## AIR NAVIGATION LAW

The necessity for a national law regarding aviation was called to the attention of Congress and its first speech by Representative Hicks of New York, in which he took up some of the legal aspects of the question. The old title, derived from the Roman law, to the effect that the owner of a tract of land can fly over it, has apparently been giving some lawyers a little trouble. The maximum has been stated as good law on innumerable occasions in court and in the books. It is equally good law that a person flying over his neighbor's land can do so only if he foregoes flying over his neighbor's land and any aircraft and passenger the track will make its owner liable to actions for trespass. The view of the law has actually been approved by the legal advice of the Federal air service, but since the rule was made to fit conditions that attended the invention of the airplane, many creatures and is no longer reasonable, even of itself, to actions for trespass. 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Some such law is needed in the United States, but the general government cannot proceed except under its power to regulate interstate commerce. Multifarious laws governing licensing, inspection and navigation in the various states might become burdensome and intolerable. This difficulty has never been fully met in the control of commerce on the water, but such navigation of the air is a relatively new thing, it might be possible to secure uniform state laws by a vigorous common purpose.

Use of other means will be a constitutional amendment giving the general government exclusive power to regulate navigation of the air.

## AN OPINION FROM DR. COPELAND

John W. Copeland, health commissioner of New York, who first called the medical profession to the discussion of the movement to organize the medical school at Ann Arbor, has reached the conclusion that doctors ought to advertise.

Dr. Copeland was anxious to make that statement by the authority of Dr. Lorenz, his attorney, to his wife. Thousands of people, it may be learned for the first time, what the medical profession can do in an important class of improvements because Dr. Lorenz was well advertised. There is a season in which it is possible to agree with Dr. Copeland. A greater amount of intelligently directed publicity would, doubtless, tend to more intelligent action upon the part of those who need the services of a physician. The trouble is to discover a method by which such publicity can be secured without giving the public a better chance than the conscientious, scrupulous doctor.

Undoubtedly the kind of advertising that would be most attractive to a very large part of the public is the kind that would not be characterized by scientific accuracy of statement. The oldest physician, if he told the truth, would make a sorry showing on the bill boards against any charlatan with an夸大的 confidence and no gifts more valuable than impudent assurance.

Perhaps the best solution of this difficulty that the medical profession could reach would be some form of common advertising in which the claims of the medical profession were set forth for the benefit of the public. There may be a limit to the medical man also in the policy adopted by the organized profession when they adopted the common designation "regulars," and by advertising that name advised every dealer who had the right to claim it.

## IF YOU HAVE A BAD COLD

In a statement telling people how to dress in order to avoid taking colds by exposure to excessively severe weather, Henry F. Vangna has added this word of advice that can bear very great emphasis: "Anyone catching a bad cold should forget his work and take to bed immediately, and rest for a day or two in order to build up the body."

Generally a cold is a serious thing only when it is neglected. And the most flagrant neglect is failure to rally physical resources in order to fight it and drive it out of the system. The man or woman who "keeps going" while suffering from a bad cold is courting pneumonia or bronchitis, or tuberculosis. That man or woman is flirting with death. While ordinary quiet at home helps a great deal in the fight for quick and thorough recovery, there is nothing quite so beneficial and sure as complete relaxation between the covers, with nothing to do but eat and sleep.

A good many people who are now in their graves would be alive and happy if they had not allowed themselves to be victims of the mistaken idea that a cold amounts to little and can safely be ignored. In a climate like ours that idea is a pernicious fallacy.

FAMINE HORRORS  
DRIVE SUFFERERS  
TO EATING CATS

Horrible Condition Exists in  
Spassky Province Along  
the Volga River.

By Associated Press

RASSAK, on the Volga, Feb. 9.—The famine in the Spassky district of the province has caused some of the people to resort to the eating of cats, dogs and the flesh of horses or starved horses and cattle.

While yet the exception, the sight of the humanitarians in the village of Gostyukhino shows what the winter may bring to the whole village, the father and son of the family of the poor, who are daily robbing the American rice distribution, then breaking some ration.

Exhaust Cat Supply

People who followed the horses as they found them could do so only if they could find the animals in the village, and when this was done, exhausted, starved cattle came to the poor village no longer able to stand, and a few hundred of men and women stood.

The village council of Spassky, to which the author is assigned with his parents, to March 1, 1918, when he learned of the famine, was taken to the village of White Horse, where the last remaining horses were sold to the cavalry, and the men and women who had fed the entire community of about 8,000 people for a long period of time had to go to the city of Saratov.

PENSION REPORT

Local Employees Interested in  
Disbursements Made Last  
Year on the Marquette  
Range.

Following points will be interested in the eleven annual reports of the U. S. Steel Company and Carnegie Steel Company for the year 1921, which has just been issued. The report shows the disbursements of pension funds for the Marquette Range, the largest and the second largest in the country.

Mr. Johnson was born in Saratov, N.
