PROCLAMATION DROPPED FROM AIR IN LOGAN

Warning to Men to Stop Trouble Is Delivered by Airplane.

One Officer Was Shot and Killed This Morning Near Blair in Short Battle.

(By Associated Press) LOGAN, W. Va., Aug. 31.—John A. Gore, Logan county deputy, was killed in a fight between the border patrol and an armed band at Blair mountain this morning. This is the first casualty since the state police, deputy sheriff, and volunteers gathered here to resist the forces which for days have been assembling on the east side of Spruce Fork ridge with the intention of an invasion on Logan county.

LOGAN, W. Va., Aug. 31.—A border patrol in Blair mountain was fired upon this morning by a few men on the east slope. The fire was returned and the attacking force driven back by the Logan county deputy, finding this sector.

Sheriff John Chapman said the casualties had been reported. Chapman was also reported from the front line by the McGraw and Mingo forces. Reinforcement for the McGraw and Mingo forces who are on the Logan border county line continued to pour into Logan about the morning hours of this day.

A second line of defense had been organized by the women under command, but leaders to provide meals for the fighting volunteers and reserve to the McGraw and Mingo forces. The women were relieved at dawn by a fresh corps of women who promised to stick by the men and to give them a good day's work.

MILITARY HAS BEEN CALLED TO END FIGHT

Lord Mayor Makes Request That Military Assume Charge.

Fourteen Persons Have Been Killed Since Rioting Started Last Monday; New Arms in Use.

(By Associated Press) Belfast, Ireland, Aug. 31.—The military, it was announced at midnight, would assume control of Belfast within an hour as a result of representations by the Lord Mayor as to the urgent necessity of affording the city protection in view of the mere rioting and fighting now in progress.

Street lighting followed last night after a long day of great disaster. Many persons in the center of the city were left in darkness because the lamp lighters refused to enter the gutter-swept streets and in the obscurity the opposing sides were very active.

It is reported that since the fighting began last Monday morning, 14 persons have been killed and the high point has now been reached in the number of persons killed. The day's fighting terminated at seven o'clock when an armed band of men appeared with rifles, machine guns, and other arms. Many who were near enough to see the shooting claim that the men were armed with new rifles that had been but recently introduced.

It was the most ghastly incident of the Belfast strike to break out. The presence of shots between the contending parties was early in the morning and gradually spread over a large area of the city.

During a single outbreak on North Queen's street, 15 persons were killed and a dozen or more wounded. An armoured car was sent to the scene, but it was unable to get to the scene of the shooting because of the barricades.

It is believed that if the military had been called upon, the city would have been saved from the disaster. The military has been called upon to assume charge of the city.

Farmers Come into City to Protest On Cut in Price. From \$2.50 to \$1.50 Per Hundred.

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—A reduction of Chicago's milk supply to one-half of its present volume was announced today by a delegation of farmers who came here to protest against the cut in price from \$2.50 to \$1.50 per hundred pounds for milk which was made by the Milk Producers' Association. It is claimed many farmers are now leaving the organization and selling their milk elsewhere.

New Tire Placed on Escanaba's Big Fire Truck This Morning

The tire just taken off was the only one on the big truck that had not been replaced by a new one since the truck was first purchased. When the other tires were worn out new ones were ordered from the company where the truck was purchased, but now these tires are not manufactured any more so the wheel was taken to a local tire house and a hard tire somewhat different than the ones used formerly was placed on it. The new tire is just as strong and just as serviceable as the old one is said.

STATE CLEARS WARDEN CATLIN

That the state administrative board has given Warden Catlin of the Marquette prison a clean slate as far as the recent indictments returned against him are concerned, will meet with the approval of all those who were informed as to what these indictments charged.

There was little doubt in the minds of all those who knew the warden as to what the ultimate outcome of the indictments would be, but still it was an unpleasant situation for Mr. Catlin, the members of his family and his friends, for with the public in general an "indictment" is an "indictment" and that's all there is to it.

Some time ago a little store was started within the prison walls. It was known as the "I. C. store," the "I. C." meaning "Inmate's Co-operative" and was for the purpose of supplying the prisoners with many of the things they needed or wanted within the prison.

Toys, tobacco, tooth brushes, combs, canned goods and in fact a large assortment of things to eat and use. In order to make the store a success, it had to have support and the more support it got the more of a success it would be both from the selling and buying ends.

The store belonged to the prisoners and they derived any profit that might be made. There was little chance of that, however, for goods were sold on a small margin.

Warden Catlin was indicted by the grand jury for purchasing articles at this store to help swell the gross sales for the men. And now that you know what he was indicted for, do you not agree with the state administrative board that "it was an act of charity more than an act of crime?"

LENINE'S LOST ILLUSIONS

Lenine has been brought at the end of three years of experimentation to the conclusion of every other man who has endeavored to make over society. He has learned that man's right concern is man's individual well-being, and that theories command his attention only when his stomach is satisfied.

He offered the Russians a new heaven and a new earth in which the lowly would become the mighty, and they asked for bread. He held out a promise of plenty and the worker and the peasant demanded immediate redemption. Accept my panacea, he said, and you will be free, happy and prosperous and he had to put thousands of them to death before he could get the rest to stop loafing and listen.

In a remarkable letter to a friend in Paris, published in the Matin, Lenine admits the defeat of his principles and announces his desire for a compromise which will bring to his support all Russians, whether they hold to communism or not. He confesses that the last three years of constant strife have worn him out and that he is disappointed in the Russian workers and peasants who, he says, "have betrayed their own interests." His theories of class consciousness and collective interest, formulated while he was in exile, were based on mis-estimation of human nature, he admits.

"Our gamble on the collective instinct which ought to hold together the members of the party was a mistake," he writes. "The collective instinct of the peasants and workers has never just had the hopes we placed in it and has completely failed."

A complete social re-education is necessary to the success of a communist state, Lenine deduces. Until selfishness and greed have been eliminated from the human character no communal program can succeed. The Russian debacle is the history of every other like movement in history.

What the Russian nation is moving toward, if we are to accept the report of recent observers and the evidence of Lenine's letter and other revelations from government sources, is a democratic form of government with a capitalistic economic system, modified, perhaps, but still a capitalistic system, where the individual is permitted to work out his destiny with reasonable checks imposed by the state.

It may be too early to write epitaphs over the Russian trial, but it appears from this distance that the economic pressure cannot be denied much longer, and if the leaders are of like mind with the regime that is revealed in the letter quoted above they must be within sight.

The experiment has been interesting to students and in the larger sense it may have been useful as a guide post both to those who rule and those who seek reform.

A JUDGE'S APPLE CART

Why all this publicity for Judge Tuttle and his apple cart at the Easton market? Hasn't a federal judge as good a right to sell the fruits of his acreage as any other grower in Michigan? They were his apples, weren't they? He didn't use the power of his office to coerce buyers, did he?

As for us, we thought the judge's act was a fine linking of the dignity of the bench with the dignity of toil and the dignity of service. And the fact that he rose at 2 or 3 a. m. to be the first huckster at the market gives evidence of the sort of spirit fortitude we appreciate in our jurists.

A United States judge is able to do things other judges couldn't. He needn't fear any alienation of the huckster vote by entering into competition with them. Nor does he need to be concerned over the opinions of moss-backs who might think the hawking of "nice red apples" beneath the dignity of his office. He isn't a candidate for re-election so he can huckster or not as he sees fit.

The best attack upon Representative Volstead for any part he may have had in attempts to enforce the eighteenth amendment by violating the fourth amendment to the constitution will not be by calling him names, as Senator Reed did, but by making the "beer bill" strictly constitutional.

The large class of military critics who say the dirigible balloon is a failure will say so more more than ever since the ZR-2 did its worst.

Others of us have attended schools or colleges where we have learned to master several languages, in addition to our own native tongue.  
The ability to speak more than one language is a great asset and should be valued accordingly. You do not know when you may be called upon to go to another country, and if you do not possess a knowledge of at least the rudiments of the language you will find yourself at a disadvantage.  
Consider the situation which those members of our Expeditionary Force who could speak French had over the other boys when they found themselves in rural France, where no English was spoken.  
And again think of the kind of our boys who stayed in France for a number of months, gained a familiarity with a language which they might otherwise never have learned.  
Often a good position, where a knowledge of one foreign language or another is required, will be offered to a young man. In social institutions, too, an extra language or two is a distinct asset, and when one employs a great number of foreign help a rudimentary knowledge of the main languages of Europe is almost indispensable.  
Of course one's first effort in the learning of languages should be directed toward perfecting our use of English. Still, there is scarcely any doubt that a fair knowledge of English plus a working knowledge of several other languages, is more profitable than a mere control of English, to the exclusion of all other languages.

## LAND QUESTIONS TO BE ANSWERED

L. F. Livingston, Land Clearing Specialist, Will Discuss Problems.

Hundreds of questions concerning methods of land clearing have been asked L. F. Livingston, land clearing specialist of the Michigan Agricultural College, who has established his headquarters in Marquette. Questions are welcomed by Mr. Livingston, as it is only in this way he will be able to learn the problems confronted in clearing land in this district.

In many cases, Mr. Livingston says, questions are duplicated several times, and to avoid loss of time by answering each question individually, and to reduce expense, a list of from six to ten questions and answers will be published in The Mirror each week. The first list will be published next Monday. The questions will be taken from the daily mail, any anyone who wishes to ask a question will be answered through these columns.

To illustrate his plan, Mr. Livingston takes the following question, which has been asked him several times: "How many blasting caps and how many feet of fuse are needed for two pounds of explosive in blasting stumps?" The answer is:

No definite answer can be given to the question because no two fields of stumps are alike. The best answer at the present time is 100 blasting caps and 200 feet of fuse per 100 pounds of explosive. This answer is based on long experience in land clearing and as for as those interested in clearing can judge, these amounts should suffice. The amounts may be varied slightly, however, depending on the nature of the stumps to be cleared. The amounts given for caps and fuses are also applicable to electric field orders. In ordering blasting caps for electric field, it should be remembered that No. 8 caps should be used. Other than the new safe explosive is handled the same as dynamite.

No two acres of stumps are exactly the same," Mr. Livingston says, "hence there is no average acre of over-land. Each farmer has an individual problem and while general rules apply, I urge individuals to submit land clearing problems to me. Likewise, if any farmer has some system of land clearing which has worked well in his particular case, I will appreciate his writing about it. My work is to gather these practical ideas and pass them on to others."

## NEW TEAM WILL ARRIVE IN CITY THURSDAY A. M.

Fine Team of Bays, Weight 3300 Pounds, Five Years Old Will Be Placed in Fire Department.

The team of horses that was ordered purchased at a recent meeting of the city council when the purchasing committee was given instructions to buy the team, will arrive in Escanaba tomorrow morning from a central Iowa horse ranch. Both horses are bays. They are each five years of age and weigh approximately 1650 pounds each. They are well matched and were recommended by the agent in Iowa as one of the best teams in the state. The horses will be given a course of training to fit them for active duty with the local fire department as soon as they arrive.

To Get Training. The horses at the local station at the present time receive in addition to their exercise in the morning, when they are taken about the town, drawing a light wagon, regular daily course of training or regular training by the firemen. At 11:30 o'clock sharp the station alarm is turned in, the stable doors open, and the horses dash out to their place in front of the wagon and after waiting there for a minute start off again for their stable. A similar course of training although possibly a little more severe at first will be given the new team.

When the city council ordered the purchasing committee of the same body to buy a new team, arrangements were made with the Hessel Sales Stable to buy a team through their agents in the West. The local horse dealers and their agents having spent years in the buying and selling of horses were better prepared to know the best horses and to select a team from among the best obtainable. It was also pointed out that in the present time when horses in a certain extent are passing out with the coming of motor-driven vehicles, it is at least impossible to buy a perfectly matched team.

Roy Burton of the University of Michigan is expected to reach Ann Arbor September 6th under his second year as head of the University. Dr. Burton and his family have spent the summer at Camp Lake in northern Minnesota, where he has a summer home. Indications are that enrollment at the University this year will be about the same as last, when more than 19,000 students came to Ann Arbor, according to University officials. Plans are being mapped for opening September 27.

The new school of education, a re-grouping of several former branches, will be inaugurated this year. To date teachers taking the course have been granted certificates upon successful completion of their work. Under the new plan degrees will be conferred. The move constitutes a forward step and places the training of teachers on a professional basis, according to University officials.

When we have done that we call I will ask America's help. This is an honest loan, a way of dealing with 1922," he said.
