DEEP INTEREST IN SELLING MICHIGAN TO WOLVERINES

Tour Starting Next May Will Be First of Kind Ever Attempted by Any State.

(By Associated Press) DETROIT, Mich., April 11.—State-wide interest is being shown in the campaign to sell Michigan to Wolverines. The tour will start May 1 with a tour by prominent persons of the chief cities of the state, according to chief received here from industrial and commercial leaders in all parts of Michigan. The campaign is designed to impress upon Michigan citizens the future possibilities of their various districts and of the state as a whole, and to foster a general spirit of state pride. The tour will be made by representatives of ten development bureaus, state departments and similar organizations. The party will hold a meeting in each of several cities and each speaker will give a brief address at every point of the possibility of a certain section of the entire state. Although the Northern Peninsula will not be included on the present tour, it will have one or more champions who will speak of the development possibilities there. The tour will start in Detroit, Monday, May 1, with a local meeting. The next meeting will be held at Jackson Tuesday noon. Other gatherings will follow at Battle Creek Tuesday night, Kalamazoo Wednesday noon, Grand Rapids Wednesday night, Lansing Thursday noon, Flint Thursday night, Ithaca Friday noon, Saginaw Friday night, and Port Huron Saturday noon. Brief stops will be made at smaller cities and towns along the route. Michigan is the first state to open such a drive. It is believed here. The speakers will be: Governor K. Bishop, state manager of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau, John J. Gibson of Battle Creek, former secretary of the Western Michigan Development Bureau, C. P. Marston of Bay City, secretary of the Southeastern Michigan Development Bureau, John A. Doyle of Lansing, newly appointed commissioner of the state department of agriculture, Albert Stodd, Jr., of Lansing, secretary of the state conservation commission, John L. Lovett, Detroit, executive secretary of the Michigan Manufacturers' Association, Hugh J. Gray, Grand Rapids, secretary of the Michigan Tourist and Resort Association, W. P. Harman, Lansing, director of the bureau and foods and standards, Vera Leving, Lansing, deputy director of the state department of agricultural development, Capt. W. S. Billbreath, Detroit, president of the Michigan Pils Association, and L. C. Baldorf, Detroit, executive secretary of the Michigan Real Estate Association.
