SCHEDULE HEARINGS FOR GENERAL INCREASE

Washington, June 30. (AP)-Action to hasten a solution of the railroad freight rate problem was taken today by the interstate commerce commission. Revised rates expected to increase the revenues of lines in ern and western trunk line territories from \$50,000,000 to \$70,000,000 annually were or-

dered into effect December 3. Two series of hearings on the appeal for a 15 per cent general rate increase throughout the country were scheduled to begin in Washington July 15 and August 31. Later hearings will be held in other cities. Opponents of the increase were asked to file their objections by July 30.

Raise Earnings Level.

The eastern and western trunk line class rate changes were designed to raise the level of earnings more nearly to the 5.75 per cent net yield provided by law. It was estimated they would increase western carriers' gross income by \$10,000,000 and that of eastern railroads by \$40,000,00 to \$60,-000,000 annually.

The railroads in their petition for the 15 perfeant blanket increase said they hoped increased earnings approximately TOSS \$400,000,000 annually. This, they ecurities eligible for investment





ing the outcome of deliberations at Paris continues. The nation's attention is focussed on what is regarded as a duel between President Hoover and Premier Laval over the American

moratorium plan. Some degree of anxiety has been manifested over the unyielding attitude of France on some important points, but the hope prevails that Frence eventually will join the rest of the world to give Germany a year of rest from reparations.
