Ticket Exchange Starts Today For the Freiburg Passion Play

Seat reservations for the Freiburg Passion Play, which is coming to Escanaba next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday under American Legion auspices, will start this morning at the Office Service company, and a Legion representative will be on duty at the board throughout the day to handle the exchange tickets.

Opening next Monday evening at 8:15, the Passion Play will have a cast which will provide an impressive spectacle in the beautiful William W. Oliver Memorial auditorium of the new junior high school. In addition to the original German company of 29 people headed by Adolf Fassnacht, famous Christus portrayer, there will be a local chorus of 60 voices and a group of about 50 Escanabans in the mob scenes, making the largest cast ever to appear on the local stage.

No company is allowed to excel the thorough Germans of the Freiburg Passion Play in all the minute details of stagecraft. With 700 years of traditions behind them the Freiburgers have never hesitated to adopt each new device made available by science or art for effective stage lighting and coloring. Finished actors themselves, they know the value of effective scenery and properties.

Costumes Authentic Carrying stage equipment which requires their skilled mechanics and a squad of local stage hands eight hours to set up, they overlook no detail. The palms must be ready

for the multitude to wave in the opening scene. Judas must have exactly thirty pieces of silver though the bag containing them may never be opened. Thirty-one orchestral numbers and eleven great choral numbers must be accurately fitted to the action of the

drama by the music director who must take his cues in German. Costumes are correct and gorgeous. And they are authentic. Extra actors who play in the mob and crowd scenes often wonder audibly why they are dressed in half a dozen under garments before the all covering robe is thrown about them. Fritz Schoeller, the stage director, even while he is playing the part of Calphas, the high priest, hasn't time to explain. But after the performance is over if the "super" is still interested he may be able to get Ernest Guelt or Anna Ambrogio who are in charge of male and female wardrobe, to offer an explanation. Mr. Guelt will say "because it is authentic." Fraulien Ambrogia will say "for the psychological effect on the actor." And both will be right. Wardrobe, properties, scenery, noise and lighting effects—all are handled with a thoroughness as we have learned to respect in the German people. They understand the material as well as the spiritual value of accurate stagecraft.

Christmas Seals Due to Appear On Thanksgiving Day

Plans for the twenty-fifth annual sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals in Michigan were given impetus last week when three men prominent in state affairs accepted leadership of the committee which will conduct the campaign.

Governor Wilber M. Brucker will act as honorary chairman of the Christmas seal committee. Dr. Alexander G. Ruthven, president of the University of Michigan, and Dr. C. G. Slemmons, state health commissioner, will also serve in the campaign, acting as vice chairman. In accepting a post on the committee, Dr. Slemmons called for public support of the Christmas seal campaign which will begin Thanksgiving Day, continuing through Christmas. He declared:

"It is the personal duty of public-spirited people in Michigan to join the fight made possible by Christmas seals against one of Michigan's greatest public health enemies—tuberculosis. Last year 2912 people died from this disease and 1320 of these were less than thirty years old. Greater support of the Christmas seal is to be encouraged this year so that this annual loss can be stopped."

The 1931 seal sale is the twenty-fifth campaign in which Christmas seals have been used to finance anti-tuberculosis work. The Michigan sale will be state-wide and will provide funds for the 1932 health program of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated local groups.

This year's tuberculosis Christmas seals, which have an old-time coaching scene as the feature of their design, will appear throughout the state on Thanksgiving Day. It is announced.

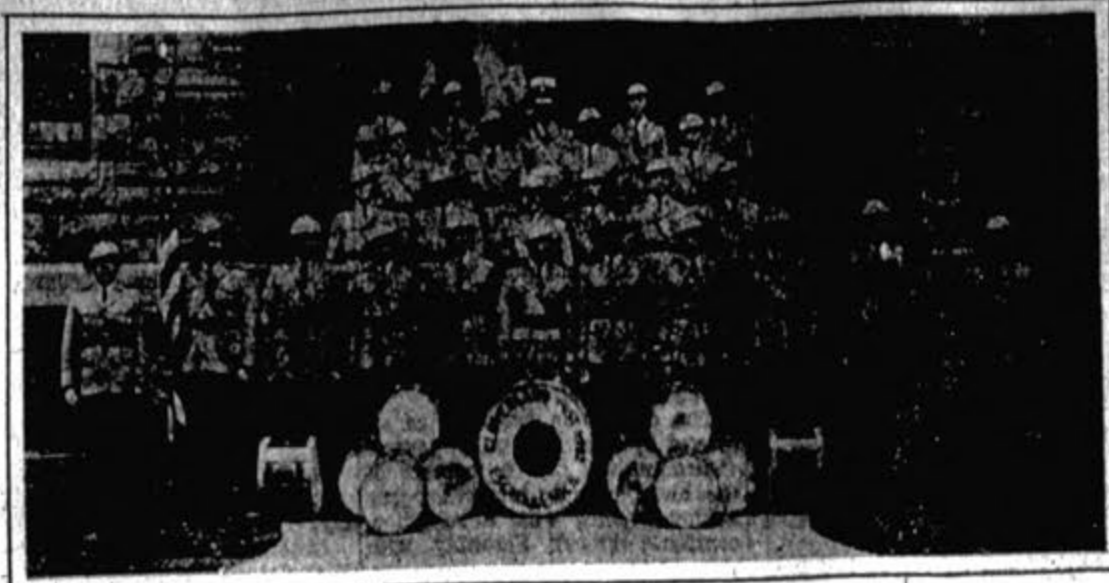

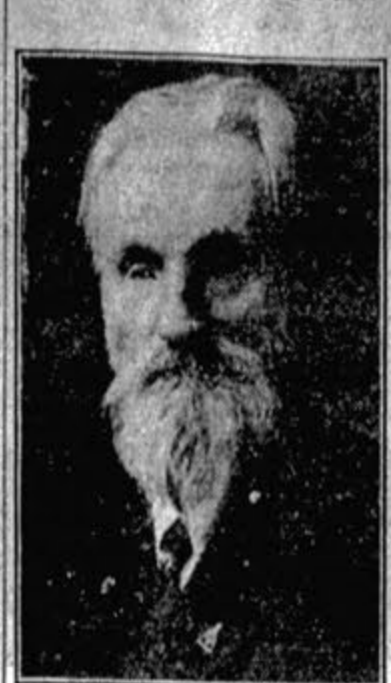
The meeting was orderly. There was no heckling of the speakers, and not a policeman was in evidence as the department had decided not to interfere with their right of assemblage.

State Unemployed Commission Active In Relief Measures

Governor Brucker's state unemployment commission is making a sincere effort to avoid suffering from hunger and cold among the people of the state this winter and to find ways and means of stimulating an early return to normal business conditions. The commission decided that the best way to organize for this purpose is to urge the appointment of county unemployment committees in each county. Practically all counties in the state have reported the organization of their committees. In Delta county, the board of supervisors is acting as the committee, with Mayor W. H. Needham of Escanaba as chairman.

The state is doing its part by putting on a \$10,000,000 highway construction program of work originally intended for 1932. There is also a \$2,000,000 highway maintenance program now in operation. This work will afford considerable relief for the unemployed but it is not expected that this work alone can care for all the needs. It is hoped, however, that this program will furnish the incentive to counties, cities and all employers of labor to assist by providing additional work.
