FARMER SHOT TO KILL FORMER GOVERNOR OSBORN AT THE SOO

Soo Homesteader Claims That Osborn Fired at Him First.

SULLY NICK MAJOR, Mich. and Mattson a Finn, charged with attempted assault with intent to murder Chas. S. Osborn, former governor, was bound over to the first term of circuit court for trial and committed to jail in default of \$5,000 bond Friday afternoon. Following the preliminary hearing by Judge Joseph A. Mattson. Mattson, through an interpreter, claimed that he shot at Osborn because the latter was hunting ducks on his land and because Osborn fired at him first. He said that he warned Osborn not to hunt there as a number of ducks owned by him had been shot by hunters recently. His warnings were not obeyed and on the contrary Osborn threatened a head of bird shot at him, two at a time in the face, he claimed. Then he fired the shot that resulted in his arrest. Osborn told the court that he was being fired upon by Mattson with a rifle after the Finn cursed him and threatened to kill him despite protestations that he was a friendly neighbor and had a right to be hunting on St. Mary's river. He was retrieving a killed duck when Mattson appeared with his rifle and fired three shots. Osborn said. DIPLOMAS GIVEN TO WAR VETS BY MICHIGAN A. C.

Impressive and Unusual Ceremonies Mark Occasion; All of Them More or Less Disabled.

LANSING, Oct. 5.—The most impressive and the most unusual commencement ceremony ever held at the Michigan Agricultural College was observed when 16 World War veterans, all of whom more or less disabled, lined up to receive diplomas from their "peep" courses. Some of the ex-service men had one arm, others were troubled with their eyes, or throats, one about being blind and one of the group appeared on crutches. They were the first class of a group of 40 wounded veterans who some time ago elected to take, under the government's rehabilitation plan, preparatory work so they could enter college. The exercises were held in the Agricultural Hall. The audience was small and the speakers were few, but what the audience lacked in size it made up in the fact that the families of eight of the veterans came from long distances to watch the distribution of diplomas. Also here, there are 16 men at the Michigan Agricultural College taking special courses under the federal act. The students mentioned here are the only ones who have completed a college preparatory course. Many of the others are taking practical courses, such as agriculture, horticulture, horticulture and general agriculture.

DAVIS DECLARES PROHIBITION IS GOING TO GAIN

Prohibition Officer Appeals to Every Citizen to Give Aid in Cleaning Up the Violators.

LANSING, Oct. 5.—In a recent statement, which he calls a declaration of policy, James H. Davis, federal prohibition director for Michigan, reiterated the statement made shortly after his appointment, that "the law will be enforced and the bars will be kept up." In his statement Mr. Davis appeals for aid of the citizenry and the press of the state. "America," his statement says, "has spoken for prohibition. To wink at the breaking of our law and preach the observance of an other is unpatriotic and an American I believe the successful liberals will vigorously aid in the enforcement of the dry laws as those who have always been dry. Any other policy means chaos and bolshevism. Regardless of personal views every good citizen will regard as imperative the enforcement of the prohibition act and laws in which it is fundamental." The prohibition director refers to the press as being "the most powerful agency in the working of public sentiment." "An appeal to editorialist, the cartoonist, the reporter, the scenario writer and the playwright to lead every aid to law enforcement," his statement continues. "Every publication which states or infers that the dry program is easily violated or should be violated or that it is a joke, is not only warring against the law, but is also encouraging an attitude that tends to encourage disregard of all laws."



# 'SMOKELESS' TOWN MAY ADD TO JOYS OF FUTURE WORLD

### American Gas Association Meeting Discloses Work Being Done to Bring This About.

CHICAGO—American cities of 20 years hence may be "smokeless" and "sootless" and not only millions of dollars' worth of new lighted property, from face curtains to chimney caps, but health conditions greatly improved, data gathered by research committees of the American Gas Association indicate.

While the full committee reports will not be available until the annual convention of the gas industry in Chicago in November, preliminary data as to development is startling. Co-Oscar H. While the rapidity of progress "smokeless" cities depends upon the financial ability of individual gas com-

panies to grow, keep pace with new developments in gas-making machinery, and to fully meet all demands for service, public cooperation is now of such extent that what may be termed the "gas revolution" is well advanced.

## Haphazard Way of Handling Affairs in Past Was Wasteful.

## Administrative Board in the Future Will Keep in Close Touch With All Activities.

LANSING, Mich., Oct. 5.—As a result of a recent meeting between heads of the various commissions in the state welfare department and members of the state administrative board, it is likely that an altogether new system of conducting the state's business as it relates to state institutions, will be evolved.

Members of the welfare committee, the prison commission, the hospital commission, and the corrective institutions, told the administrative board that they have been "in the dark" so far as the activities of the administrative board have been concerned. Action taken by the board, they declared, has been without the consent or knowledge of the commissions. An action plan has been taken by the administrative board, they claimed. The various commissions have not been notified of such action.

George Crossland, in many ways, agrees with the commission heads. If they have been kept in the dark, he said, he believes they "have a right to know." To attempt to clear away the fog, he has appointed a committee consisting of Attorney General Meritt W. White, Auditor General D. H. Fuller and Superintendent of Public Instruction Thomas C. Johnson to investigate the complaints of commission members and to recommend a set of rules which will increase the relations of the administrative board and the commissions.

The committee will probably recommend that whenever any action concerning any institution is to be taken by the administrative board, get in touch with the chairman of the commission in charge of the institution. He will be asked to advise and consult with the board before a decision is made. Immediately after any action is taken, complete copies of the resolutions in motion, adopted by the board will be sent to the members of the commission in affected. The new system, however, will probably work both ways in return for the information which the administrative board will furnish the commissions, the commissions will probably be required to furnish the administrative board with copies of the minutes of their various meetings. These have heretofore been supplied only to April T. Murray, head of the state welfare department.
