This huddled group of granite buildings comprising the lonely Dartmoor penal settlement, famous in fiction and fact as a prison for Eugland's most desperate criminals, recently was the scene of the greatest convict mutiny in modern British prison history. Three hundred inmates, enraged at being served porridge without sugar for breakfast, fought a pitched battle with warders and special police and set fire to prison buildings before being subdued by riot guns. Nearly 100 persons were reported to have been injured.





Gar Wood Establishes New Speed Boat Record

BETTERS KAYE DON'S MARK

Sends Miss America IX Over Florida Course at 110.7 M. P. H.

BY HENRY S. WRENN Miami Beach, Fla., Jan. 27 (P) Gar Wood shot his Miss America IX along Indian Creek course to a new 110.785 mile an hour world's speedboat record today to reclaim supremacy of the water for America.

Wood's speed was a scant half mile better than the record of 110.223 miles an hour set Lake Garda, Italy, last July by Kaye Don in taking the speed boat record to England. The Detroit sportsman's mark today also raised his own American record of 103.269 miles an hour, set here April 16, 1931.

Wood, however, was not satisfied with his speed and annonneed after two runs over the measured nautical mile course that he would try to raise the record a mile an hour tomorrow. ofter making minor changes in the hull of his boat

Streaking the 24 cylinder craft over the water course in two runs. Wood's speed was recorded by electrical timing equipment as 111.08 and 110.49 miles an hour, respectively, for south and porthbound trips. The average of these gave him the new record. Elapsed time for the first trip was 37.32 seconds and 37.52 for the second.

Will Try Again

His time must be checked by the Yachtsmen's, association of America, under whose sanctions: the trials were made, before the record may be called official, C. W. Chase, Jr., Miami Beach, and five other men acted today as a committee of official observers for the association.



The explanation is that owners of large, expensive cars are purchasing 1932 plates at a much faster rate than the owners of smaller automobiles for whose benefit the extension of time was granted.
