Deer Tags Denied 678 State Hunters

Six hundred and seventy-eight men who have hunted deer in Michigan will be unable to obtain a deer hunting license this year. The department of conservation has compiled a list of names of all persons who have been convicted of violating a deer law within the past three years.

REPORT SOUGHT IN TAGGED DEER

Identification Marks Placed on 125 in Michigan

One hundred and twenty-five tagged does and bucks are now living in the woods of the northern part of the lower peninsula and in the upper peninsula. These deer are tagged in the right ear with an aluminum tag on which is stamped a serial number and instructions reading: "Dept. of Conservation, Lansing." The Department of Conservation figures that many of these tagged bucks will be shot during the approaching deer hunting season.

If hunters shooting tagged deer will send the number of the metal tag together with information as to the date the deer was shot and the locality in which it was shot, considerable information as to the movements of the deer will be learned.

25 From Hulbert.
Last year about 25 deer were tagged at the Hulbert Deer Yard and in the Crawford Game Refuge. A hundred of the animals, trapped and moved from the Turtle Lake region near Alpena were tagged by Department of Conservation, and released at the Luden Game Refuge, Alpena State Forest and the Isoco Game Refuge at Oscoda. About half of the total number of deer tagged were bucks.

HERE'S LATEST IN ROCKET DESIGN
Canabruk, Germany. -- Many are the types of rockets devised in this country. The latest member in this line of propulsion. The latest is a type of rocket glider. The rocket model has wings and is placed in a starting position with its wings folded back close to the fuselage so that resistance is reduced to a minimum during its upward flight. When the peak of its upward momentum is reached, the wings of the rocket automatically extend outward and adjust themselves to glider position. From this time on the model glides down along a normal gliding path just like an ordinary glider.

Jap War Strength Is 10-5-1 Over the Soviets and China

Washington, Nov. 15 (AP). -- The tenseness of the Manchurian situation has led to a measurement here of the fighting strength of Japan, China and the Soviet. The government keeps closely in touch with reports of movements of all armed forces in the East. Army and navy sources have compiled all available information on the forces which might be thrown into a war resulting from the Oriental crisis.

One unofficial opinion places the comparative strength of Japan, the Soviet and China at a ratio of 10-5-1, respectively. There is a concert of opinion in all informed quarters, however, that the Soviet would go to every possible end to avert its involvement.

Least Combatants
In numbers of combatants Japan stands last on the list of the three, with 2,130,000. These are made up by an active army of 230,000 and reserves of 1,900,000. The Soviet's potential army would consist of more than 5,000,000 men. Of these about 650,000 are active, while the remainder are reserves. They are well trained and well armed but 6,000 miles of territory with a single railway separates them from the scene of activities.

MAKES 'CHUTE JUMP' WITH LEG IN CAST
Calgary, Alberta. -- So as not to disappoint a huge crowd, and to prove the safety features of a parachute, Frank Haddock attempted a parachute jump with one of his legs in a cast. Haddock's leg was hurt in a jump at Swift Current recently and when the time came for his scheduled jump here, his leg was still in a cast. Regardless of the leg, Haddock climbed in a plane, bailed out at 1000 feet, and landed safely after pulling his rip cord halfway down to earth. His leg was unhurt in the jump which, Haddock says, was his 1326th leap.

On Nov. 16, 1917, Colonel E. M. The French War Office gave out a statement concerning the Austro-German offensive on the Italian front: "The Germans have greatly exaggerated the importance of the Italian defeat. The Italian armies are far from being defeated."

The Second Army only has seriously suffered. On the 24th of October a violent offensive of the Germans between Prezzo and Tolmino took the position of the Kolovist and gained the high valleys of Judrio and Natlone. On the 25th and 26th, after the loss of Matoraj and Mont Maglor, the Second Army fell back, first on the Piave. The line of the Piave is actually solidly held."

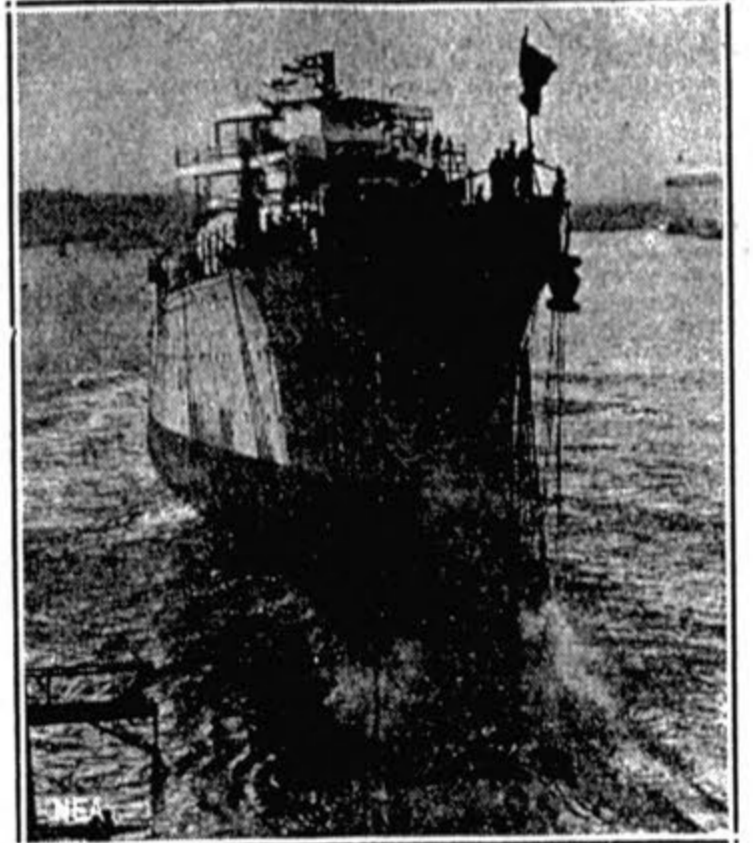

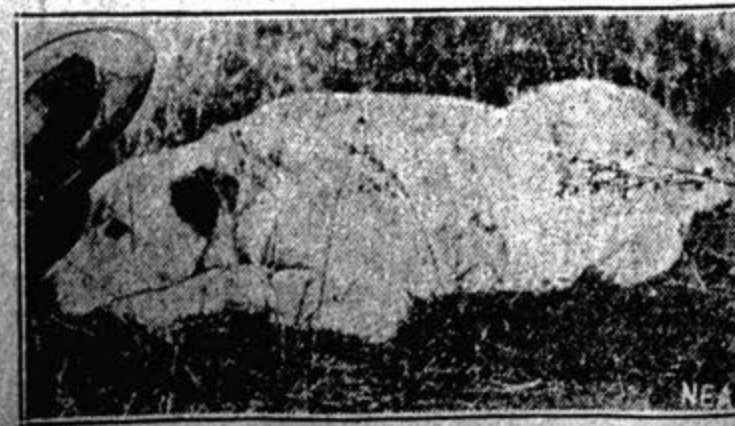

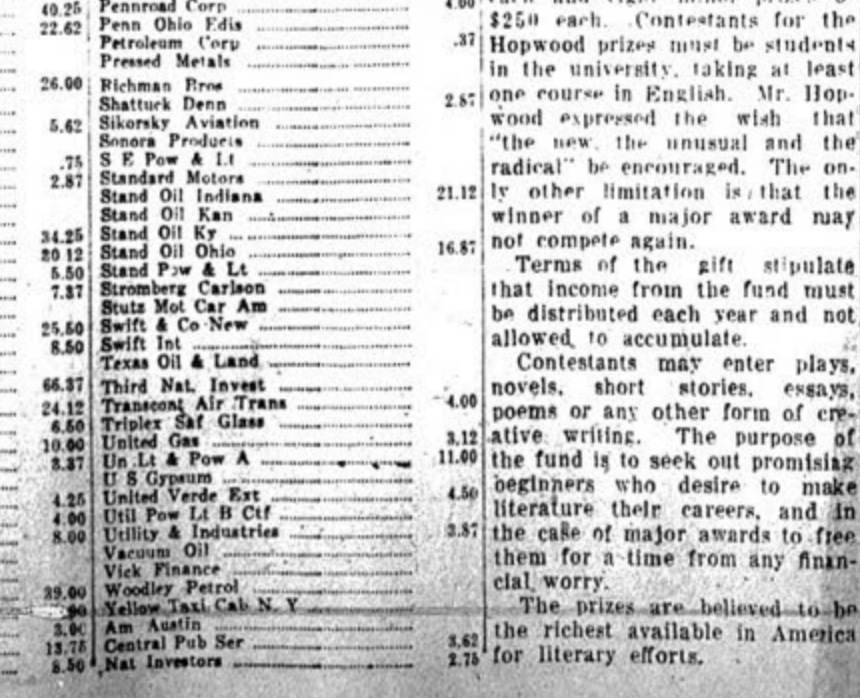

His instructors point to him as a shining example of their denial of athletic over-emphasis, and his friends chuckle over him as a disciple of nonchalance. And besides being the brains of the classroom, he finds time to be the brains of a Big Ten football team.

He is Ivan Williamson, 20-year-old right end on Michigan's 1931 eleven, a junior who has earned plans for the study of medicine, and who refuses to get excited over a sudden rise to football fame.

Looks Indifferent "Be Nonchalant" Williamson, his teammates have called him. As he stands in the line of scrimmage, waiting for a play to start, he assumes a studied air of indifference which often misleads an unobservant opponent into believing that Right End Williamson has no intention of joining the combat.

Pointing a finger toward him in a recent practice session, Fielding H. Yost complimented Williamson tersely: "Look!" he said, "There goes a football player with brains."

Pittsburgh Routs Army by 26-0 Score Stadium, Pittsburgh, Nov. 14 (AP)—A swirling ground fog that stuck to the gridiron and enshrouded the big municipal stadium today proved a perfect screen for the passing attack of Coach Jock Sutherland's Pittsburgh Panthers as they took to the atmosphere to hand a strong Army eleven a 26 to 0 defeat.

Late in the third period Heston gave Michigan a scoring opportunity by booting the oval out of bounds at State's seven yard line. Ellowitz' next punt was short and high and traveled only to the 20-yard stripes. Hewitt made a yard and Hudson added four more through the middle of the line but the next two plays lost 22 yards and State took the ball on downs at their 37-yard line as the period ended.

The slippery ball made fumbles frequent and each team was given several breaks which brought the wet and shivering spectators to their feet. But the uncertain footing made it impossible to take advantage of fortune's whims.

In the first period before the ball and field were thoroughly wetted, Michigan started a march through the Spartan line which carried the ball to State's 25-yard line for a first down.

The march started when Ellowitz punted to Michigan's 24-yard line and Captain Hudson returned the ball to the Michigan 49-yard line. Heston gained four yards through the line and Hewitt made first down on State's 37-yard line. Hewitt lost three yards on the next play, but Peterson earned nine yards on the 37-yard line. Hewitt then made another first down on State's 25-yard line, but on the following attempt Michigan was penalized five yards. Vandermeer then recovered Fav's fumble and the Spartans put the ball in play at their 43-yard line. Michigan's starting quartet of backs remained in the game throughout the 60 minutes, with Captain Hudson calling signals.

Breaks Are Frequent In the second period Heston punted to State's two yard line where Peterson might have downed the ball, but the Michigan end believed a State back had touched the ball. He picked it up and crossed the goal line. The official ruled the ball had not been touched and ordered it put in play by State at the 20-yard line.

Technically the game was what might be termed "loose" or "ragged" but the frequent breaks apparently pleased the spectators.

Occasionally when a back managed to keep his feet long enough to rain some yardage there was wild cheering, but such occasions usually were followed quickly by breaks which brought the opposition supporters to their feet.

Regardless of the wet ball and the slippery footing the game will go down in the books as a moral victory for State college. The Spartans could not gain through Michigan's strong line, but they held the pre-game favorites even.

count banks in the twelve federal reserve districts is aimed to relieve frozen credit and promote employment. Its outstanding expected consequences is that the building association will be able to liquidate assets now frozen.

While arguments are heard here as to the prosing necessity for additional homes at this time, the fact that building and loan associations are restricted in their ability to lend goes unchallenged. Officials of these associations in Washington declare the system, as a whole, has loaned to capacity.

With exhaustion of their own cash resources, they are compelled, like individuals, to go to the banks for additional funds. But their paper, the only collateral they have to offer, is not eligible for rediscounting at the federal reserve central banks. President Hoover has made it clear he does not propose a dumping ground for unsound paper. The suggested system would be decentralized, in the federal reserve districts, under a central governing board to be set up in Washington. As a result, applications for loans will be acted upon by persons familiar with local conditions.

Nearly half of the population of continental United States lives in 95 metropolitan districts. A permanent sea-level marker is to be placed in Battery park, New York city, by the United States coast and geodetic survey.

Bible Law Is Again Before High Court Washington, Nov. 14 (AP)—The supreme court today was asked to give its judgment on the validity of a law forbidding the reading and teaching of the bible in the schools of the state of Washington.

A group of citizens from Seattle asked the tribunal to reconsider its recent decision not to pass upon the case and asserted a "strong well-organized atheist drive" is in progress to end Bible teaching in the schools.

The state supreme court upheld the law, after which the appellants brought the case to the supreme court. The latter decided it was without jurisdiction.
