## BANDIT STICKS UP JOHN KELL AND GETS \$300

Robber Orders Safe to Be Opened and Kell Grabs Gun.

Makes Escape Through Rear Door of Soft Drink Parlor and Meets His Pal On the Outside.

An automatic pistol thrust against the heart of Stanley Dabrowska, alias John Kell, proprietor of a soft drink establishment on Main street at 12 o'clock last night forced Kell to turn over \$300 to the stick-up man, both the bandit that held up Kell and an accomplice, who was waiting outside made good their escape.

Two men dressed in lumberjack's outfit and said to be about 35 years of age were seen hanging around the depot locally all evening. They had been in and out of the Kell place a number of times and apparently were just passing away the evening. About ten minutes to twelve, it is said, John took out his role and paid a visit. It is said that the two men were looking on. One of them was in the building and the other was outside. The one that was in the building ordered a drink, drank it and walked toward the door. Kell followed him to the door intending to lock it when the fellow got out. Just as the man was so far as the door he turned and asked Kell, "do you live here?" Kell said, "Yes." Just then he looked down and saw a heavy black automatic pistol pointing against his heart. "Stick up," said the first command of the bandit and I want the key to your cash drawer," Kell gave him the key. The robber tried it, but it did not fit. "Give me the right key or I'll shoot you to pieces," Kell gave him the right key, he opened the cash drawer and taking the \$300 shoved it into his pocket. The next command was, "open the safe." The bandit wanted to look the safe over first so he held the gun pointed on Kell with one hand and started to finger the combination with the other.

### Kell Grabs Gun

John Kell standing near was watching closely and for the fraction of a second the holdup man glanced toward the safe door. This was Kell's time for action. If ever and make a quick lunge he grabbed the barrel of the pistol in one hand. The bandit pulled his arm around quickly and tried to cover Kell and then pulled his hand and the bullet crashed into the door casing. The shells were too large for the pistol and the automatic action failed to work, seeing that the gun was of no use; the bandit released his hold on it grabbed a heavy beer bottle and backed out the door followed trying all the while to fix the gun so it would shoot. He wanted to get the bandit. By this time the bandit had dashed out the door and seeing a wheelbarrow near he placed it in front of the door, and then disappeared. As Kell rushed out the door in pursuit he fell headlong over the wheelbarrow and by the time he was on his feet the man had justed his pal and made their escape.

### MAN HUNT ON

Within twenty minutes after the hold up all the police officers that could possibly be assembled were sent out in different directions accompanied by one man who would know the bandits when they saw them. The search continued all thru the night and by this morning all neighboring towns were notified. All the trains out of Escanaba were searched both here and at Park River, Powers and Marquette. No trace of the bandits has yet been found.

The gun used by the bandit was an Italian made automatic, caliber .30 M.M. The bullet used to use 32 calibre U.S. ammunition in the gun, if it had not been for this Kell would have shot and possibly killed the bandit.

One Powers, a taxi driver, was in the Kell saloon when the hold up and shooting took place. He was forced to stand behind the bar by the bandit after he was robbed of one dollar, all that he had.

Human Skeleton Is Found in the Ditch. Watch and Cup Also

The skeleton of an unidentified man was found in a ditch near Bark River Saturday by John Von Ekenfors, of the same village. A watch and a cup were found near the bones. No start of any sort could be found that would identify or link the bones with a missing man. In all probabilities the body had lain in that spot for several years as nothing was left of the body but a small heap of bones. The skeleton was taken to the Morgue. Every effort will be made to find out the name of the unfortunate.

Provisions of Bill

The main feature of the tax reduction bill passed by the house Saturday is to lower the rate of inheritance tax.

Return of the excess profits tax effective January 1, 1922.

Reduction of the surtax on high incomes from a maximum of 65 per cent to 52 per cent, effective January 1, 1922.

Reduced taxes on incomes of less than \$5,000 by increasing the exemption of married persons from \$2,000 to \$2,500 and that of each child or dependent from \$150 to \$400, effective January 1, 1922.

Complete repeal of all transportation taxes with the exception of steamship and air mail taxes.

Increase of the corporation income tax from 10 to 12½ per cent.

Repeal of the excess life insurance policies with a provision making insurance companies income subject to the corporation tax.

New taxes on certain beverages, gasoline and gas, fruit juices and carbonated syrups as a substitute for the proposed cream and soda water tax will be paid by the manufacturer.

New manufacturers taxes of 1 per cent on most of the high protected articles on which the consumer now pays a duty.

Reduction of the excise taxes on candy, bars and electrical articles.

Exemption to foreign traders or foreign trade corporations on the income tax.

To the complaint of the automobile dealers that the total business must be done abroad.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—With number of amendments the Senate bill which will make one billion dollars available to the war finance corporation for stimulating exportation of agricultural products was passed to day by the house.

Many Thought to Have Burned to Death in Hotel

MAQUIN, Ga., Aug. 22.—Three persons are known to have lost their lives from a fire in the Brown hotel a frame structure in this city, early this morning. Firemen express the belief that the fire may have possibly begun in the basement and spread up to the third floor, where it thoroughly searched.

## EFFORTS MADE TO INDUCE THE FINNS TO JOIN UNIONS

Members of the Baltic Union Step Forward With Endeavor to Add Finland to the List.

RIGA, Latvia, Aug. 22.—Efforts are now under way to induce Finland to join the Baltic Union, which became an independent fact with the signing of various conventions leading to a triple alliance of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

In diplomatic circles here the signing of these conventions is considered as a great step toward the potential formation of a united military front from the Arctic to the Black Sea against any aggression from Soviet Rus-

sia. Latvia and Estonia are understood to have signed already a military con-

vention.

Lithuania has yet been included in this but is expected to be shortly. For that Poland, which is ex-

pected to be in the union later, might object to any immediate inclusion of

Lithuania in the military convention.

The statesmen consider the formation of the triple alliance a fairly ade-

quate safeguard against any of these eventualities. The protection will be stronger, they say, were Finland and Poland and possibly Bulgaria included but they declare they have at least made a splendid start.

In their fight for political and economic stability, toward which they are making rapid progress, these little republics would have before them the spectre of danger were Lenin's regime in Russia either to crumble in to anarchy or be succeeded by some government determined to include in a united Russia all of the little provinces who have broken away and form independent governments.

State Highway Engineer Tel's  
of Extensive Road Work  
in the District.

Present road report through upper peninsula is submitted by U. P. district engineer, representing the state highway department in the upper peninsula.



