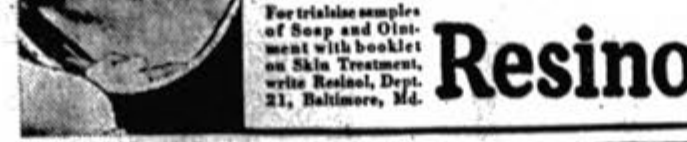

MORE RELIGION NEED OF TODAY

Msgr. Jacques is Speaker at Escanaba Rotary Club Meeting

Pointing out the fact that sixty million people in the United States have no church affiliation and that the writings of scoffers at religion have constantly found an ever increasing sale, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. C. C. Jacques, pastor of St. Joseph's church of this city, told members of the Escanaba Rotary club yesterday that economists, seeking the cause of the present world depression, have overlooked the influence of the Supreme Being over earthly affairs.

Msgr. Jacques said he did not claim it to be an original thought or one that has not before been expressed, but it was his belief that the influence of Almighty God may have been expressed in the past two years, in forcing the people of this nation and of the world to a recognition of the value of religion. He pointed to the millions of people in the United States with no church affiliations and the encouragement given scoffers at religion in recent years, as evidence that we have strayed far from the path of religious rectitude of earlier days and expressed it as his belief that the Supreme Being may have expressed His displeasure by imposing conditions that have baffled the economists of the world.

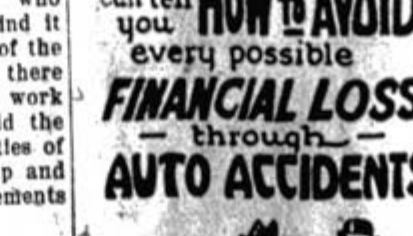

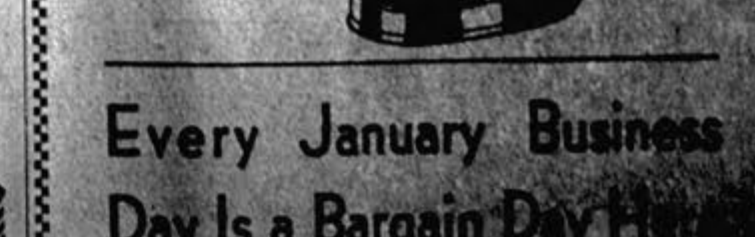

GOGEBIC CLERK BUDGET LEADS

Delta County Ranks Third, Next to Marquette

Figures available from 11 counties in the upper peninsula show that Gogebic county sets the pace in the appropriations for its county clerk's office. In fact, Gogebic is higher by \$2,000 in that office than Marquette—and Marquette leads the rest of the field by a substantial figure.

A tabulation, which follows, shows the appropriations of 12 counties for their sheriff departments and those of 11 counties for county clerks, a few of the appropriations listed being estimates based on last year's actual expenditure:

The appropriation of \$8,600 for the county clerk's office in Gogebic county is not net. The estimated fees of the office are \$1,600, leaving a net of \$7,000. As was previously explained, however, \$1,500 that goes to a deputy county clerk is charged against the cost of operating circuit court. The actual charge for salaries against the Gogebic county clerk's office is \$7,050, exclusive of the allocation to circuit court.

Delta Much Lower
Delta county's appropriation is much lower. The actual expenditure of the Delta clerk's office last year was \$5,766.58. The salary item for Delta this year, which includes \$400 clerk hire, amounts to \$5,140. The actual salary account in Dickinson last year was \$4,737.81. Taking figures at random from another county, Menominee, it will be found the salary item of the clerk's office runs to \$4,800. But in Menominee county the clerk is also register of deeds and half of his salary is charged to the latter of-

GARDEN NEWS

Garden, Mich., Jan. 11. (Special)—Francis Leo Thill has returned to Escanaba after spending the Christmas vacation with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Thill of Fayette. He is a sophomore student in the Escanaba high school.

Aurelio Toles, a senior student in the Escanaba high school has returned after spending the holidays with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Toles of Fairport. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Davet of Fairport left Escanaba Thursday morning for Chicago where they will visit their daughter Imogene. Mr. Davet was serving on the jury at the circuit court held in Escanaba during the earlier part of the week.

Walter Hornstein has just sold one of his registered white-faced Hereford bull calves to Richard Brothers implement and produce dealers of Manistique, who are organizing a stock farm north of Manistique. Garden Lad, the name of the six months' old animal, which was delivered early this week, will be used for crossing grade heifers on the Richard farm. So far as is known, this is the first registered stock bred and shipped to outside farms for a number of years past.

Henry Vaterhaus, veteran horticulturist from Cooks was in the Garden district part of the past week selling fruit trees.

Colder weather has caused the formation of sufficient ice on Garden Bay to enable fishermen to get out on the ice with their shanties, but more cold weather is required before it can be considered safe for the usual winter's fishing activities.

Start On Skating Rinks Is Delayed

The city engineering department is making ready to start work on municipal ice rinks, but so far the weather has been unfavorable for building ice. As soon as freezing weather becomes consistent, the various skating sites will be sprayed daily to start the base for the ice. Workmen have found but little frost in the ground so far.

Charles Pierce's "Weather in Philadelphia" tells us that at that place "there was ice during every month of the year, not excepting June, July and August. There was scarcely a vegetable came to perfection north and east of the Potomac."

According to the "Monthly Weather Review," citing the recollections of James Winchester of Vermont: "It is said that in June of that year snow fell to the depth of three inches in New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey on the seventeenth; five inches in all the New England states, except three inches in Vermont."

"There was snow and ice in every month of the year. The storm of June 17 was as severe as any that ever occurred in the winter; it began about noon, increasing in fury until night by which time the roads were impassable by reason of snowdrifts; many were bewildered in the blinding storm and frozen to death. . . . There was a heavy snowstorm Aug. 30. . . . The year 1816 had neither spring, summer, nor autumn. The only crop of corn raised in that part of Vermont that summer was saved by keeping bonfires burning around the cornfield night and day."

An analysis by Professor W. I. Milham of the meteorological record kept at Williamstown, Mass., shows that, at that place, the average temperature of the whole year was only a little below normal and was actually higher than that of several later

Curious Rock Might Have Great History

Charles Hinz, sexton of Maple Grove cemetery, some time ago had his attention attracted to a curious rock formation in the Catholic section of the cemetery. After studying the rock he became convinced that it must have a history that dates back into the dim past, so he wrote to the Michigan College of Mines at Houghton, sending along a sample of the rock, thinking that it might be of meteoric origin. Prof. Seaman wrote back, informing Mr. Hinz that the rock is not of meteoric origin but that it is no doubt a brecciated felsite, brought here many thousands of years ago from the north. Professor Seaman says the rock is not unlike some of the felsites of the Keweenaw series, and that it may have come from Stannard Rock (near Marquette) or that vicinity. This rock is about forty feet in length protrudes above the surface of the ground seven feet, and is six or seven feet in width.

Sometime ago an employee of the cemetery thought to beautify it by whitewashing it, but this did not appeal to anyone of a scientific turn of mind. The elements have about destroyed the whitewash, though. In some places the rock is cracked and a small tree grows from the soil deposits in the crack. How far the rock extends below the surface is unknown, but it is no doubt a greater distance than the portion that shows above the surface.

Good Skating on Bay Lasts Only One Day

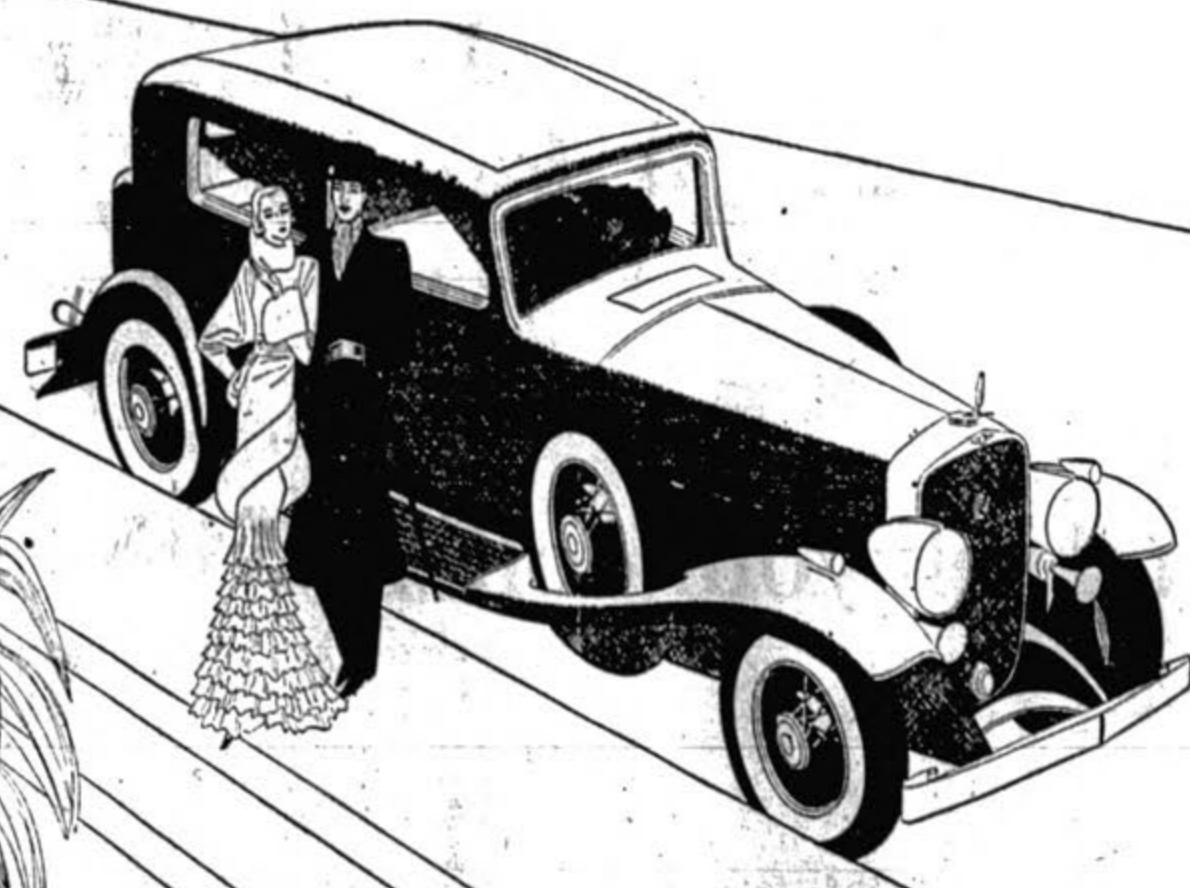

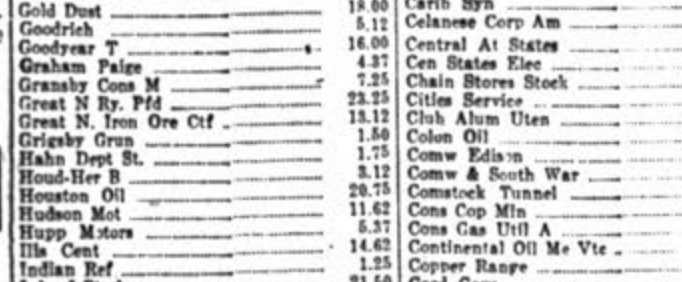
