Allan, who was the youngest bank president in Michigan when he became executive head of the American State Bank in 1929 at the age of 33, was charged with embezzling \$106,565 in five counts on which the case was based at the outset of the trial. Stortly before the case was



## COMMITTEE REPORTS PLAN BUT ADDS RESOLUTION

BY WILLIAM L. BEALE. Washington, Dec. 17. (AP)-President Hoover's moratorium on governmental debts emerged victorious but scarred today from its first tilt with its congressional judges.

It came from the closed doors of the powerful ways and means committee after three days of hearings and six hours of secret discussions adorned with an amendment to record congress against further reduction or cancellation of inter-governmental debts.

The debt holiday will be debated in the house tomorrow. A favorable yote is expected by Saturday night.

The no-revision amendment was attached by a vote of 16 to 9 in the face of an administration proposal for revision of Europe's obligations to America.

Four Demos Oppose.

Then, the committee voted 21 to 4 to report the resolution to the house. Four Democrats were in the opposition: Representatives Sanders of Texas; Vinson of Kentucky; Dickinson, of Missouri, and Eslick of Tennessee

The amendment against revision was proposed by Represen-tative Ragon, Arkansas Democrat, and received unanimous Democratic support plus the vote of Representative Crowther, Republican, New York.

The conclusion of Allan's trial marks the end of a chain of incidents starting March 7, 1931. On that date Allan resigned as president of the American State Bank. Two days later Commissioner Reichert was appointed president. March 12 the American State commission recommending 50-Bank closed its doors and the Peoples Wayne County Bank took over the institution, guaranlease. treing no loss to depositors. On i hearings set for Friday, on March 11 Reichert was reappointed banking commissioner by Gov. Wilber M. Brucker.
