The naval treaty, which limits the number of battleships and cruisers, was adopted by the League of Nations. The Shantung agreement, which was signed in 1915, gave Japan control over the province of Shantung.

UNITED STATES TO RE-ESTABLISH HAWAIIAN TRIBE

Financial Aid of the Federal Government Is Sought by Hawaiian Homes Commission.

MONROE, T. H. Federal agent in charge of the Hawaiian Homes Commission will be sought in the movement to re-establish the vanishing Hawaiian race.

George P. Cooke, executive secretary of the commission, conferred with Colonel C. H. Blomquist, chief topographical engineer of the Department of the Interior, while the latter was here inspecting topographical work.

The cost of the irrigation system is estimated at not less than \$1,000,000, and by Joseph Jorgensen, commission engineer. It will necessitate tunneling of tunnels through the volcanic structure of Moakai and presents an additional problem to the commission.
