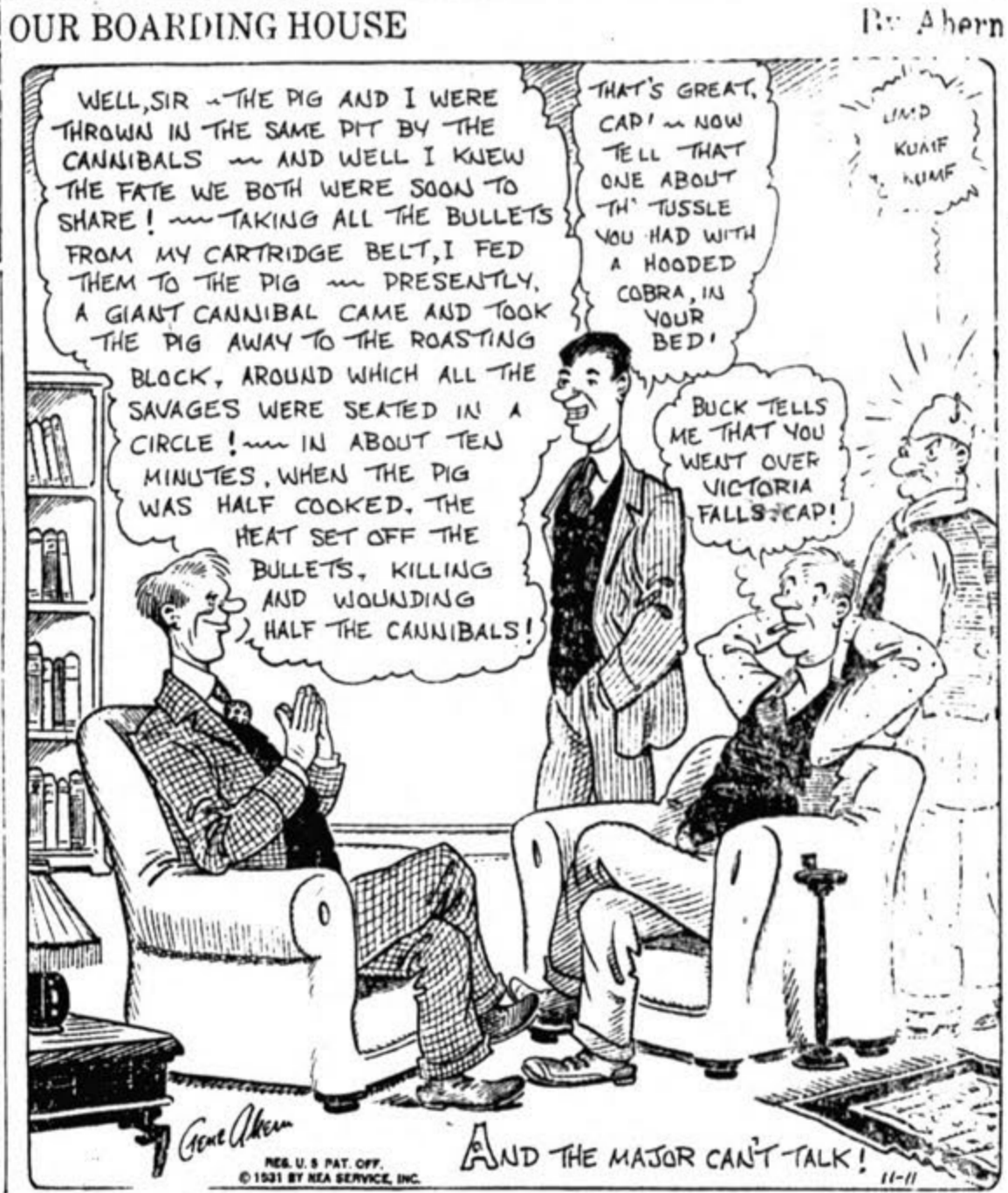

HUNTERS OILING UP DEER GUNS

Nine or Ten Will Lose Their Lives in Quest For Venison

Lansing, Mich. (AP)—Thousands of Michigan sportsmen are oiling up their guns and getting their camp equipment ready for the opening of the deer season in this state, November 15, in a sixteen-day campaign which may determine the state conservation department's ability to operate within its limited budget.

The season extends from November 15 through November 30. Although those who are chiefly concerned over Michigan's deer supply do not usually ask for a large outpouring during the open season, the business decline of past months and restricted appropriations somewhat change the situation this year.

Conservation authorities are anxious to conserve the deer supply, but they are also anxious to gain sufficient revenues from deer licenses to prevent any further curtailment of conservation projects and programs.

It Costs \$3.50 For the first time in Michigan, deer hunters must pay a \$3.50 fee for a license to hunt deer. Of this amount, \$1.50 is encumbered by legislative act to be used for the acquisition of land for public hunting preserves. The remainder will go into the game protection fund, most of which is likewise encumbered. There is an item of \$125,000 to be taken from the fund for impressed labor in fighting forest fires, another of \$100,000 for forest fire protection, and a third of \$84,000 to meet land taxes of various types.

In addition, there is no specific appropriation for the fish division of the conservation department

this year although the 75 cent increase in the trout license is counted upon to meet this need in part at least.

Just as Many Deer

As far as conservation authorities are able to estimate, there are apparently as many deer this year as last. The probable number of hunters is highly speculative. Last year there were some 73,000 deer hunters in the woods and the number has shown an increase year after year. The depression, however, may mean a decline in 1931 as indicated by reports that are coming in from the small game season. These reports say that the number of small game licenses this year are only about 70 percent of the number of 1930.

A new statute increasing the qualifications for obtaining a license is also apt to cut down the number of hunters this year. The law forbids the issuance of a license to a person who has been convicted of a deer-law violation within the last three years or accidentally wounded or killed anyone while hunting within the last five years.

Troopers Check Violators

State police will cooperate with the law-enforcement division of the conservation department in checking on deer law violations. Seventeen state troopers have been assigned by Oscar G. Olander, commissioner of public safety, to this work. Four mobile units will be maintained in the upper peninsula and two in the lower part of the state. Stationary posts will be placed probably at St. Ignace, Mio, Prudenville, and Standish.

Hunters can shoot in the upper peninsula at will, while twelve counties in lower Michigan will be open to deer hunting. They are: Cheboygan, Presque Isle, Otsego, Montmorency, Alpena, Alcona, Oshtemo, Crawford, Kalkaska, Roscommon, Ogemaw, and Iosco.

Noted Medic Talks To Kiwanis Club

The advance of medical science, particularly within the last century, was described in an interesting talk by Dr. F. C. Warnshuis of Grand Rapids at a meeting of the Kiwanis club at the Ludington hotel yesterday.

"The red lights are the signals that warn us of the menaces to our physical health as we travel the road of life," Dr. Warnshuis explained. "Medical science has found effective methods to prevent the infectious diseases of youth, but not as much progress has been made in the control of the degenerative diseases, such as cancer, heart disease and the other ailments peculiar to the so-called dangerous middle age."

There is, as yet, no sure cure for cancer, Dr. Warnshuis declared. He stated emphatically that anyone pretending to have a cancer cure is only trying to commercialize at the expense of the gullible public. Many noted scientists are doing extensive research in order to solve the cancer problem, and he predicted that a solution will surely come.
