COUNCIL ORDERS STORM SEWERS

Project on Escanaba's North Side to Be 70% Labor

An extensive program of storm sewer installations on the north side to carry surface water on Washington avenue, Stephenson, Hartnett, and the intervening areas, was authorized by the Escanaba city council at their regular meeting last night.

The work is scheduled to begin as soon as possible, starting with the construction of an outfall trough under the ore docks and lines of vitrified tile leading up Hartnett avenue.

Complete satisfaction with the progress of construction on Escanaba's new sewage disposal plant was expressed by A. A. Bransley, of Chicago, representative of the municipal engineering firm which drew up the plans for the system.

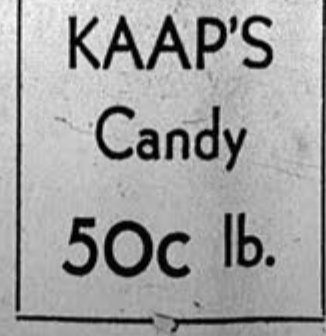
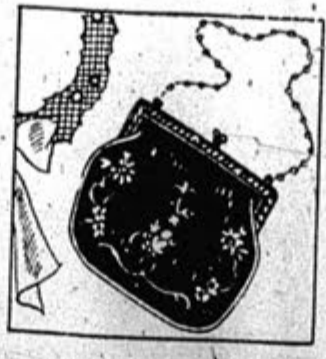
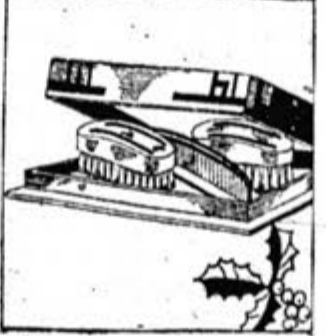
