

PLANE TRAVEL SAFE--NORTON

Tells of His Flight to Cleveland to Attend Air Races

That air travel today is as safe as any other modern means of transportation, if the passenger is provided with a good plane and an experienced pilot, was the assertion made before members of the Escanaba Rotary club yesterday by H. J. Norton, of Gladstone, an official of the Upper Peninsula Airways, Inc., and one who has probably covered more air miles than any other layman in the peninsula. Mr. Norton has proved his belief in his assertion by using airplanes largely for his trips about the peninsula and to various sections of the country, in recent weeks. He recently attended the air races in Cleveland and made the trip to that city and return by air. Leaving the Escanaba airport at 10 o'clock in the morning, he was in Detroit at 2 p. m. and left that city at 4 p. m. to arrive in Cleveland at 6:30 o'clock.

He asserted that airships from the Escanaba airport are almost daily making the trip to Milwaukee in two hours and to Chicago in three hours and insisted that the people of Escanaba are not awake to the extent with which air travel is being adopted by upper peninsula residents who are using planes from the local field to make these trips.

Mr. Norton described most interestingly the air races held at Cleveland, asserting that the number of machines used in that meet and the maneuvers presented there proved beyond every question of doubt that air travel is as safe as any other means of transportation. If undertaken with proper equipment in the hands of experienced pilots.

Mr. Norton's address was by far one of the most interesting given recently before the Escanaba Rotary club.

MAKE UP MIND, SAYS PREMIER

Agreement on Armaments Comes Before World Peace

Ottawa, Oct. 17 (AP)—The world mind on disarmament must be settled before world peace is attained, is the opinion of Ramsay MacDonald.

The prime minister of Great Britain expressed this view today soon after his arrival at the Government House where he had come from Toronto for a 3 day visit with Premier MacKenzie King, with whom he will discuss Canada's part in the peace movement he instituted with President Hoover.

After declaring in an interview that all members of the British commonwealth of nations would be represented at the coming five-power naval conference in London Mr. MacDonald said his Labor government in Great Britain sees "a world agreement on disarmament which is going to result in world ratification."

He said his purpose in visiting America was to create an atmosphere favorable to a further conference on the naval question, and the issue embraced much more than the attitude of the two pioneering countries in the peace movement—England and the United States. No arrangements would be effected at the London conference in January, he said, without the knowledge and consent of each of the British dominions, and, final agreements will rest with the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France and Italy.

As to what he would discuss in his conversations with Premier King, Mr. MacDonald would say nothing except to suggest taking "with a large grain of salt" intimations in press dispatches that they would discuss demilitarization of Halifax.

The prime minister this afternoon was invited to the premier's summer home before attending as guest of honor and chief speaker at a government dinner tonight.

Clovers, tight wire artists, aerial queens and others of the big top family of the Al O. Barnes circus went as Black Diamond, the most majestic tropsper of them all, went down under the fusillade.

The condemned beast was tractable as it was led to the execution ground chained to three other elephants to prevent a repetition of the burst of fury exhibited last week at Corsicana when Mrs. Eva Donohue, a spectator, was crushed to death and the animal's trainer injured.

"RAT" SEASON OPENS NOV. 1

Muskrat Trapping Licenses Are Received by County Clerk

Trappers need not write to the state conservation department at Lansing this year to secure licenses to trap muskrats as these permits are now available at the office of County Clerk Rayne H. Labre. A supply of 200 muskrat licenses have been received.

B. E. Douglass, Jr., of Bark River procured the first license yesterday.

The fee for a muskrat license is one dollar for twenty traps and ten cents for each additional trap. No more than a hundred traps can be used by an individual.

The trapping of muskrat in the upper peninsula is permissible from November 1 to 30, inclusive. It is unlawful to use firearms, spears, chemicals, smokers or devices other than a trap in taking them at any time. A metal tag, bearing the name and address of the owner, must be attached to each trap. It is unlawful to destroy, disturb or molest any house or hole of the muskrat, or to set traps within six feet of either.

Lack of Rainfall Makes Fire Hazard High in District

Lack of rainfall for the past week has made conditions in the woodland hazardous as far as fires are concerned, and incidentally the U. S. weather bureau issues the following fire warning:

"No rain before close of week. Warmer Friday. Winds mostly moderate to possibly fresh, south to southwest by Saturday. Low to moderate humidity. High hazard. Fire warden were laid off by the conservation department on October 15 as it was considered there was little possibility of forest fires after that date.
