States included in the conference are Michigan, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Missouri.

Present day figures show an increase in the paving of state and national roads in the U.S. and Canada, but the total amount of paving done is still less than the amount of paving done in the Mississippi Valley during the same period.

Proposed plan is to have a conference of highway officials in the U.S. and Canada in January.

Thus far, he has sent 26 men to jail for terms ranging from 25 days to seven months.




