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MANLEY MAKES ELOQUENT TALK

City Treasurer Tells Kivanians of Ireland's History

The life of St. Patrick, patron saint of the Irish people, and the history of Ireland were reviewed in an eloquent address delivered by City Treasurer A. J. Manley at the meeting of the Escanaba-Wells Kivanian club at the Ludington hotel yesterday noon.

It was 1500 years ago that St. Patrick assumed the work of Christianizing the inhabitants of Ireland, he said. He died in 463 A. D., after serving as bishop in that country for about sixty years.

Mr. Manley stated that for three hundred years after St. Patrick's death, the Irish people enjoyed progress in all endeavors. Institutions of learning were established, the arts and sciences were encouraged, and during that period Ireland was considered as the center of culture.

The invasions of war-like peoples from other countries, beginning in the ninth century, caused a decline in the progress of the Irish people, Mr. Manley said. For centuries thereafter, they were subjected to inhuman persecution, particularly from England following the con-

quest by Henry II in the twelfth century.

Mr. Manley told of the suffering endured by the Irish during the great famine, which resulted in an emigration of vast numbers to America and other countries and also the deaths of about a half million. In 1845, Ireland had a population of about eight million. The partial blight of the potato crop that year and the complete failure the following year made the people destitute. The depletion of the population by deaths and emigrations amounted to about two million by 1849, Mr. Manley said.

The Irish people, who came to America, have played a noble part in the upbuilding of this nation, Mr. Manley said. He cited the names of the Irish patriots who served gloriously in the Revolutionary war, and also told briefly of the contributions of other great men of Irish descent.

Bark River Boy Dies After Short Illness

Edwin John Bergman, six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Bergman of Bark River, passed away Monday at noon at St. Francis hospital where he has been rushed Friday noon when he was stricken suddenly ill while at school.

The boy went to school Friday morning apparently in his usual good health. He was taken ill shortly before noon and was taken to this city at once where an emergency operation was performed for a ruptured appendix. Edwin was a favorite in the school where he was enrolled in the first grade. The news of his death when announced at school yesterday was a shock to all his schoolmates.

The body was prepared for burial at the Boyle undertaking parlors in Bark River and will be taken to the family home later, the arrangements are incomplete. Besides the bereaved parents one sister Rose Ellen and two brothers Daniel and John Gregory survive.

Mrs. Bergman is the former Miss Anastacia Fahay of Bark River.

Youthful Orator Delvers Address For Rotary Club

Michael O'Hara, of Menominee, son of Atty. John O'Hara and grandson of the late Atty. Michael J. Doyle, lived fully up to family traditions when he appeared before the Escanaba Rotary club yesterday and delivered one of the most interesting addresses of the year.

Selected as the speaker for the club's observance of St. Patrick's Day, the son of one of Menominee's most gifted speakers and grandson of one who was recognized for many years as one of the peninsula's most eloquent orators, yesterday made a plea for recognition of Ireland's contribution to religion, the arts and the sciences that would have done credit to either his father or his grandfather. FLU EPIDEMIC IS DIMINISHED

Many Children Return to Schools Upon Their Recovery

Attendance figures in the Escanaba public schools yesterday indicated that the epidemic of influenza and other ailments, which had kept a considerable number of students away from their classes last week, was on a rapid decline.

Only 309 students were out of school yesterday, as compared to 489 on Friday, 474 on Thursday and 506 on Wednesday.

Decreases in the number of absentees are noted in all schools, excepting the Barr, Washington and Franklin, although a comparatively few have been absent at any time during the epidemic in the latter building.

The number of absentees in the various buildings the last two days were as follows:

Friday—Barr 57, Franklin 21, Jefferson 57, Washington 42, Webster 25, Junior high 156, Senior high 51; total, 479.

Monday—Barr 53, Franklin 20, Jefferson 32, Washington 37, Webster 76, Junior high 67, Senior high 24.

Hiring Local Labor

Sault Ste. Marie—Dr. G. P. Ritchie, chairman of the Sault Board of Education, last night assured George Laundry, representing the county unemployment committee that the contract entered into for the construction of the new Jefferson school will contain a provision that local labor be hired as much as possible.

"It is the stand of the state unemployment committee that each locality should take care of its own problem. I am sure that the Board of Education will do all in its power to bring this about," said Mr. Laundry.

Booze in Bus?

Marquette—Arthur (Arch) Belmore, one of the proprietors of the Belmore taxi and bus line, was arraigned Saturday before Charles F. Button, United States commissioner, on a charge of transportation and possession of intoxicating liquor which, federal officers said, he was carrying in a school bus.

Federal agents stopped the bus Belmore was driving late Friday afternoon near Birch on the Big Bay road, and said that a few school children and a teacher, en route from Marquette, were in the bus at the time. The officers said they found two gallons of alleged moonshine whiskey in a satchel inside the bus.

Hospital Deficit

Marquette—While St. Luke's hospital had a decrease of 506 patients during 1931 as compared with 1930 and had a net operating loss of \$5,530, the board of trustees points out in its thirty-fourth annual report that there have been several developments which mark the year "as notable and outstanding in the growth and future usefulness of the institution."

The two notable achievements during 1931 were completion of the Northern Michigan Children's clinic, owned and operated by the Children's Fund of Michigan, and the bequest in the will of the late Margaret Wallace, of Marquette, of \$40,000 to St. Luke's hospital for construction and endowment of a new nurses' home.

Only House, Garage and Two Hogs Saved; No Insurance

Perronville, Mich., Mar. 14 (Special)—Fire of unknown origin destroyed every building but the garage and home on the John F. Gucky farm here early this morning, causing a loss estimated at \$8,000. The loss is not covered by insurance.

In addition to the destruction of the stable, barn, granary, chicken coop, hog pen, tool and machine sheds, the loss caused by the fire included 20 head of cattle, two horses, 75 chickens, 20 tons of hay, 200 bushels of grain, all farm implements, and three automobiles. Two hogs were released from the pen, and were saved.

Mr. Gucky arose about 5 o'clock, and after starting a fire in the kitchen stove, he went outside and discovered smoke issuing from the barn. He hurried back into the house to awake the other members of the family, and when he returned to the outdoors he found all the buildings ablaze. About fifty neighbors formed a bucket brigade, but all they could do was to save the house and garage, which were about 75 feet from the burning barn.

Labor Has Been Paid \$35,722 Since November 1

From Nov. 1, 1931, to March 1, 1932, a total of \$35,722.35 in county and state funds was spent in Delta county for the relief of unemployed. This amount was spent for labor only and does not include the work now under contract on M-35 to Ford River and the Ford River bridge. The state money spent in this county totalled \$23,781.85, and the county \$11,940.50.

A total of 48 men are employed by the Bacco Construction company, contractors for the M-35 grading job from Escanaba to Ford River and the bridge job at South Ford River. Two piers and one abutment have been completed on the bridge, and a shovel has been put to work excavating for the grade. Ten men are at work on clearing and grubbing for the new M-35 right-of-way, and more are to be added later as the job progresses. The grading project is nearly six miles long. Crews are working on a split shift basis to give employment for more men.

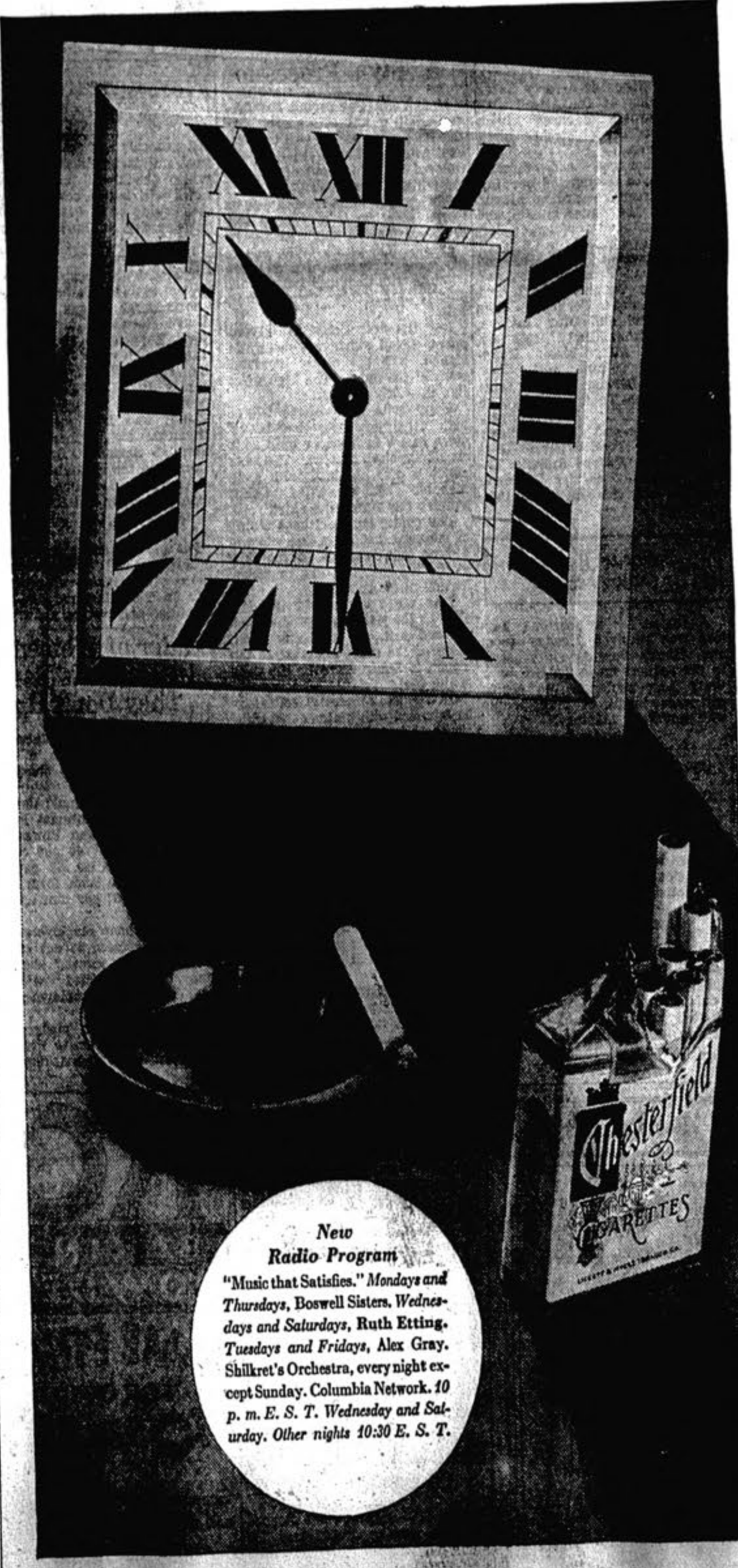

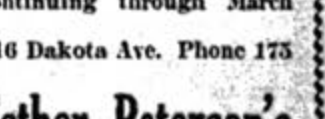
