BANDIT STICKS UP JOHN KELL AND GETS \$300

Robber Orders Safe to Be Opened and Kell Grabs Gun.

Makes Escape Through Rear Door of Soft Drink Parlor and Meets His Pal On the Outside.

An automatic pistol thrust against the front of Stanley Dobrowska, alias John Kell, proprietor of a soft drink establishment on Main street at 12 o'clock last night forced Kell to turn over \$300 to the stick-up man. Both the bandit that held Kell and an accomplice, who was waiting out side near the garage.

Two men dressed in lumberjack's outfits and said to be about 35 years of age, were seen hanging around the door of the building last evening. They had been in and out of the Kell place a number of times and apparently were just passing away the evening. About ten minutes to twelve, it is said John Kell took out his safe and paid a \$300 bill and it is that the two men were looking on. One of them was in the building and the other was outside. The one that was in the building ordered a drink, drank it and walked toward the door. Kell followed him to the door intending to lock it when the fellow got out, just as the man was for as the door he turned and asked Kell, "do you have here," Kell said, "Yes," just then he looked down and saw a heavy black automatic pistol pointing toward his heart. "Stick me up," was the first command of the bandit and Kell gave him the \$300. The robber told Kell, but it did not fit, "Give me the right key or I'll blow you to pieces," Kell gave him the right key, he opened the cash drawer and taking the \$300 showed it to the bandit. The next command was, "Open the safe," the bandit wanted to look the safe over first so he held the gun pointed on Kell with one hand and started to fidget the combination with the other.

Human Skeleton Is Found in the Ditch, Watch and Cup Also

The skeleton of an unidentified man was found in a ditch near Park River Saturday by John Von Eckenrodt of the same village. A watch and a cup were found near the bones. No exact of any sort could be found that would identify or link the bones with a missing man. In all probability the body had lain in that spot for several years as nothing was left of the body but a small heap of bones. The skeleton was taken to the Allouez morgue. Every effort will be made to find out the name of the unknown man.

Two Bakery Firms Pay Fine For Not Obeying Ordinance

After Hirt and Jos. Gleich, owners of the Hirt & Gleich bakery, and La Verge, proprietor of the Federal bakery, were arrested Saturday on complaint of the Escanaba Woman's club for the violation of one of the city ordinances. It is claimed that the two firms failed to wrap their bread and other bakery goods paper to conform with the ordinance. Each paid a fine and costs amounting to \$17.50. They pleaded guilty to the charge.

Enlistments in the Navy Will Start in September, Report

Word was received yesterday by C. Y. Williams at the local naval recruiting station that the enlistments in the U. S. navy that were stopped some time ago by the naval department to cut down the number of men in the navy will open up again about the first of next month. The size of the navy was cut to 100,000 men and since then 42,000 were also permitted to leave the service if they desired. Now that the desired strength is reached men whose limit is up will be discharged right along and the size of the navy may be kept up to the limit of strength at all times. Mr. Williams received the order Saturday to start recruiting again about the first of September from the main recruiting office for Wisconsin and upper Michigan, which is located at Milwaukee.

Britain's Reply To Invitation Reaches Hughes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Foreign acceptance from the British government of the invitation to participate in the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and the discussion of far-sighted questions was received today by Secretary Hughes. The note of acceptance was transmitted by Ambassador Herrick and was delivered to him by Lord Curzon, British ambassador here.

HOUSE PASSES THE FORDNEY TAX REDUCTION BILL

CARRIES \$818,000,000 OUT; WAS ADOPTED DESPITE STIFF OPPOSITION BY DEMOCRATS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—With only three Republicans dissenting, the House today passed the Fordney revenue reduction bill with further amendments increasing the total estimate deduction in the tax burden of the country to \$818,000,000. A Democratic motion to recommit the bill to the ways and means committee and to delay the report of the higher committee was defeated 229 to 125.

ANNOUNCE ROAD PROGRAM FOR U. P.

State Highway Engineer Tells of Extensive Road Work in the District.

When the road report through the upper peninsula are announced by the State Highway Engineer, representing the state highway department in the upper peninsula.

Work in Escanaba, Gladstone and Iron Mountain are the projects planned out by highway officials.

The most important improvement contemplated is to change the work when a road of three miles connects the lake south of Hines, and from there a three-mile east, shortening the distance to be traveled by motor by a road which would be about thirty miles and the time of traveling by one and a half of six hours.

Eliminates Detour

The new road, through three two long detours, formerly used, one by way of Gladstone and Carleton to Grand City and the other by way of Newberry to Grand. The cut off road gives a direct route between the two cities.

At Iron River, Mr. Davies received bids for about four hundred miles of concrete to be laid in the village of Iron River. Contracts will be awarded within a short time.

The Bay Shore drive, under construction along the Gladstone shore, from the point where the main road crosses the street, may line is ready for a layer of bank sand. Mr. Davies reports.

Switch Road to Be Closed

The stretch of the Iron Mountain trunk line, commonly known as the Ford Little switch road, which has been considered open with the exception of a short distance, will again be closed. The road will be closed in order to keep it in condition. It will again be closed to traffic, making the detour formerly used necessary.

None of these roads will give drivers a "real" twenty foot wide, paved as any boulevard in this part of the country.

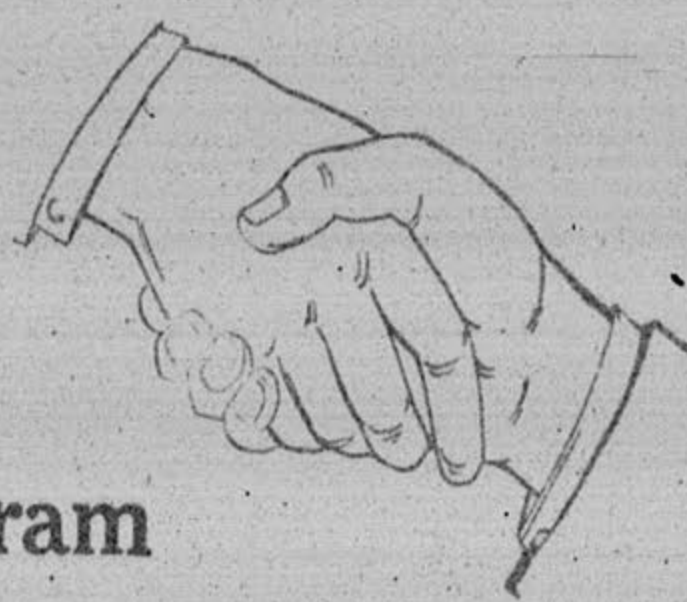
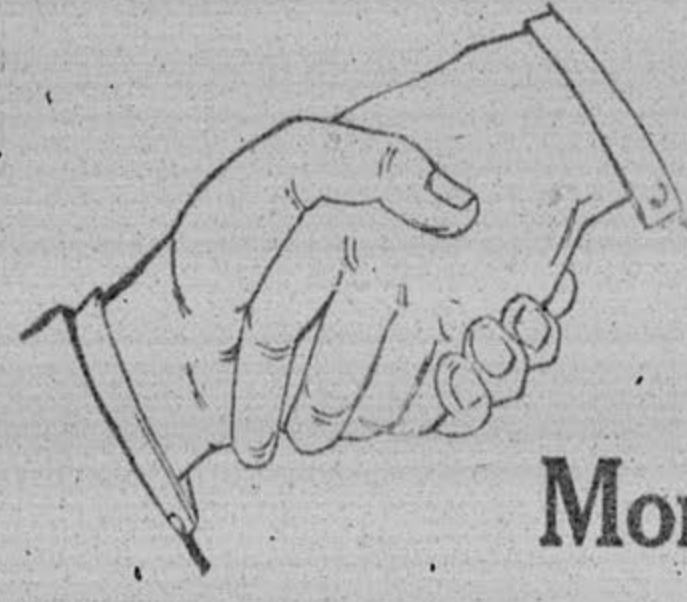

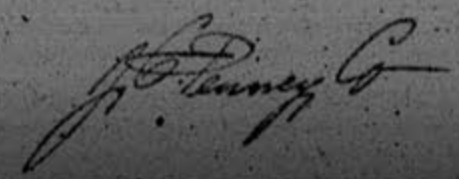
