D.A.R. FOUNDER PASSES AWAY TODAY AT 91

Mrs. Mary Smith Lockwood Had a Most Notable Career.

Affectionately Known as the "Little Mother to the Daughters of the American Revolution."

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Nov. 10. Mrs. Mary Smith Lockwood, founder of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and daughter of the first national president, died today at a hospital here.

Mrs. Mary S. Lockwood, "Little Mother to the Daughters of the American Revolution," was the last survivor of the little group of 18 women who organized the D.A.R. in 1883.

Not only was Mrs. Lockwood identified with the founding and the progress of the D.A.R., but she was an active figure in the Women's Republic organization, and also a noted author. Her chronicles of Washington history, especially "American and Political," have placed her well up on the roll of writers.

Mrs. Lockwood was born at Chatham, N. Y., in 1831, a daughter of the famous Smith family, founders of Smith College. Her ancestors were patriots. Her great-grandfather was a Revolutionary soldier, her grandfather a soldier in the Civil war.

She served as a nurse in the Civil war, and later as a member of the White party, but later became a Republican, and the daughter, who did a great deal of good in her work up to an advanced age, died today.

While the life of Mrs. Lockwood has been a long and eventful one, her greatest contribution to the world was her work for the D.A.R.

Mrs. Lockwood is survived by no close relatives. Her daughter, Miss Effie M. Lockwood, formerly Miss Effie M. Lockwood, of the D. A. R. organization, died several years ago, and her husband has been dead almost half a century.

Bankruptcy Plea Is Filed By Church

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 9.—Because the church is unable to pay the salary of the pastor, the Trinity Protestant Episcopal church of Independence today filed in federal court petition of voluntary bankruptcy. The liabilities are given as \$59,899.20, due the Rev. John V. Plunkett for salary. His salary has been only partly paid since 1911, the petition states. Other debts total \$28.00.

This is the first church which has filed bankruptcy proceedings in the local federal court. The voluntary bankruptcy petition was filed by Christian Friedrichsen and C. A. Hedcrstadt, trustees of the church.

"I'VE WORKED EIGHT HOURS THIS DAY."

Things are looking up for the long-suffering housewife, immortalized by a forgotten poet in a couplet to the effect that "From sun to sun, a woman's work is never done."

In New York a movement has been launched to have the state make arrangements so that mothers who do their own housework will have to devote only eight hours a day to their families. This campaign is predicated on the conclusion of hospital authorities in a given section of that city that the burden of domestic care is responsible for the high percentage of hospital treatment required by these women every year.

Any move tending to ameliorate the condition of the housewife is, on its face, worthy of support. All other classes of labor, both skilled and unskilled, have had their hours shortened by degrees, until in some instances a man headed for work just misses himself returning. The tendency has been steadily toward less work, save in the home, which even with the introduction of labor-saving devices, the house-hold day stretches from daybreak to long after darkness has settled.

Yet to the male, some interesting, and not altogether pleasing, possibilities present themselves in connection with this new move. The prospect of having to clamber from between the covers of a cold winter's morning and prepare one's own breakfast because the household day does not begin with an hour compatible with the prescribed time of arrival at the office or the shop is hardly conducive to enthusiastic support of the plan. Again, consider the elimination of the evening dinner that tops on a perfect day because the eight-hour schedule ended the middle of the afternoon. Of course, in the onward march of events there are minor matters, to which, if it becomes necessary, we could accustom ourselves. Indeed, there is reason to believe that the average man would gladly forego some of the comforts to which he has been accustomed if by so doing he could lighten the drudgery of the home.

However, there is one factor that advocates of an eight-hour day appear to have overlooked, a very important consideration. It may be possible to regulate the domestic schedule so that the older members of the family will be cared for adequately, even if they are not entirely satisfied with the arrangement. But how about the infants, to whom an eight-hour day means nothing, and who have a way all their own of demanding attention whenever they feel in the mood, without consulting the clock, the elements, or the convenience of anybody or anything excepting themselves.

If the sponsors for an eight-hour day can devise some means with which to curb the disturbing, and often discourteous, activities of infantile America so that overtime if applied to them will be eliminated, they will have the hearty support not only of the mothers in whose behalf they have enlisted, but of many a fond father whose slumbers have been broken time and again by juvenile demands for this or that necessity.

GOVERNOR ALLEN'S POLICY.

The early dispatches announcing that Governor Allen had directed the attorney general of Kansas to begin proceedings for the purpose of expelling organizers of the Ku Klux Klan from the state did not make the method by which they were to be turned out entirely clear, but it now appears that the governor relies upon the fact that the organization has no Kansas charter and therefore, in the governor's view, its officials have no right to carry on the work of the order in the state.

That would certainly be true of a business corporation and if the governor is right as to the Klan, his action is a matter of duty as well as policy.

However, another good remedy for objectionable forms of political activity is an appeal to intelligence. Apparently the governor understands this, for instead of merely denouncing klansmen from the capitol he went into a neighborhood where the white hooded fraternity had horsewhipped an unpopular mayor, and told the people on the spot just what he thought of that form of "moral" regulation.

SPORTSMANSHIP IN POLITICS.

The age of chivalry may be dead but there are still a few good sports in the world. One of them appears to be A. J. Damm, who was a candidate for treasurer in the county which boasts Cleveland as a county seat. A few days ago Mr. Damm's opponent suffered a severe injury which took him out of the campaign, whereupon Damm cancelled fifteen engagements to speak and sat down to wait for the election, being unwilling to fight against a man who could not fight back.

It is, of course, possible to be cynical when things of that kind happen, and to say that such an exhibition of the spirit of fair play is the best sort of campaigning. Doubtless there is some truth in that view; but to the extent that it is true, it proves that an appeal to the generous instincts of mankind is not in vain and that, therefore, this is not such a rotten old world as the cynics would have us believe.
