

MOTORIST HITS BOY AND SLED

Leo LaCrosse, 4, Has Fractured Leg and Cut in Head

Crossing the street with his sled, Leo LaCrosse, 4, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward LaCrosse, 311 South Fifteenth street, was struck by Arthur Demars, driver of the ambulance, on Monday morning. The driver took the boy to St. Francis hospital, where it was found that he had a fractured leg in addition to a cut on the left side of the head. His condition was reported as favorable last night.

Demars told police officers investigating the accident that he was going south in the 300 block on South Fourteenth street when the boy suddenly started from the east to the west curb with his little sled. The driver said that he was not going fast and that he applied the brakes, but the ambulance slid enough to strike the boy.

150 WORKING ON STREET, DRAINS

Escanaba Street System Is Extended by 3.6 Miles

Between 150 and 140 men are being employed on special city improvement projects in Escanaba, and it is expected that next week the number will be increased to 150 or more.

Two major projects are under way at present, the installation of storm drain sewers on the north side and the grading of South Nineteenth street. The former has the larger number of workmen, with four crews of about 20 men each laying pipe. The work is all hand labor, mostly with shovels, and about 85 percent of the cost of the improvement will be for labor. The lines will drain surface water on Stephenson, Hartnett, Washington, and intervening streets.

The grading on South Nineteenth street, made possible by mild winter weather, will be carried through to First avenue south. The work is under way on the south end.

During the last year 3.6 miles of streets have been added to the Escanaba city street system, through extensions and the construction of the route to the new sewage plant on Eighteenth avenue south.

Fire Wardens Use Sleeping Quarters

Sleeping quarters provided in the 14 conservation district headquarters scattered through the northern part of the state saved the Department of Conservation \$4,055 during the first eleven months of 1931, according to the Division of Field Administration.

During the period January 1 to December 1, 1931, 2,704 lodgings were furnished men by the district headquarters. This at the rate of \$1.50 a night represented a savings of more than \$4,000.

The sleeping quarters were used by departmental employees, generally fire wardens, and without the headquarters, the Department would have been forced to pay for their lodgings.

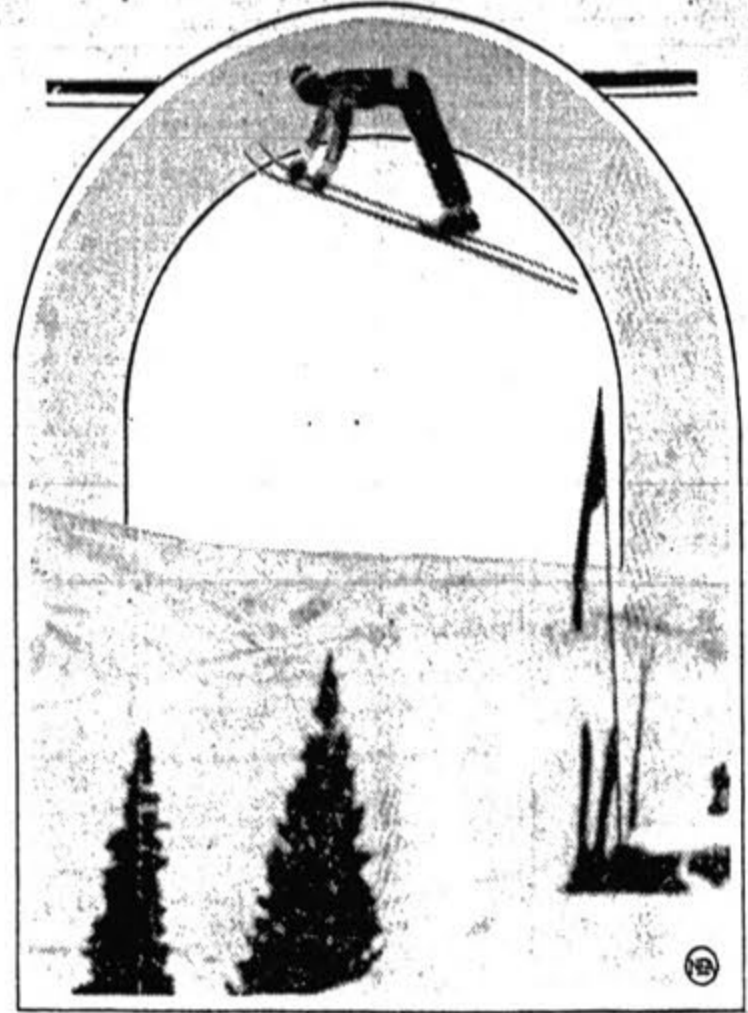

CAMERA CATCHES THRILLS OF DARING WINTER SPORT



Remarkable action pictures, showing the thrills and perils of skiing, one of the most picturesque and daring of winter sports, are shown above. The figure at the left might be mistaken for a broken boomerang being hurled

across a mountain top, but really it's Hrolvar "Dynamite" Hvalstad, of Big Pine, Calif., leaning far forward as his body turtles thru the air at Ecker Hill, Salt Lake City. In the center, Alf Engen, of the Utah Ski Club,

holder of the unofficial world record with a leap of 266 feet, is pictured "taking off" for a swift plunge down the giant slide. Engen, also shown in the inset, rocketed 234 feet through space on the jump that he is shown

starting here. To the right, Engen again is shown leaving the top of the slide, leaning over and holding the ends of his skis as he is catapulted at terrific speed down the steep slope. Skiers, as they sail through the air, of-

ten attain a speed of nearly 100 miles an hour. Engen's spectacular position as he flashes past the cameraman suggests that he is going somewhere and is in a hurry to get there.

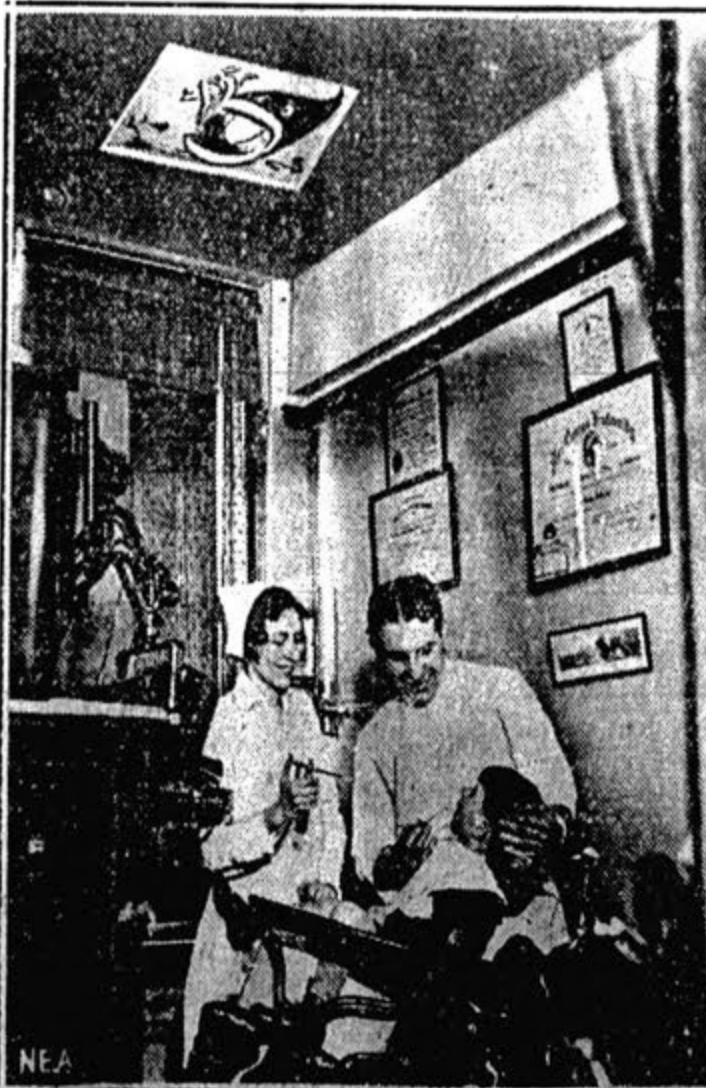

STEEL STOCKS ARE DEPRESSED

Steel stocks were depressed today by the news from the United States Steel corporation, but a couple of regular dividends by railroads and a conviction that carrier workers would ultimately take a wage cut broke the fall of shares.

The market closed lower, although above the day's minimum quotations. Steel issues naturally to the poorest showing, for their industry is apparently facing a rather indefinite period of unprofitable operations and the earnings statement of the largest unit made gloomy reading.

Wall Street waited eagerly for the opening in U. S. Steel common. The first sale was a block of 2,500 shares at 40, or Tuesday's San Francisco close.

Selling generally was light, centering on stocks which figured in the day's news. The turnover of 1,287,342 shares was moderate, although considerably above volume of the previous sessions.

French francs were steady, ruling just under the gold point. Sterling was down 1/4 cent, cables closing at \$3.46 1/8.
