ITALY REPLIES IN IMBROGLIO WITH VATICAN

CHARGE INGRATITUDE OF CHURCH TO FASCISM

Rome, June 6 (AP)—The Catholic Action society was described tonight in a radio broadcast purporting to give the Italian side of the government's controversy with Pope Pius XI, as a "strong organization taking orders from a foreign power, the Vatican State."

The declaration was broadcast during the regular evening program of the Roman Radio station. It did not purport to be official, but it was pointed out that it would undoubtedly not be broadcast unless it represented an official view.

Incidents Charged Catholic priests were accused in the broadcast of "black ingratitude" to Fascism, which, it said, "guarantees religious liberty."

This unofficial reply to the vatican and to the speeches of Pope Pius XI was made on the eve of the second anniversary of the ratification of the vatican treaty and the concordat, the two documents which ended the pope's 59 years as "prisoners in the vatican."

It came also at the end of a day when the pope had declared: "We are fighting a battle for liberty of conscience." The pope's declaration was made during an address to a group of Catholic members of the Fascist organization.

Compromise Made Italian historians were reproached in the broadcast that Fascism gave a place of honor to the church, which was "badly protected" by preceding governments.

It declared the church and not the Fascist state had deprived the people of their religious processions and it said that many of these had occurred, with perfect order, through the cooperation of Fascist authorities, in places where the pope's prohibition against them was delayed or disregarded.

The condition of the church in Italy was compared with that in "other countries, where it is really persecuted." The pope, it said, instead of criticizing those countries, spoke "sharp words against Italy."

Referring to the demand made yesterday by an editorial in the Observatore Romano that proof be offered that the Catholic Action society was political, it said that the society "had all the external of a political party," and that most of the leaders, and many of the members, belonged to the old anti-Fascist political party which has been dissolved.

The acts of the society, it was declared, also supported the political charge. Premier Mussolini's action in proceeding against the clubs was declared to have been justified by the government's high duty to defend itself. No government in the world, it said, would have permitted such a state of affairs.

GANG LEADERS FIND TROUBLE AT ALL POINTS

CAPONE HEADS LIST UNDER CLUTCHES OF THE LAW

BY NEIL KELLY New York, June 6 (AP)—After months of preliminary training, state and federal governments are teaching gangsters and racketeers a new definition of "heat." Even the "big shots" who considered themselves immune to the ordinary annoyances of law are to get a schooling. Within a week vigorous thrusts have been directed against the two most notorious figures in the underworld—Scarface Al Capone in Chicago and Jack "Legs" Diamond in New York.

DOUBLE TROUBLE. Trouble was brewed for Al Capone today.

District Attorney George E. Q. Johnson announced he had detailed income tax prosecutors on his staff to see that Capone does not go free of tax evasion charges. And he revealed that hoodlums and gangsters who testified falsely when they were called before the grand jury which indicted Capone to tell what they knew of his underworld operations are to be prosecuted for perjury.

Didn't Pay Tax. The less spectacular characters are also discovering that depositing large sums in a bank is a hazardous occupation.

In New York, Enrico Miro, a Porto Rican who made millions in the "policy racket" in Harlem, is under indictment for failure to pay an income tax. So, too, is Emanuel "Mannie" Kessler, who has already served time in the penitentiary at Atlanta.

Kalamazoo, June 6 (AP)—Christina Hoeben, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Hoeben, Oshtemo, was killed instantly on her seventh birthday and her brother, Mitchell, 9, was critically injured by a hit-and-run motorist in US-12 seven miles west of Kalamazoo Saturday afternoon.

Body of One Man Drowned May 17 In Bay Recovered

Newberry, June 6 (Special)—The body of Millard C. Hootman, 39, of Lansing, missing since Sunday, May 17, with two other Lansing businessmen, was recovered late this afternoon from the waters near the Parisian Island, six miles from where the party was believed drowned when their boat capsized while the men were on a fishing trip in the Tahquamenon Bay. Hootman was manager of the Lansing Welfare Loan society.

Series of Airplanes Ready for Challenge of Seas and Weather

New York, June 6 (AP)—One airplane completed the last leg of its trans-Atlantic flight yesterday, three were poised today for the weatherman's signal, and seven are trying their wings, preparing to answer the annual early summer challenge of distant skies. ARREST MAN IN BUTCHER CASE

Brooklyn Mystery Death Believed Cleared Up By Confession

New York, June 6 (AP)—A trail of human fragments revealing a new Brooklyn "butcher murder" led tonight to the door of young Charles Obietes and past him to the widow of the murdered man, Lena Zubenaki.

Obietes confessed today that he slew Andrew Zubenaki, speakeasy owner, dismembered the body and over a period of two days disposed of the parts in various sections of the city. He said the crime was done at the urging of Mrs. Zubenaki and he was paid \$500 for doing it.

Planes Damaged In Heavy Wind Storm

Toledo, June 6 (AP)—Half a dozen airplanes were damaged when a heavy wind and rain storm struck Toledo airport at LeMoyne, and Transcontinental airport, both nearby, late today.

Six persons escaped injury when a cabin plane was overturned by wind after landing at Toledo airport. A wing was torn off. Several light planes suffered slight damage when hurried into the air.

Cotter, Monday. Crocitti was returned to Detroit from Jersey City, L. J., today and booked on a charge of kidnaping.

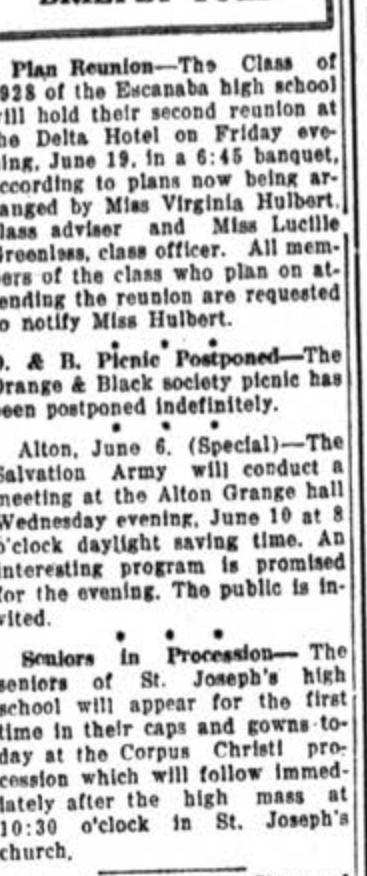

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EDITORIAL

A TRAFFIC SURVEY

THE traffic committee, appointed by Mayor William H. Needham, has a difficult job on its hands, but it is a highly important one.

Effective regulation of traffic in the business district appears to be the important task facing the committee.

Although the recommendations of the National Safety Council have been followed, some criticism has been leveled at the marking of the parking lanes on Ludington street.

Apparently, the matter of parking time will have to be given consideration. The present ordinance permits half-hour parking on Ludington street.

Health Tips

BY DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN Before our modern scientific knowledge of the way in which foods may produce sudden attacks of vomiting, pain and diarrhea after eating such conditions were called ptomaine poisoning.

It is now recognized that actual ptomaine poisoning is extremely rare, if it occurs at all. Nevertheless, an analysis of cases recently reported indicates that health authorities and physicians, as well as the public, continue to make a diagnosis of ptomaine poisoning in one-third of such cases.

It is not always possible to find the exact food substance or germ that may be involved. In 1928, 150 people in the neighborhood of Boston ate some chocolate cream pie and practically all of them became infected. It was impossible, however, to find the germ in the pie.

According to Dr. E. O. Jordan, only eight states in the United States require the reporting of cases of food poisoning and only 11 states require the reporting of the condition called ptomaine, a specific form of food poisoning.

The articles of food most commonly connected with food poisoning are meat and meat products, and foods which are mixed and stand for a considerable time before being served, such as hashes, meat pies and salads.

The pasteurization of milk, the manufacture of bread by machines and the subsequent wrapping of bread in clean, sterile wrappers, the cleaning and wrapping of fruit and similar processes add slightly to the cost of food but assure a certain amount of safety from disease, which costs far more than the little sum expended.
