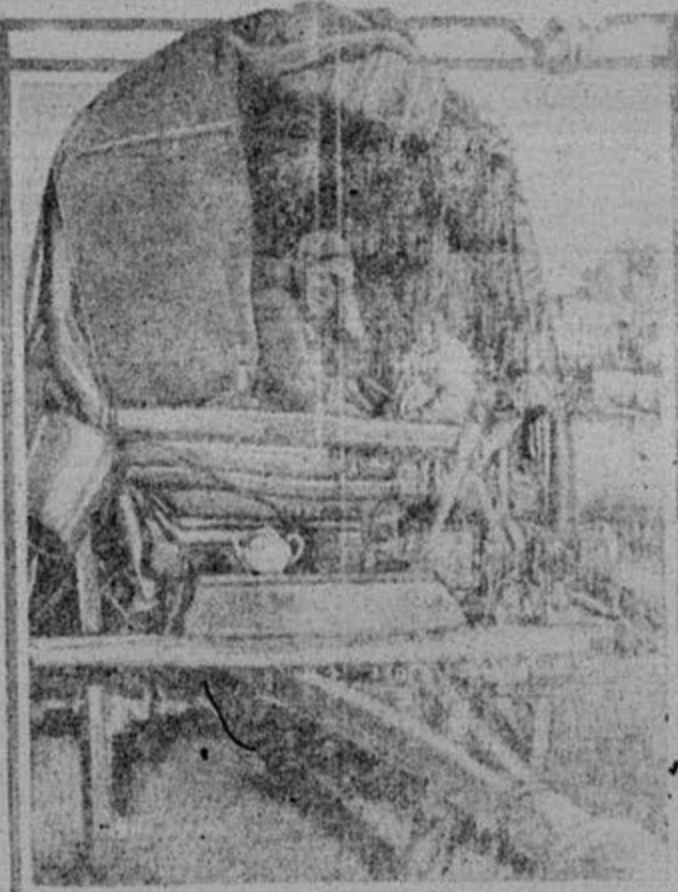

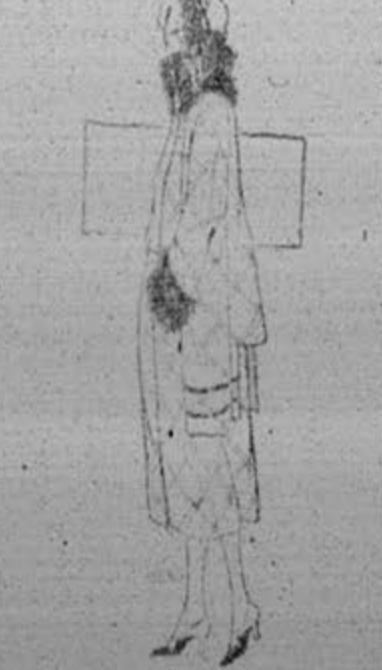



LET'S BE SENSIBLE

Some one has written a regular "Woodman Spare That Tree" article for a local publication, taking as the terrible example the old Stephenson dock and picturing it as it was fifty years ago when it wasn't at all...

Since the Stephenson dock was built it never was taxed to its capacity but once and that was one fall when several hundred barrels of kerosene oil were shipped through Escanaba to points in the peninsula.

Thirty years ago, the Stephenson dock was a busy place. There were several boats a week from Green Bay and a weekly boat from Escanaba to points on Big Bay.

Any time a boat load of freight wants to be unloaded at Escanaba, it can find a place to unload it. The Stephenson dock has not been kept in repair because there was no reason why it should be.

The lack of a daily boat to Fayette and Cadillac and Nanticoke is not because there is no dock in Escanaba, but because there is no business for a boat, therefore, no business for a dock.

The Goodrich line is out to make money in carrying freight and passengers, but there is no business along either line out of Escanaba.

Both Escanaba and Gladstone have been ports of call for ocean going ships. In fact, the Soo Line tried to establish a Lakes-to-Ocean freight—but it did not work out.

Front-end ships are able to sail or steam from the Atlantic ocean to Escanaba and Gladstone. When the Soo Line began on trying this out, a ship loaded at Gladstone with dead weight steamed back to Sweden, but the experiment did not work out and the Foam, which was the name of the ship, was never able to get a full load back to any point this side of the seafloor.

In answering the question, "What Will We Get?" the enthusiastic scribbler says we can get a shipment of cloves from India.

Sure we could—and do it any time we want to—buy a cargo of pepper or cloves or coffee. The St. Lawrence river and lakes are as navigable as the Amazon river and boats loaded with freight go from Liverpool to Manaus, which is a thousand miles up the Amazon.

Some very large freighters have tied up at local city docks and taken ore to Atlantic ocean ports. Any of these vessels could bring us a load of coffee from Brazil, sugar from Cuba, or cloves from India.

A few years ago the Ohio river was alive with passenger and freight craft, a business the people along the river would like to see revived, but it is not receiving very fast and the prospects are not bright for much headway.

The United States government has spent millions of dollars in deepening inland waterways—most of them never being used afterward. Ohio is a network of canals—little if ever used.

The water from Duluth to the mouth of the St. Lawrence river is deep enough, wide enough and wet enough to accommodate four sized boats if they want to go that way, but they don't seem to be doing it.

Escanaba needs a great big merchandise dock just about as much as it needs a great big barn to accommodate the horses that are driven in by tourists and visitors.

Certainly, the Stephenson dock was closed down for lack of business. But it was not closed down because it was not large enough to take care of the business.

The Stephenson dock was kept up in good shape as long as there was an business. Freight agents for steamships have canvassed the city numerous times in order to try to get freight business between Escanaba and Chicago—there was none to go out and lake shipments on 85 per cent of merchandise in was too slow.

For many years there was one boat line between Escanaba and upper bay ports, but when the street car line was built, the boat business stopped suddenly.

Gladstone had one of the best built merchandise docks on the lake, but it did not pay and was moved up the street and turned into a garage.

There is still a large merchandise dock at Gladstone near the big elevator and a considerable amount of package freight passes through that port each season.

THE BEGINNING OF TROUBLE

According to General Pershing the government can save about \$3,400,000 a year by dispensing with the services of some 2,000 army officers whom he considers inefficient.

It will be interesting to see how that recommendation works out. If there are 2,000 inefficient officers in the army, they should, of course, be retired or otherwise disposed of. Any man in congress or the war department will agree to that, but the question as to who is inefficient and who must go, is different.

There was a time when it was currently reported that pull counted for more in the army than merit. That complaint has not been heard lately, but if two thousand officers face the plucking board, it is fairly certain that members of congress will begin to hear from their friends who are friends of officers, and, whatever a retiring board does, will produce protests and charges of injustice.

It is our guess that congressmen are not going to be quick about turning their attention from legislative matters to General Pershing's suggestion.

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
