MEETING UNEMPLOYMENT SITUATIONS

The Department of Commerce made public today a partial list of funds authorized or raised by various cities throughout the country to relieve distress caused by present unemployment.

New Haven is raising a community chest of \$500,000, which includes an item of \$50,000 for an emergency fund for the unemployed. In Hartford, Conn., small sums are advanced to unemployed persons on their notes in favor of the city for repayment.

In Detroit, \$2,000,000 has been appropriated to meet the unemployment situation. Indianapolis has had an audit of city funds, and with \$100,000 available, has commenced work on relief and street work with a constantly increasing payroll of deserving men which now aggregates 1,200.

The finance committee of the Chamber of Commerce, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., will lend up to \$100 to any unemployed man of reputable character, and accept his note for 30 days at reasonable interest charged to make up for any loss which may occur through failure to pay.

INDICATIONS OF OIL IN MISSISSIPPI

Observations made by the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, and the Mississippi State Geological Survey in the vicinity of Yazoo City, Mississippi, have thrown new light on the question of the possible presence of oil in Mississippi and on the location of points that may be favorable for test drilling.

Oil has not yet been found in commercial quantities in the coastal plain of either Mississippi or Alabama, although a number of wells have been drilled there on pronounced anticlines, and their failure to obtain oil prohibits any great optimism concerning the presence of oil in the coastal plain of Mississippi.

TREMENDOUS GOVERNMENT EXPENSES

Government financial operations since the country's entrance into the World War involved more than \$200,000,000,000, according to figures compiled recently by the Treasury on the basis of daily statements from April 6, 1917, to December 31, 1921.

Starting on the eve of the year, April 5, 1917, with a net balance in the general fund of \$22,000,000, receipts, exclusive of principal debt, from April 6, 1917, to December 31, 1921, totaled \$24,018,000,000, while public debt receipts during the same period amounted to \$75,643,000,000.

Disbursements, exclusive of public debt, for the period aggregated \$15,785,000,000, while public debt disbursements totaled \$53,481,000,000, and on December 31, 1921, the net balance in the general fund was \$488,000,000.

RACINE PAPER MOVES INTO NEW QUARTERS TODAY

New Building of Journal News Contains Twice the Floor Space of Old Building.

(By Associated Press)
RACINE, Wis., Jan. 28.—The Journal News will move into its new home here today. The paper will occupy a structure that costs \$115,000 exclusive of the site, while additional equipment including a 24 tubular press cost around \$40,000.

The structure is 110x60, located on the corner of Fourth and Wisconsin streets, and has over double the area of the old home. It is two stories in height, the proof of concrete construction. The composing room has excellent daylight facilities with large skylight and is equipped throughout with steel furniture and a battery of eight linotype machines.

The main business office is on the first floor where the local reporters, advertising and circulation departments and three private offices. Ofices on the second floor have the Associated Press representative desk

editors, proof readers and foreman. The press room is also located on the first floor in one corner.

The basement has ample storage facilities for print paper, and a large carrier and mail room. Two freight vaults are on the first floor and basement.

The enclosing walls of the building are of brick and the exterior finish of a varnished roughed brick with large Bedford stone corners and trimmings. The office lobby has a terrace floor and an ornamental open-airway leading to the second floor. The office furniture is golden oak and the counters and partitions are of birch.

F. W. Starbuck, president of the company and also editor, comes of an old newspaper family as his father, C. W. Starbuck, owned The Citizen-Times before and during the Civil War. Detroit Employers Association Show Marked Increase in Number of Jobs During January.

DETROIT, Jan. 28.—Marked improvement in the employment situation here this month, as shown in the labor barometer of the Detroit Employers' Association composed of 75 companies.

According to figures compiled by the association the number of persons employed by its members jumped from 51,900 at the end of 1921 to 104,465 on January 1st. Of this number, 54,343 are working on reduced schedules. The average working week is 33 1/2 hours.

The large automobile factories figured conspicuously in the increase, it is stated. The association members began operations last year with approximately 27,000 employees.

"A man may have honest looking eyes that will gaze into your soul without wavering, while he is trying to put over the biggest shag game in the world," said Mr. Keen, "but no matter how practiced a crook he may be there is a certain little nervousness that will show around his mouth."
