COMPLAINT ON RATE SCHEDULE IN THIS STATE

Hearing Is Being Held in State Capital Today.

(By Associated Press)

LANSING, April 24. Members of the advisory board of the Michigan Inspection Bureau were here today to answer a formal complaint that the state insurance department is disgraced with the manner in which the bureau has been applying rate schedules in Michigan.

The same demands made in previous hearings were made today by L. T. Hands, state insurance commissioner. They were, briefly, that the advisory board change the management of the Michigan Inspection Bureau and see to it that rates are applied under the Dean Schedule in a manner meeting his approval.

Mr. Hands had long reports covering a joint investigation into rates by state and bureau raters.

Today's hearing probably is the final step in the action started by Mr.

Hands months ago when he made his original charges of misapplication of rates and exorbitant charges.

LANSING, Mich., April 24. The following valuations of public utility properties in this state have been tentatively made by the state board of assessors as the basis for tax collections for the primary school fund this year.

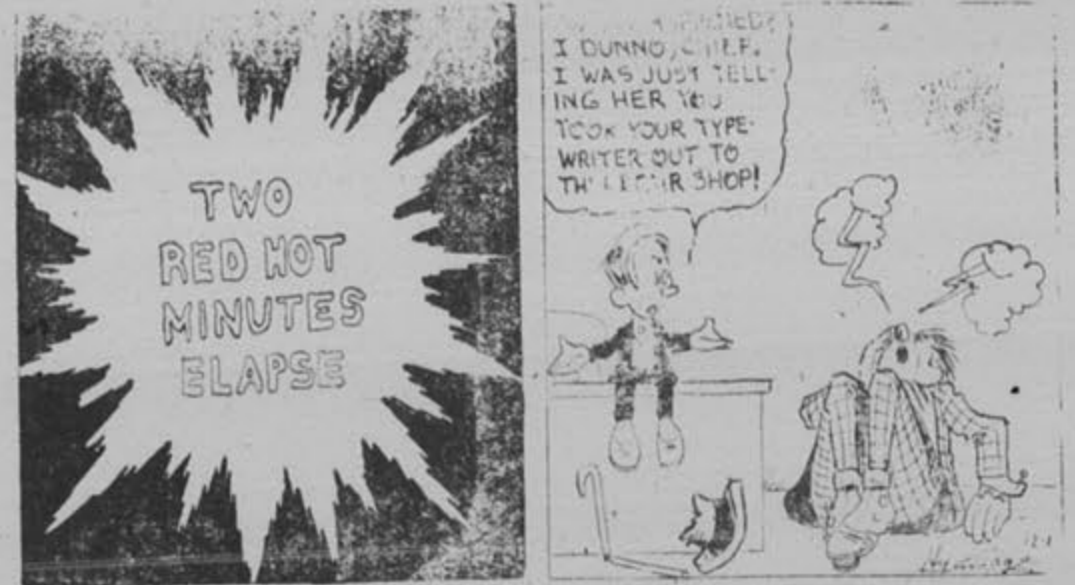

Vital Statistics for the First Quarter Similar to Last Year

LANSING, April 24—Michigan completed the first three months of 1922 with birth, death and infant mortality rates practically the same as those reached during the corresponding period of 1921, the quarterly report of the state department of health shows.

Births totaled 22,112 and deaths 12,250, being equivalent to a general birth rate of 22.7 and a general death rate of 12.5 per 1,000 population. In 1921 the rates averaged 25.3 and 12.4 for the first three months. Infant mortality decreased from 86.5 to 86.4 deaths of children under one year of age to every 1,000 living births.

While death rates showed a tendency during March last to raise above those of preceding months, due to the seasonal prevalence of pneumonia and other late winter and early spring diseases, authorities expect the customary low rates to prevail during the spring and summer months. No widespread epidemics exist in the state at the present time, according to reports.

Only measles, typhoid fever, pneumonia, and polio-myelitis show increases in reports over last year. Tuberculosis, diphtheria, scarlet fever, Whooping cough, smallpox and meningitis are less prevalent.

Upper Peninsula Is Going After Forest Experiment Station

MARQUETTE, April 21—The Upper Peninsula Development Bureau has started a campaign in behalf of the bill introduced in the United States senate by Senators Townsend and Kellogg, providing for establishment and maintenance of a forest experiment station in the lakes states. George E. Bishop, secretary of the Bureau, makes the following statement concerning the need for such a station: "From a position of leadership in lumber production less than 20 years ago Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota have become a relatively unimportant factor in lumber production, due to wasteful methods in the past. While this situation, brought on by depopulation of our forests, exists, there is in the lake states an area of approximately 20,000,000 acres of land more valuable for timber growing than for any purpose. Yet this territory practically is an idle waste. Either the country must go without timber or else pay excessive prices. Reforestation of the waste lands

should not be left to chance. Intensive methods insuring a maximum of success at the least cost should be developed. Fire, that has been the curse of the forests, should be reduced or eliminated. Methods of cutting should be developed that will insure natural reforestation. Before the lake states can be restored to first importance in lumber production the district must have a forest experiment station. Conditions in the three states are similar and the problems are regional rather than state in their character. We must protect the forests that we now have, practice economy in the use of our wood supply, exterminate forest fires, and provide forest service stations where millions of trees adaptable for forest planting may be reared until they are old enough to be set out. Mr. Bishop's statement is based to a considerable extent on a review of the situation in the three states by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, who favors the project.
