UNUSUAL WINTER BUILDING PLANS GOING FORWARD

Chicago Expects to See Biggest Winter Work in Her Recent History.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—More than the usual amount of winter activity in building with residential work taking a prominent part, is indicated in a survey of activities made by the American Contractor, in twenty-seven states forming the main northeastern part of the United States. Valuation of the 2141 contracts awarded for the week ending October 28, reached a total of \$4,348,000 and was but slightly lower than the weekly average for the first nine months of this record-breaking year, says the publication.

ALIENS TO HAVE NIGHT SCHOOLS IN NORTH ESCANABA

School Board Sanctions Expenditure to Make Schools Possible Again This Year.

Tuesday evening's meeting of the Escanaba school board was of deep interest and many matters of importance were disposed of. Among other matters, it was decided to again open the night schools in North Escanaba for aliens who are eager to take instructions so that they may pass their final examinations for naturalization. The sum of \$150 was authorized to pay for instructors, the hall being furnished free, heated and lighted, while the government furnishes the text books. It is estimated that about eighty applicants for naturalization will avail themselves of this opportunity for self advancement.

To Borrow Money. To meet expenses until the next tax money comes in, a sum not exceeding \$25,000 will be borrowed. An audit of the school books was also authorized. There has been no audit since 1914. It is stated. The board also decided to send Supt. Olds to Lansing whenever he was needed in connection with Escanaba's fight for a more equitable distribution of school tax money.

VACCINATION PLAN UPHELD BY COURT

Compulsion Order Under City Laws Declared Valid.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—The Supreme Court of the United States upheld the validity of legislation and city ordinances, which compel the vaccination of children against disease in a school entrance requirement.

The decision was handed down in the case of *Rosaly Bieda*, a high school girl of San Antonio, Texas, who had sued the health authorities of that city for damages, because they had barred her from school, following her refusal to consent to vaccination.

The case attracted national attention.

The girl challenged the validity of the city ordinance, and carried her appeal to the Supreme Court. The case was deemed of importance to thousands of communities that have similar ordinances.

The Supreme Court denied her claim for damages, and declared the ordinance legal.

Senegal Boxer Has No Regard for Future, His Friends Say.

PARIS, Nov. 15.—"I don't care. I would not go to the United States even if I were offered a purse of 5,000,000 francs. I don't want to go to any country which dislikes and discriminates against negroes," said Battling Siki today, when your correspondent found him roller skating at Luna Park.

Siki, who has enough money since his fight with Georges Carpentier to keep him going for a while, shows a characteristic disregard for the future, and his manager, admits the impossibility of doing anything with the black boxer until he is broke.

"Wait until his money is gone and Siki loses the automobile which he purchased on the installment plan, and he will be unable to pay the rent for the apartment where he is installed with his pretty white mistress, and then he will be glad to quit his staid job and listen to reason," said one of the boxer's friends.

Siki's head is turned because the day after Carpentier was defeated the owner of a shoe polish with the trademark "Black Lion" offered him 5,000 francs weekly to demonstrate the paste.
