## FARMER SHOT TO KILL FORMER GOVERNOR OSBORN AT THE SOO

### Soo Homesteader Claims That Osborn Fired at Him First.

SULLY, N.Y., Oct. 5.—(AP) Mattson, a Finn, charged with attempted assault with intent to murder, was bound over to the federal court for trial and committed to jail in default of \$5,000 bond Friday afternoon. Following the preliminary hearing by Judge Joseph A. S. Mattson, Mattson, through an interpreter, claimed that he shot at Osborn because the latter was hunting ducks on his land and because Osborn fired at him first. He said that he wanted Osborn to be shot there as a number of ducks owned by him had been shot by hunters recently. He was retrieving a killed duck when Mattson appeared with his rifle and fired three shots. Osborn said. ### DIPLOMAS GIVEN TO WAR VETS BY MICHIGAN A. C.

LANSING, Oct. 5.—The most impressive and the most unusual commencement ceremony ever held at the Michigan Agricultural College was observed when 16 World War veterans, all of whom more or less disabled, lined up to receive diplomas from their "peep" courses. Some of the ex-service men had one arm, others were troubled with their eyes, or throats, one about being blind and one of the group appeared on crutches. They were the first class of a group of 40 wounded veterans who some time ago elected to take, under the government's rehabilitation plan, preparatory work so they could enter college. The exercises were held in the Agricultural Hall. The audience was small and the speakers were few, but what the audience lacked in size it made up in the fact that the families of eight of the veterans came from long distances to watch the distribution of diplomas. Also here, there are 16 men of the Michigan Agricultural College taking special courses under the federal act. The students mentioned here are the only ones who have completed a college preparatory course. Many of the others are taking practical courses, such as agriculture, horticulture, horticulture and general agriculture.

To wink at the breaking of our law and preach the observance of an other is unpatriotic and an American I believe the successful liberals will vigorously aid in the enforcement of the dry laws as those who have always been dry. Any other policy means chaos and bolshevism. Regardless of personal views every good citizen will regard as imperative the enforcement of the prohibition act and laws in which it is fundamental." The prohibition director refers to the press as being "the most powerful agency in the working of public sentiment." "An appeal to editorialist, the cartoonist, the reporter, the scenario writer and the playwright to lead every aid to law enforcement," his statement continues. "Every publication which states or infers that the dry program is easily violated or should be violated, or that it is a joke, is not only warring against the law, but is also encouraging an attitude that tends to encourage disregard of all laws."

SOVIET RESTRAINS ITS DESIRE FOR GORE

That the Moscow soviet government occasionally finds it politic to refrain from unrestrained indulgence in its love of blood and revenge, is indicated by the report from Riga that the members of the Gorky famine relief committee recently arrested in Moscow, are to escape with no more severe punishment than banishment from the bolshevik dominions.

There is no doubt that the soviet unit is very angry at Gorky and his associates and would like to eliminate them because it was they who brought about the intervention of the American relief commission, whose entrance into Russia the bolsheviks were loath to permit, and whose workers, in executing the country, in spite of conditions that made them work in absolute ignorance of Moscow, so that there is no chance to get any graft whatever.

The American relief expedition helps the Russians, but it does not help bolshevism. On the contrary its real effect will be to turn the hearts of millions toward American and American institutions, which is not at all what the bolsheviks desire, and he certainly is not going to continue the high price for this situation to pass. If he is refraining for some reason, it is because he fears the reaction of the people, who are holding in silence.

NEW EVIDENCE OF THRIFT

Newspapers throughout the nation have commented editorially on a recent statement issued by the Savings Department of the Treasury Department to the effect that the people are now saving \$2,000,000,000 in small government savings securities.

Since these securities may be regarded as representing only a small part of what the people are doing in the way of savings, says the New York Times, it is evident that thrift is being practiced widely and successfully.

This is indeed an encouraging report. It means that we have the proper basis for prosperity. When thrift is practiced, they promote business. They do not believe in speculation and they do not believe in wild speculation. The money that Americans have been saving is being invested wisely. This money is being put to work. It means a beginning to feel the effects of it.

And the most encouraging sign of all is that the government also is going to practice thrift by strict economy. Every department of Washington is being told how much it can save in millions. Some \$1,000,000,000 of dollars already have been wiped off the budget. A thrifty people and a thrifty government will make an effective combination in following the road to prosperity.

AN AGREEMENT ON YAP

It is stated authoritatively, though not with all the formality of an official statement, that Secretary Hughes and Komin Sushokan have reached a basis for settling the Yap dispute and that the allied and associated powers have approved the plan it will become a formal agreement. Since Yap is part of the territorial subject to mandate, this agreement understanding is necessary, but Japan and the United States are the only powers interested and their agreement means an agreement all around.

The Yap question in and of itself never has been so important as the amount of ink spilled over it has seemed to indicate, but it has had importance as a scorpion. Various small matters have arisen to irritate Japan and the United States. There have been combined with certain large affairs, and out of the actualities and possibilities so presented, has grown a theory that the United States and Japan are destined some day to clash very seriously. Pessimistic minds have seen in Yap, the spark to start the fire.

If Yap ever was such a matter, it has been extinguished and besides this direct gain, the Yap dispute has removed one more obstacle in the way of a friendly meeting at the conference on armaments.

COMING HOME TO ROOST

The movement among Republican senators to institute a real cloture rule so that a majority of the members of the upper house can cut off unlimited debate where unlimited debate is likely to obstruct the will of that majority, as in the possible case of peace treaty ratification is plainly causing a good deal of drama on the Democratic side.

Though cloture in the senate is of more than doubtful desirability, the panic in the minority party can scarcely fail to bring little bubbles of amusement to the faces of all who remember the origin and history of the more recent cloture movements in the senate.

For if the Democrats had not themselves, jettisoned the bill rolling when they were in a majority, and if they had not gone just as far as they were able to go in their efforts to get a majority with which to institute cloture, there probably would be no thought now of trying to put a limit on senate debate. FORSYTH'S SCOUTS, THE ORIGINAL "ROUGH RIDERS"

This is the story of 51 scouts, instead of just one, for together they won another fame in one of the most famous expeditions ever made with the Indians as the frontier. They were Forsyth's Scouts, the "Giant Scouts of 1846." They were led by George A. Forsyth, who had been killed in Civil War days.

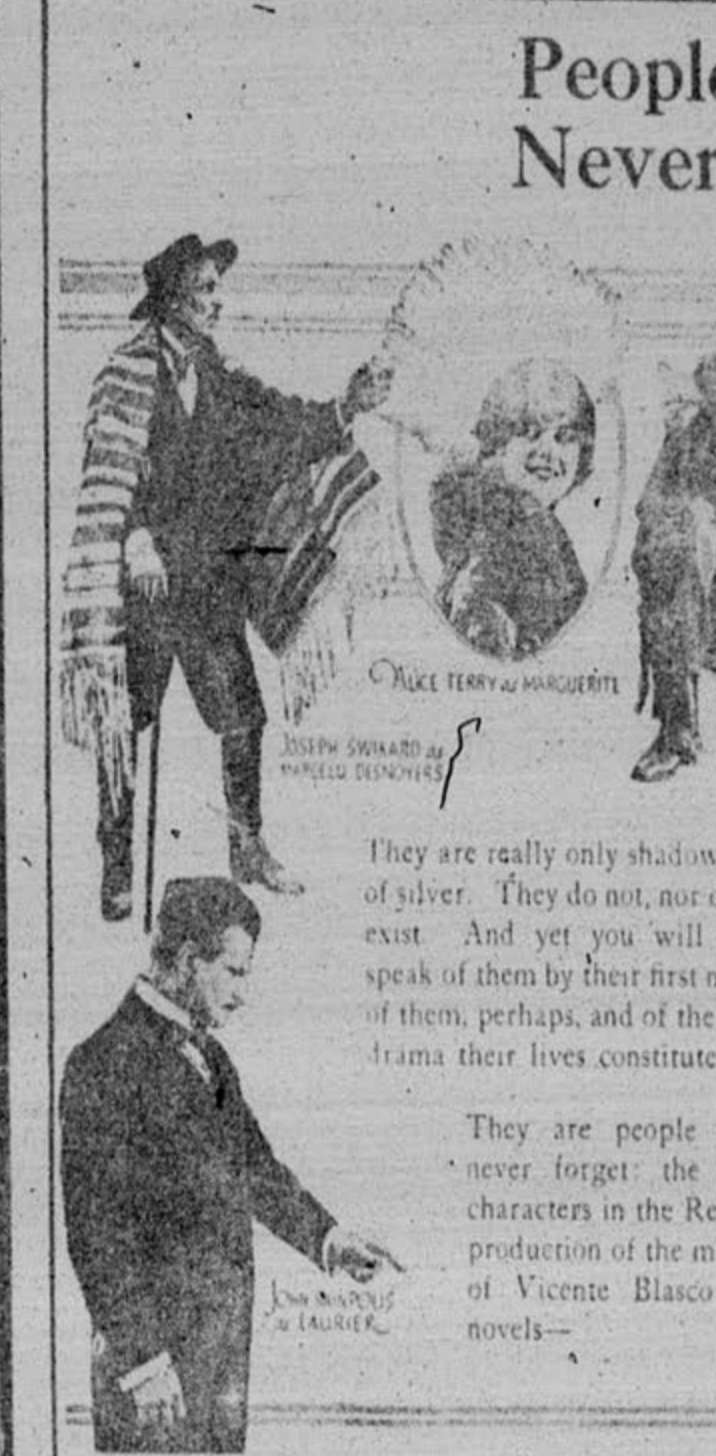
