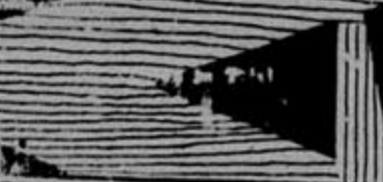

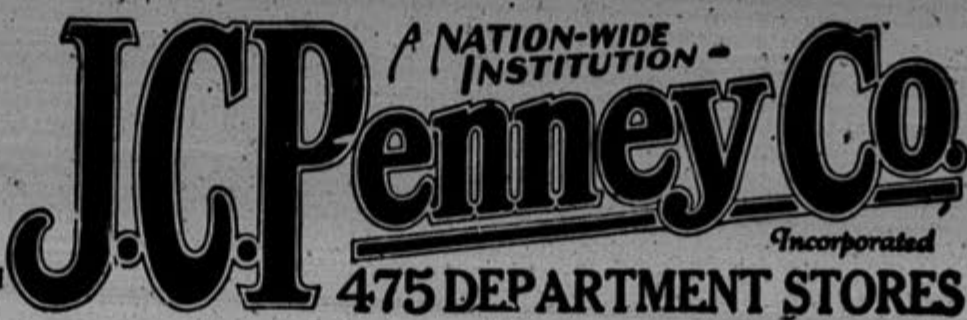

Veterans Urged to File Claims for Disability Soon

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. — Former service men who have not filed claims for disability compensation should do so immediately, Dr. Hines of the Veterans' bureau, declares in a statement, warning of the approach of the five-year time limit during which a veteran may apply for benefit under the war risk insurance act.

"I have found," said Mr. Hines, "that many ex-service men hesitate about filing a claim, but they should not have this thought as their disabilities grow worse instead of better and oftentimes a man delays asking for aid until it is too late. It is this type of former service men that the Veterans' bureau is endeavoring to reach before his time limit has expired."
