APPARENT FOR HIS RECOVERY

President and Mrs. Coolige Send Message and Prayer to the Wilson Home Early in the Day; Death Expected Hourly.

Mrs. Wilson Constantly by the Bedside of the Stricken War-Time President; Only Few Close Friends Are Admitted to the House; Dr. Grayson in Charge.

Washington, Feb. 1 (3:15 P. M.) - Personal friends calling at the Wilson home this afternoon were told that the former president was very near death, but that he had awakened from a short sleep and was still conscious,

Digestive Disorder Cause:

Washington, Feb. 1.-Woodrow Wilson, war-time president of the United States, lies near death in the home here, which has been his place of seclusion since he left the White

A digestive disorder, first noted several days ago, developed a condition during the night that was described by his physician, Read 'Admiral Grayson, as "very serious.'

A crisis is believed likely to come before the day is over Mrs. Wilson has been in constant attendance at the bedside and three physicians are also in attendance and an operation may be necessary.

Dr. Grayson Calls in Aids.

In addition to the nurses in attendance during the night, this morning Dr. Grayson called in Dr. Sterling Ruffin and Dr. H. J. Fowler, both of whom had cared for Mr. Wilson while he was ill in the White House.

Aside from the physicians only a few of the former president's closest friends were admitted to the house. Vance Mc-Cormick, former chairman of the Democratic national committee, leaving after a short talk with Mr. Wilson, said that death might come today or might stay its hand until tomorrow.


