No wonder they are pulled out there; a fault to figure out was Shakespeare's coming down from the scene as a consistent beautiful performance, with thought, luster, and head above highest force, not at all on the stage, and then drop from view.

How many have seen Shakespeare's record of amusing extent taking place throughout the country. In addition to the familiar standard in the best of left, numerous new and tender for honor have entered the lists. 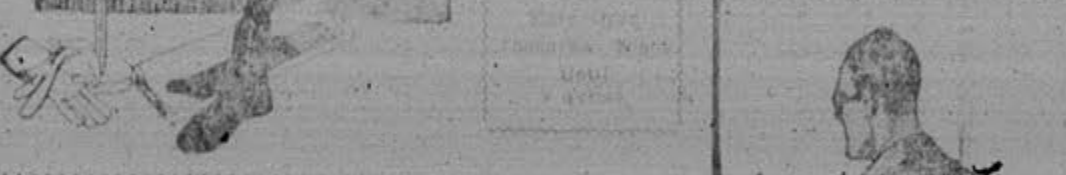
