

TRY STATE'S ANTI-SYNDICALISM LAW

20 ALLEGED COMMUNISTS ON TRIAL NOW

Charged With Plotting Overthrow of the Government.

First Court Action Taken in Big Clean-Up Which Started in Berrien County.

(By Associated Press)

St. Joseph, Mo., Oct. 17.—Twenty alleged communists charged with plotting to overthrow the government of the United States, by force, will be arraigned today in the first part of Michigan's anti-syndicalism law which was passed as a wartime measure.

Sixteen of the 20 were arrested on August 25 by the sheriff and forces of the part of justice agents and deputy sheriffs, who they searched down on a road near Berrien county, near Wadsworth, and interrogated what the government alleges was the national convention of the communist party of America, representatives in this country of the third international of Russia.

Between 70 and 80 radicals had been in attendance at the meeting in the wild, dense country along the shores of Lake Michigan, the government agents claim, but all had fled from the scene before the agents arrived.

Three men, including W. Z. Foster, of steel strike fame, were later arrested at Chicago and extradited. Another, Joseph Z. Sals, was extradited from New York.

Although there might be something glorious in winning a battle, the true school can find something of glory in taking a defeat.

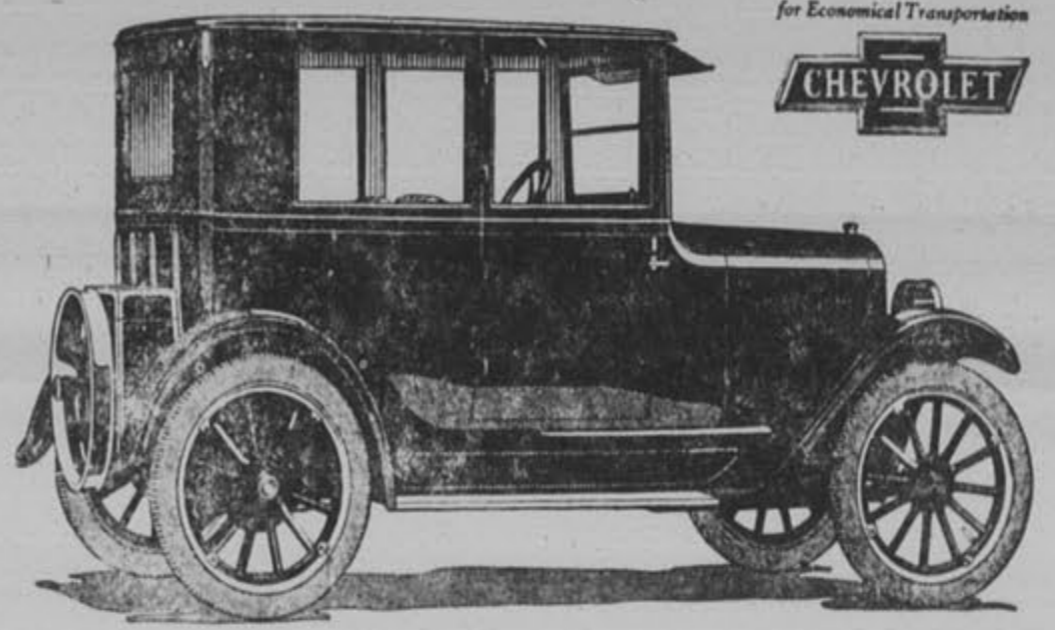

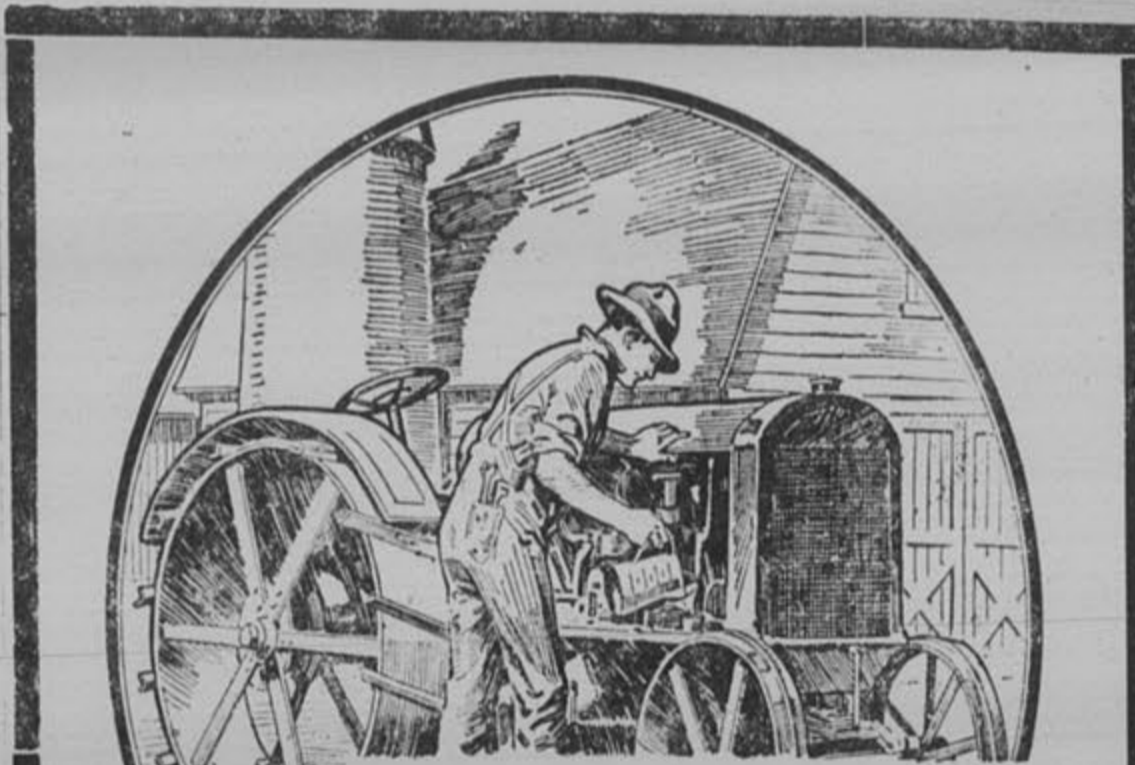

INQUIRY BOARD LOSES NO TIME IN THE MATTER

Big Dirigible Cost the Government \$270,000 Originally.

Accident Believed Due to Fabric Not Being Up to Required Specifications.

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 18.—A board of inquiry consisting of Lieut. A. G. Fraser, Capt. G. W. McIntyre and Lieut. Donald Hinshon, of Brooks field, will begin an inquiry today to determine the causes of the explosion which destroyed the army dirigible C-2 yesterday morning, just as it was starting on an examination flight over the city, carrying 11 passengers of whom 8 were injured by jumping from 15 to 20 feet from the big gas bag just before the hydrogen gas and gasoline tanks exploded. None of the people were seriously hurt.

The 192-foot dirigible had recently completed a cross-country flight from Langley field, Virginia, to San Francisco and was on its homeward voyage. It is a complete wreck. Maj. H. H. Strauss, commander of the C-2, was expected to testify before the inquiry board, that the reason for the accident was caused by the fabric pulling out of the envelope as the big ship started from the hangar. It is the opinion of some of the observers that the fabric was not up to specifications.

Maj. Strauss' estimate of the value of the C-2 was \$270,000. It cost the government originally \$270,000.

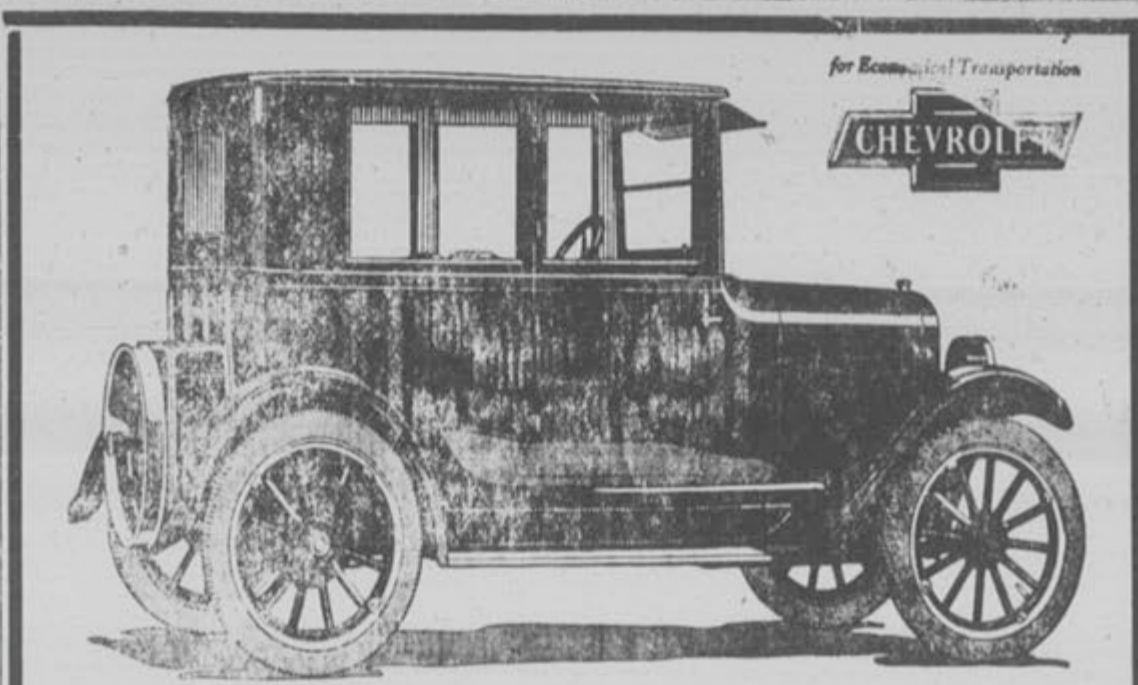

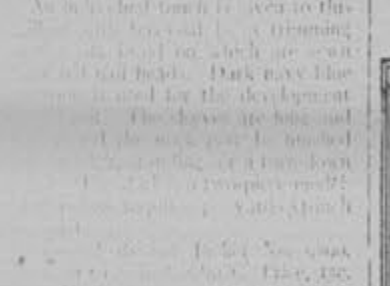
