









### BAND PLANNING FREE CONCERTS

Four Events to Be Held  
at Oliver Auditorium  
This Winter

The Escanaba board of education, at its regular meeting Tuesday night, granted the Escanaba municipal band the use of the William W. Oliver Memorial Auditorium for four free concerts during the winter season.

The dates selected are: Jan. 27, Feb. 11, Feb. 24 and March 16. Last winter, the concerts were held at the senior high school auditorium.

The Escanaba high school athletic association has turned over to the board a sum of \$2,722.39 since May, 1927, for the use of the athletic field, according to a report read at the meeting. There were a total of 24 football games played on the field since 1927, making an average return of \$115.51 per game. The report, showed the following sums given by the association: May 27, 1927, \$500; June 28, 1928, \$1,000; Nov. 12, 1929, \$431.52; Sept. 22, 1930, \$200; and Dec. 9, 1931, \$640.57. The latter amount represents a credit given for the association's purchase of \$400.57 worth of football equipment for the junior high school boys.

Settlement in the amount of \$150 was made with the O. J. Dykman of Grand Rapids for the balance of the contract for heating, plumbing and sheet metal work at the junior high school. It was reported at the meeting.

The request of the Escanaba Daily Press for the use of the William W. Oliver Memorial Auditorium for its annual spelling bee the latter part of April was also granted.

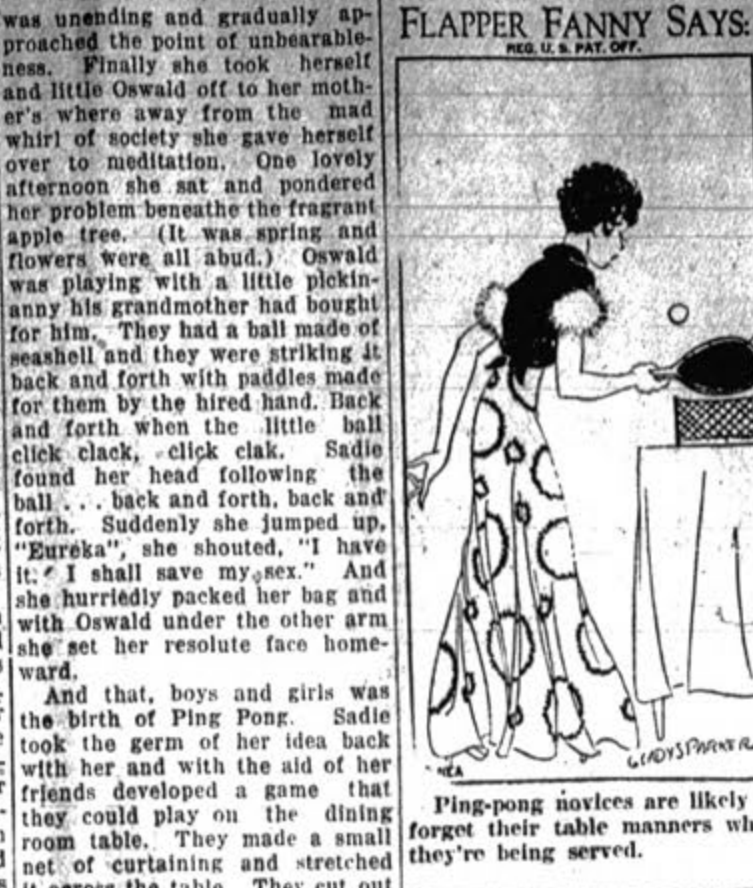

Total of 18 Cases Are Reported at Ford River

The epidemic which started last week was at first thought to be scarlet fever and later chicken pox, but as more cases developed the cases were diagnosed as scarlet fever.  
Owing to the fact that residents of Ford River Mills have been going back and forth to West Ford River and have been exposed to the disease, the school at Ford River Mills has been closed for the balance of this week awaiting

further developments.  
The supervisor and members of the school in Ford River townships are co-operating in giving the children the best care possible and all efforts to stamp out the epidemic are being tried.  
Mr. Woolpert stated yesterday that two of the cases were very serious. The homes in West Ford River have been quarantined during the epidemic.
