cheap in Austria-Hungary

VIENNA, Aug. 20 - The offer of a British concern to sell in Vienna 100,000 ready-made suits of men's clothing at 1 pound and 10 shillings, each suit being occupying more space in the warehouses than the disturbed political situation.
