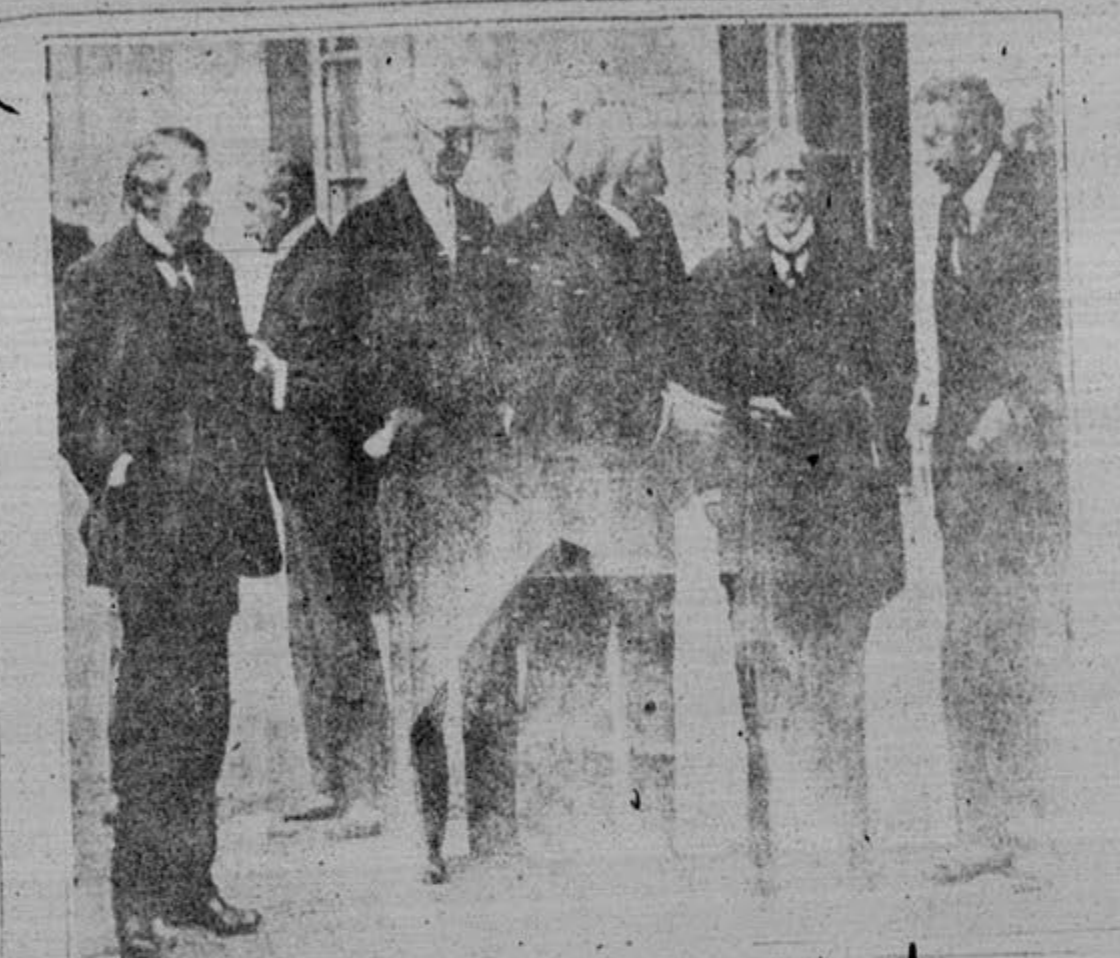

Work of Blowing Up German Fortress Starts Early Each Day.

HELIGOLAND, Aug. 29.—Every day is a Fourth of July celebration on the little rock island of Heligoland. And not a safe and sane celebration at that. At sunrise the 1,000 German workmen who are dismantling the great fortress and naval harbor of Kaiser Wilhelm II set off their best. up, perpendicular but at its southeast end is a small beach upon which the German navy erected a cooling and oil station, fresh-water reservoirs, scapline sheds and docks. Here also was constructed a naval harbor thoroughly protected by seawalls, which was capable of accommodating eight or ten destroyers or cruisers and an unlimited number of submarines.

From this harbor many destroyers sailed out to participate in the Battle of Jutland and the Battle of Heligoland.

The German admiralty converted Heligoland into a sort of shore battery. Three great batteries were planted in the rock in a manner which gives the cliff the appearance of the interior of a four-deck battleship.

Already the 41-inch guns and their carriages have been sawed into small bits and thrown into scrap steel piles. Workmen are now plying sledge hammers on the concrete walls and heavy machinery is being used to demolish the batteries.

The scapline sheds, coal bins, oil tanks and water reservoirs, along the coast have also been targeted and dismantled and hundreds of workmen are grinding away at the gun muzzles of the "never get" and the foundry. The great seawall separating the naval harbor from the sea is being moved every day, and the work is being done in German's future navy.

Heligoland once was a popular resort for the German visitors who stayed long at the island. But because of the constant blasting and the evidences of devastation which afforded a sad monument to the Kaiser's once proud navy. The native residents of the island are negligible in the devastation, as most of them were born under the British flag. The rock Heligoland was transferred to the British to the Germans.

RADIO SHOW TO OPEN TOMORROW WILL BE NOVEL

Chicago to Have First Show of Its Kind Ever Staged.

President Harding Will Talk Over Wireless Phone to the Hall; Many New Things On Exhibit.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—The National Radio Show, the first of its kind ever

held in this country, will open here tomorrow, with manufacturers from all over the country represented, amid the plaudits of the many wireless men whom the show has drawn to Chicago.

The Radio Show, besides containing the exhibits of hundreds of manufacturers of radio apparatus, will also show the various developments of wireless communication since the day when Marconi flashed his famous message across the Atlantic. Ancient sets of five and twenty years ago, with their coherers and detector crystals, will be displayed alongside of the very latest in radio construction, instruments capable of sending and receiving messages half way round the globe.

Seated in his chair in the White House at Washington, President Harding will talk over a land wire to the naval station a few miles distant, where his voice will be broadcast by wireless telephone. The message will be picked up at the Radio Show, where it will be amplified and scattered

through the hall by loud speakers. Other prominent officials in Washington will also be heard by this method.

The entire wireless exhibit used by the Great Lakes Naval Training Station at the Palace of Progress held here has been installed, and will be operated. For Sheridan has set down a rival exhibit.

E. P. Glavin, inventor of the radio controlled automobile, will give his machine in working order during the show, demonstrating the method of wireless control used on a battleship during the recent airplane bombing tests. Special wireless telephone transmitting outfits have been set up, and music and speeches will be sent out nightly. BELEM PRISON IN MEXICO IS NOW REFORMED

Worst Penal Institution in World Has Been Cleaned Up, It Is Said.

Men and Women Who Are Both Confined in Prison Will Now Receive Better Treatment.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 29.—Belém prison, which has been called the "hell" by the people of this city, is now being reformed. Formerly known as one of the "black spots" of Mexico, in which were kept hundreds of thousands of prisoners, the law who were held together in a filthy, stinking, and overcrowded place. Now, however, the prison has been reformed and now receives a most comfortable treatment for the 1,000 or so prisoners, within its walls.

every prisoner has received such additional in his daily bill of fare as the circumstances permit. Special attendants are provided for the small children of women prisoners, of whom there are many. The authorities also providing them with food and a place to sleep.

Death also has been abolished. This was a long, cruel, and painful way to execution, and in almost every case, there is no record of one escaping or remaining alive. No execution is permitted within the prison.

Belém has been notorious for its unhygienic conditions and to be sent to Belém was considered the worst fate imaginable to be meted out to a criminal.

QUANY CUSTOMS

Thus it was that for many years, annual victims were either volunteers or chosen from the pick of the land. Old Norse kings every year offered up their favored sons on the trees, and in times of famine the Swedes sacrificed their King. When great victory was won over the Romans, the Norsemen offered up their captives and their horses as a thank offering to the gods.

So it is not hard to see how gradually being hanged was the fate of the English criminal instead of being subjected to the wheel as in France or Germany, and now we in turn feel heir to the custom, only recently discarded for electrocution.

THE TREATY WITH GERMANY

There will be a full month in which to consider the terms of the treaty with Germany before it is submitted to the senate, and it may be expected that the document will be extensively debated before action is taken in that body.

There are, however, some general observations that can be made at once. The treaty, on its face, secures every right to the United States which congress desired to secure.

The apparent intention is to give the United States every benefit that would have accrued had the Versailles treaty been ratified, and if a detailed examination of the instrument should show that it fails to do so with all necessary clearness there is a fair presumption that Germany will consent to such changes as are needed to accomplish that result.

To this extent the administration proposes to make peace with Germany by a virtual ratification of that part of the treaty of Versailles which secures American rights, and that was the method which the President said he preferred.

But the government of the League of Nations, the labor union, and all of those portions of the Versailles treaty which divided Europe and established new boundaries in Europe and Asia are declared to impose no obligation upon the United States. It was to be taken as a matter of course that the League of Nations would be rejected.

They are all European matters and will be left to Europe as such things always were left to Europe in the past. Neither will the United States be asked to ratify the Shantung outrage, but the United States joins with its former allies in requiring Germany to make full reparation not only for itself but to all of the powers entitled to collect reparations.

Such are the salient features of the treaty. Taken together, they constitute a sufficient answer to the charge that the peace resolution destroyed the power of the country to make a satisfactory peace.

GRANDMOTHER WAS RIGHT

We may have thought grandmother's remark was a back country peculiarity, a way of getting amicably round the eternal affinity of boy and dirt, but now comes City Health Officer H. J. Defaet to lend a degree of scientific authority to grandmother's aphorism.

"If you eat too much dirt you will die; if you eat a medium amount of dirt you will live long; if you don't eat enough dirt you will die," sagely announces the officer. Though he neglects to specify for an eager humanity the quantity of dirt which may be said to be a "medium amount" we are not troubled.

Dr. Defaet finds a basis for his pronouncement in the health report of army camps which showed, he says, that city men had lower death rates than those from the country. City men eat more dirt, are constantly absorbing it, and germs, too, and the dirt gets up a ferment in the body that dissolves the germs, he reasons.

So, there we have a plain and simple rule of health. Eat dirt in moderate quantities. Don't stop at a quart or reach out for a half bushel. Eat a peck, but don't finish eating it until you are ready to pass to another world.

NEW LAWS FOR GOVERNMENT OF RENTALS IS PLAN

American Bar Association Will Take Up Matter at Annual Meeting to Be Held in Cincinnati.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 28.—It is reported that the matter of enacting laws to govern rental of residential property will receive serious consideration at the annual convention of the American Bar Association to be held in Cincinnati from August 30 to September 2.

The committee on uniformity changes in statute laws in the report which it will present to the convention at the session on Thursday evening, September 1, will say:

"In the field of landlord and tenant law, we find recent examples of an unequal legislation. Shortage of housing accommodation has given rise to an emotional demand, which results in high rentals. These in turn have made the justification for legislative regulation of rentals and terms and conditions of tenancy. Real legislation has taken the form of a patchwork of varying statutory remedies of the landlord in such a way as to compel or induce him to accept unreasonable or to accept comprehensive legislation like that contained in the act of congress applicable to the District of Columbia which treats rental property as affected with a public interest and subjects the relationship of landlord and tenant to government regulation.

The New York type of statute simply takes away the remedy of eviction where the contract which the landlord claims is breached is considered by the courts to be unconscionable, as an example where the rent demanded by the landlord is, in the opinion of the courts excessive. The New York legislature has declared it to be a public nuisance which is more than an excess of the rent of the premises. The landlord can not evict a tenant who pays the reasonable rent.

The act of congress authorizes the rent commission in the District of Columbia to issue standard forms of leases in its reasonable rental and terms of tenancy and to determine reasonable subdivisions between landlord and tenant. The authority of the rent commission and its findings are conclusive in that of the fair and equitable compromise between the interests of the parties to the lease.

The committee further reports that one of the most striking features of our recent statistics is the absence of any large amount of "rent-control" legislation with less rather more in the line of regulatory legislation.

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BOOZE TRICKLES INTO FRANCE TO SUPPLY TOURISTS

Government Allowed Some to Be Exported for Exclusive Use of the Visitors to Country

PARIS, Aug. 29.—The French government has been compelled to permit the exportation into France of a limited amount of whiskey and gin so as to satisfy the demands of the tourists here from foreign countries.

Such exports had been prohibited since the war and as a result the price of rock tails and highballs soared in proportion as the supply of gin and whiskey diminished.

Patrons, residing here have made desperate efforts to obtain good whiskey from England and Scotland and have been compelled to pay extremely high prices for it. Reports of a great amount of smuggling indicate that the foreigners have about as much difficulty obtaining their favorite brand of whiskey as they do in America.

The government realized that after the tourist season began it was looking for a complaint, they assert, that had not been filed with them. It has never been catalogued.

SOLDIER BONUS PAYMENTS HAVE TRIED PATIENCE

Officials in Charge Have Been Subjected to Much Criticism On Part of Many People

LANSING, Aug. 29.—The payment of soldiers' bonuses has become a thorn in the side of several state officials. If there is anything in the way of a complaint, they assert, that had not been filed with them.

A few weeks ago the organization looking after bonus payments was considered a fairly smooth running machine. Then the protests started to come.

When application blanks are checked and approved for payment by Adjutant General John S. Bessy and a staff of clerks, they are sent to the adjutant general's department. The applications are approved unless the war department records against which to check them are available. Almost immediately they come in. At present Col. Bessy's staff is caught up with its work. In the adjutant general's department the checks are not sent out as rapidly as the approved applica-

tions are received. This feature of the work furnished one of the chief reasons for complaint, but steps are being taken, according to Col. Bessy, to remedy it.

Healy Holmes, who was injured in an automobile accident several days ago, was taken to St. Francis hospital yesterday in a critical condition.

He was released from the hospital a short while after the accident, in which he received his injuries, but when his release had developed that he had suffered internal injuries which were not at first discovered.

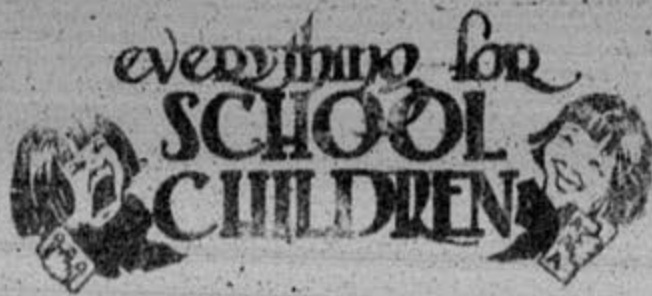
