CAR THEFT RING IN NORTH BROKEN

Loot Taken From Milwaukee Road Trains Found in Florence

DETROIT, Mich., May 28.—The car theft ring which operated in the vicinity of Florence, Wis., was broken up by the Milwaukee Road police. The loot taken from Milwaukee road freight cars between Florence and Peabody, Wis., was found in a warehouse in Florence.

Railroad detectives have been working on the case for several months in an endeavor to break up the gang that for a year or more has systematically robbed freight cars of merchandise that could readily be marketed.

Learning that Levine who last paid a \$2,000 fine in Marinette the same offense owned a farm side of Florence they obtained search warrant and with officials of the farm. En route they met a truck heavily laden with merchandise. Seeing the wagon stopped the driver said he had been hired by Levine who, learning of the impending raid endeavored to move the merchandise from his premises. Merchandise on the trucks, valued at about \$3,000, included cases of cigarettes, woolen blankets, shoes, silk hose, aprons flannel shirts and various other articles in small lots.

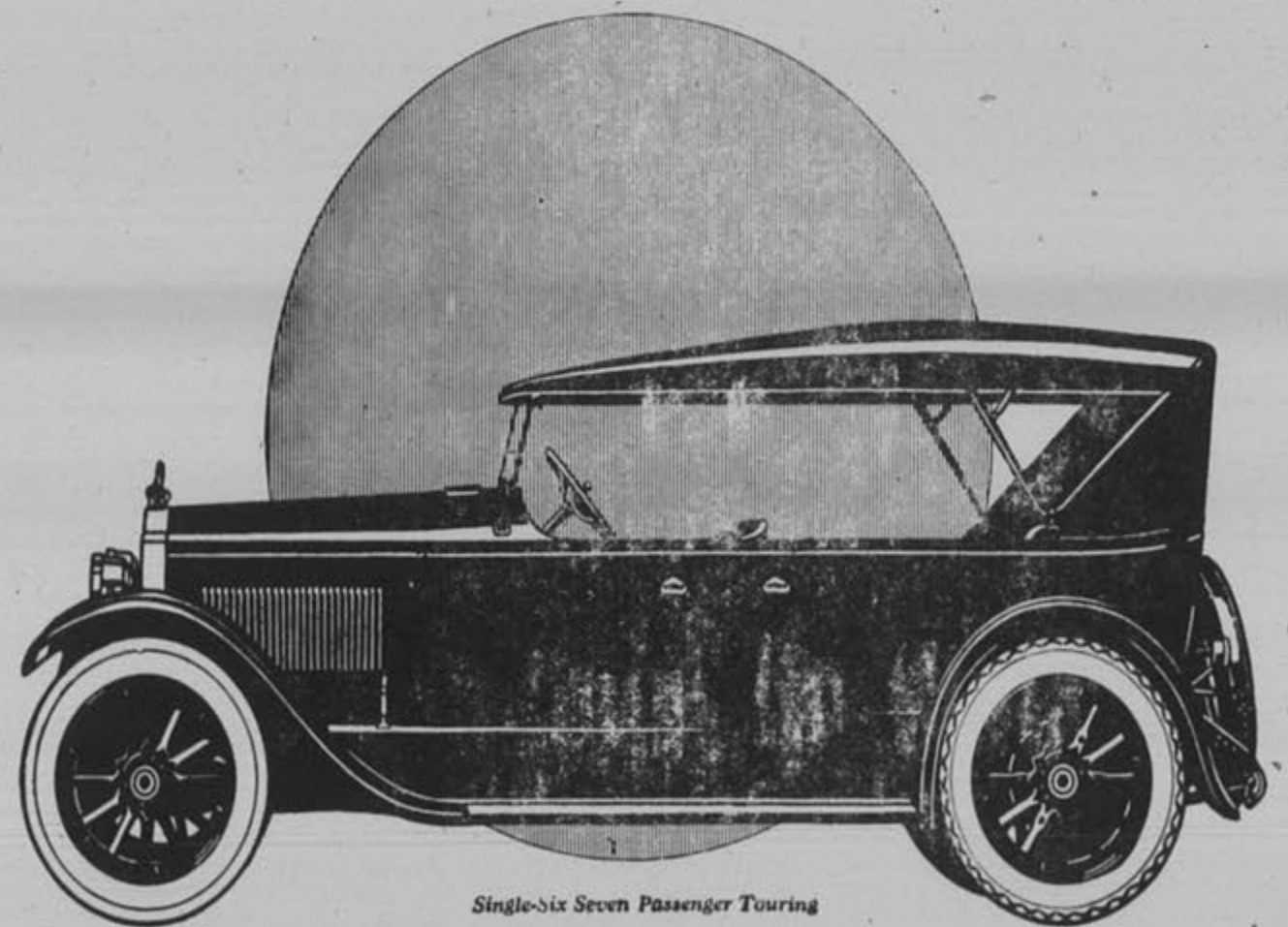

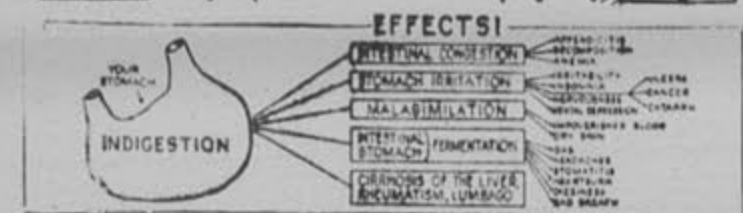

ARRANGEMENTS FOR MEMORIAL DAY ARE NOW FULLY MADE

Appropriate Program to Be Carried Out by Various Organizations in This City Tomorrow.

Appropriate Memorial Day services were held at St. Joseph's church yesterday when members of the American Legion from all parts of the county attended in a body. High mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Erasmus Dooley, chaplain of Cloverland Post. Yesterday's services marked the preliminary observance of the sentiment and spirit of Memorial Day which will be carried out here tomorrow.

Tuesday morning graves of the soldier dead will be decorated and brief services will be conducted at local cemeteries.

At noon the Woman's Relief Corps will serve dinner at the Eagle Hall on South Ninth Street, to every former service man of the county. The afternoon program will be conducted jointly by the American Legion, other veterans associations and the Woman's Relief Corps.

A. C. Moore, of Summer Island, will deliver the address of the day at Ludington Park in the afternoon. Mr. Moore's close affiliations with war activities and the interest he has shown in legion affairs makes him a suitable speaker for the occasion.

Program Tuesday

At 9 o'clock in the forenoon committees of the organization will start from the Eagle Hall to decorate the graves of comrades resting in St. Joseph's and St. Anne's cemeteries. At 10:30 same morning, C. P. Smith Post, G. A. R. Woman's Relief Corps, Spanish War Veterans, Sons of Veterans, American Legion, Ex Soldiers and Marines and all other military or civil organizations of this city, will leave

the Eagle hall for Lakeview cemetery to hold ritual services, honor their dead, and the flower committees will decorate the graves of all comrades sleeping there. Mrs. George Ramsey, president of the Woman's Relief Corps, will read Lincoln's Gettysburg address, followed by taps, thence all will return to the Eagle hall where the Ladies of the Relief Corps will serve dinner for the organizations and invited guests.

The public services of the day will be held at Ludington Park at 3 p. m. An invitation is hereby extended to the Soldiers, Sailors and Marines, public schools, Boy and Girl Scouts, St. Patrick's Boys' Brigade, and all other organizations. Mayor, city and county officers wishing to join in the parade, to meet in the afternoon and accompany the post and Woman's Relief Corps to Ludington Park, where marine services will be held, followed by the usual speaking and other entertaining exercises.

Taxation Will Be Explained Tonight

Pays Much; Gets Little
What does Escanaba receive for the \$209,400 paid annually to the primary school fund and State taxes? She, of course, receives her proportionate share of benefits derived from the 36 different departments, boards and institutions of the State. For this Escanaba pays her share with the \$22,000,000 State Tax.

What else does Escanaba receive for this \$209,400 paid to the State in primary school fund? Escanaba received last year \$44,000.00 primary school interest money. If these deductions are made, we have the following:

Total paid to the State and Primary School fund \$209,400.00
Less: State Taxes 32,000.00
Primary school Int. money 44,000.00 76,000.00
Surplus received by the State primary school fund \$133,400.00

For this \$133,400.00 Escanaba receives nothing. The State receives this amount over and above that which Escanaba receives in return by way of

is a measure of the extent to which the State of Michigan profits at the expense of Escanaba each year. If this is divided by 14,000, the population of this city, it gives \$9.52 the average amount per capita by which the State with a tax rate of \$2.88 per cent profits at the expense of Escanaba with a tax rate of \$5.24 per cent.

Must Correct Injustice

Escanaba might as well stop fooling herself by thinking that she can become the modern city that she deserves to be until this injustice is corrected. Her high school attendance has increased 53 per cent within the last three years. We are in need of a new school building. Our city suffers for lack of improved streets, an adequate street lighting system, addition of park facilities, etc. but with a bonded indebtedness of \$540,000, with a tax rate almost twice the average of the State, with the highest assessment of property in proportion to actual value, of any city in the Upper Peninsula with possibly one exception, where are we to turn for other sources of revenue?

"In the face of these facts are we to complacently submit, believing that nothing can be done because a few feeble attempts to secure relief have failed?" asks Secretary Bauden of the Chamber of Commerce. "The pleas of the original Thirteen Colonies for Justice were given little consideration from George III until the colonies were actually aroused. Superior, Wisconsin was confronted by a handicapped similar to Escanaba's but of less degree, and secured relief in 1917. Fifty of her representative citizens went to Madison and demanded that the members of the legislature listen to her pleas for fair play, not with their ears, but with their minds tempered

with a reasonably degree of justice. "It behooves the members of the Chamber of Commerce to fill the K. P. hall to capacity tonight and thus show Mr. Lord that this fight for justice is an Escanaba proposition and not a proposition sponsored by a committee of less than a dozen men. This will be an occasion of great moment for Escanaba. An opportunity confronts us. If we want to make Escanaba a better city—let's measure up to it."

ESCANABA IS TO PLAY GLADSTONE MEMORIAL DAY
Big Crowd of Fans Expected to Accompany Local Team.

Escanaba goes to Gladstone for the Memorial Day game and expects to have ample revenge for the defeat of a week ago Sunday in this city. Evans will go on the hill for the locals and it is expected a large crowd of fans may go over to the sister city to help root for the home team to victory.

Next Sunday Escanabans are promised one of the best games of the season. Arrangements have been made to bring the Ford Motor Co. team here from Iron Mountain. This team has defeated Crystal Falls and Marquette this year and is said to be one of the classiest organizations ever alfalfa in the upper peninsula.

Manager Schram, is certain, however, that with the locals getting their fair share of the breaks, he has a team here which will make any ordinary Class B organization step aside. No one ever saw much better ball than was played Sunday, but Escanaba simply didn't get a break in the game.

One unfortunate circumstance in connection with the attendance, it was stated today, was the fact that the Tractor company had apparently made no provision for handling the crowd. There were more than 1200 people at the park, and the management of the ball team, estimates that at least 700 of them walked to the grounds because nothing save the regular car service was maintained until almost three o'clock, when one trailer was added to the regular.

MANY APPLY TO THE CHIEF FOR LICENSE

A large number of applications for licenses were filed with the chief of police today. The present licenses expire on June 1st and tomorrow a majority of those who expect to secure licenses are taking advantage of the opportunity to get their applications in early.

Chief of Police Tolson will pass upon all applications and will make his recommendations to the city council for granting or rejection and council will then pass upon the various applications.

There is considerable interest in knowing whether the number of licenses under the new beverage ordinance will be cut down and it is believed that this matter will depend almost wholly upon the recommendations made by the chief.

Bay Beach Pavilion Opens Tomorrow with Dance by Syncopators

Formal opening of Bay Beach pavilion at South Park will be held tomorrow. Messrs. Dessero and Speer have a portion of the repair program completed and there will be ample accommodations for dancers. The Syncopators will furnish the music and it is expected this will be one of the most popular dancing floors in the county when it is fully completed.

As a feature of tomorrow's opening, it is announced that a pair of black satin dancing pumps are to be given away and also a pair of silk stockings will be awarded the winner of that prize.

C. stated today that any army nurses, who served during the war, and who happen to be in the city tomorrow, are extended a most cordial welcome to participate in the dinner which is to be served to the former soldiers of all wars. The general committee has omitted to specifically mention nurses, but they are invited.

MENOMINEE MAN'S CAR STOLEN HERE AT THE BALL PARK

The first automobile theft of the season and the first here since last August, was committed yesterday afternoon at the ball park, when a Ford coupe, owned by Axel C. Valley, of Menominee, was taken.

The matter is a complete mystery so far the police have been able to discover at this time. Mr. Valley drove up from Menominee with his wife, to see the game. The car was virtually new, having been in Valley's possession less than a week and having been run less than 500 miles.

The license number of the car was 395-771.

Motorcycle Officer Elmer Swanson got on the job as soon as the loss was reported, which was after the ball game, and his investigations took him all the way to Menominee, but up to this time nothing has developed which will throw any light on the theft.

Last year 15 cars were stolen in and about Escanaba and in every case the car was recovered, so the police are hopeful that they can maintain that record by picking up the car and the thief who started the season off here yesterday.

State Police Pick Up Violators of the Auto License Law

Four men all charged with the operation of a motor vehicle without a 1922 license were arraigned in Justice McEwen's court this morning, following their arrest yesterday by members of the state police. The complaints were signed by Officer Sandstrom of the Michigan State Police.

The men are Peter Sabourin, Maurice Feneudale, John Johnson and Edward Lindberg. The latter two were operating motorcycles while the other two were driving automobiles.

All were fined \$5 and costs each.

The state police have been in Escanaba and vicinity for several days. The arrests were all made in the rural districts.

FIGHT AT DANCE COSTS A VICTIM HEAVY PENALTY

Sheriff George Harvey was called to Nahma township Saturday night in connection with a disturbance at a dance in the neighborhood of Isabella. As a result James Nipper, was brought to the county jail and this morning was assessed a fine of \$15 and costs amounting to \$19 more in Justice McEwen's court.

It appears that Nipper had gone to the dance and secured some liquor before and during the party. A fight ensued and he was considerably beaten up.

As a result of this affair, Sheriff Harvey has issued an order that if parties giving country dances will notify him in advance, he will send an officer to preserve order. It is the new sheriff's plan to have his motorcycle force patrol all country roads regularly and to give the country districts such measures of protection as may be possible.

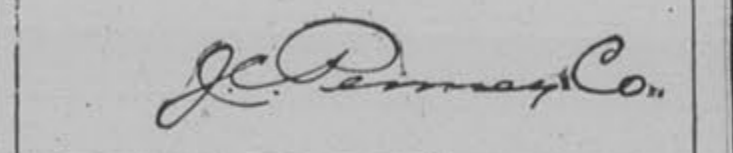
