STIMSON SAYS MEET SUCCESS

Disarms Conference Is Showing Results, He Tells Reporters

BY P. I. LIPSEY, JR. (Associated Press Staff Correspondent) Geneva, Switzerland, April 30 (AP)—Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson declared he was encouraged about the ultimate success of the disarmament conference in an interview tonight with a group of American journalists.

In addition to being well satisfied so far as the aims conference is concerned, Mr. Stimson said he was pleased with the discussions of other problems, particularly the far eastern conflict with the leaders of the great powers.

Gibson in Charge Except for the Sino-Japanese controversy, Colonel Stimson did not specify the other problems that he discussed here in private conversations. He characterized them only as matters in which the United States and other nations were mutually interested.

He expressed cordial approval about the prospect of renewal of personal conversations between representatives of the great powers in an effort to achieve results in disarmament. It is expected that Ambassador Hugh Gibson will be the American spokesman when those discussions are resumed within a fortnight or so.

TO LANDSCAPE AT JUNIOR HIGH
Shrubs, Evergreens and Elm Trees Will Be Planted

Landscaping of the junior high school grounds, following a plan drawn by Professor Gregg, landscape architect of Michigan State College, will be done this spring, the Escanaba board of education decided at its last meeting.

The cost of the project, exclusive of labor, will be \$196.07, this being the amount of the lowest bid for furnishing shrubs, evergreen and elm trees. The Pontiac Nursery of Romeo was the lowest of ten bidders.

The landscaping work will start as soon as the nursery shipment is received. Local labor will be employed under the supervision of Henry Wylie, Smith-Hughes agricultural instructor.

The board has also authorized the writing of specifications and the advertising for bids for the interior decoration of the Washington, Jefferson and Barr schools. Specifications for the re-roofing of the Franklin school will be drawn, and prices on the job will be asked later. Contractors who are interested in the projects are asked to get in touch with the superintendent's office, Telephone No. 468.

Voter Registration Starting Next Week

Under this law, Act 209 of the public acts of 1931, a voter need register only once, and this will become a permanent voting record, doing away with the necessity of re-registration every four years.

All qualified voters must re-register this year in order to vote at coming elections. Registration will continue through May, June, July and up to August 24, the last day for registering in order to vote at the primary in September.

Marinette Man Admits Murder

Marinette, Wis.—Fred "Gene" Payette, 55, held for the past five days in the Menominee county jail for investigation in the unsolved hammer murder of Alex Jatkowski, committed suicide by hanging in a shed at the rear of the Eugene Gagnon home, 208 Leonard street, Marinette, about 7:45 a. m., today.

Mr. Payette, arrested April 21 on a farm at Porterville, Wis., by sheriff's officers, was released by Sheriff Edward Reindl from the local jail at 3 p. m., yesterday after he had signed a waiver of extradition proceedings which would have made it possible for local officers to bring him back from Wisconsin for further investigation without extradition proceedings.

A second man held by Sheriff Reindl for investigation in the Jatkowski murder also was released yesterday after signing an extradition waiver.

Sheriff Reindl said investigation had disclosed that Mr. Payette and the other man released yesterday had been seen in the neighborhood of the crime the hour Mr. Jatkowski was beaten to death with a hammer by an unidentified person about 7:20 p. m., April 6, 1930, in his home at 14 Wanek avenue. Mrs. Jatkowski discovered her husband's body, the head battered in by repeated blows with a short-handled hammer, about 8 p. m.

Township Schools To Conduct Exams Next May 12 and 13

The regular state examination for seventh and eighth grade pupils of the township schools will be held May 12 and 13.

A special examination will be held a month later for the schools of Wells which has a ten months term and also for pupils who because of sickness or other sufficient reason were unable to take the regular examination.

Under rules governing examinations in previous years an average of 75 percent on all subjects and a minimum of 60 percent on any subject was required as the passing grade. The ruling for this year requires that the median score for the county be used as a basis for promotion, but the quality of work done during the year and the result of the examination will be important factors in determining the personal fitness of each pupil for high school work.

During the winter the carcasses of several fawns were found in the swamps, their condition indicating they were killed by wolves. About a month ago, De Grande reported to the sheriff and police departments that a calf had been killed by predatory animals, and a week ago a horse was chased and bitten. Friday a cow was pulled down and wounded, and Mr. De Grande set a trap baited for the animals. He caught the Eskimo dog and shot it, and the local conservation officer is giving assistance in rounding up the other two killers.

Every Corner Should Serve Useful Purpose

SCREENING PORCHES PROVIDES COMFORT DURING SUMMER FLY-TIME

With Spring housecleaning at hand, the clean-up time in the air, Escanaba householders are finding many places around their homes, lawns and gardens where a small expenditure of time and money will bring big dividends in added convenience, comfort and civic pride.

The modern idea about home grounds is that every square foot

Screen moulding can be purchased from any lumber dealer. It comes in standard sizes, rabbeted and ready to cut. A good quality of galvanized screen wire can be bought for four cents a square foot, and black screening for three cents a square foot. Copper-bronze screening costs about twice as much as other kinds, but is cheaper in the long run because of its durability.

Standard moulding ranges around two cents a foot.

Of course, the job is not a heavy one for the head of the house or the young son to tackle and two Saturday afternoons should see the job completed, provided the porch is of average size.

Small Shelf Makes Dark Corner Bright

A successful corner treatment may be worked out with the use of a small corner shelf. A few books, pieces of choice pottery and perhaps a figurine may give life, color and animation to an otherwise dull and uninteresting corner of the living room.

A corner in the kitchen may be utilized by a corner shelf painted to match the kitchen woodwork. It can hold the cookbooks and perhaps a small clock.

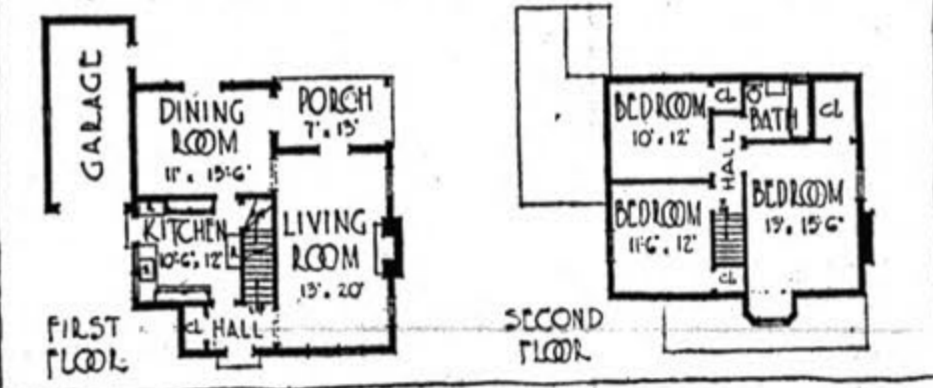

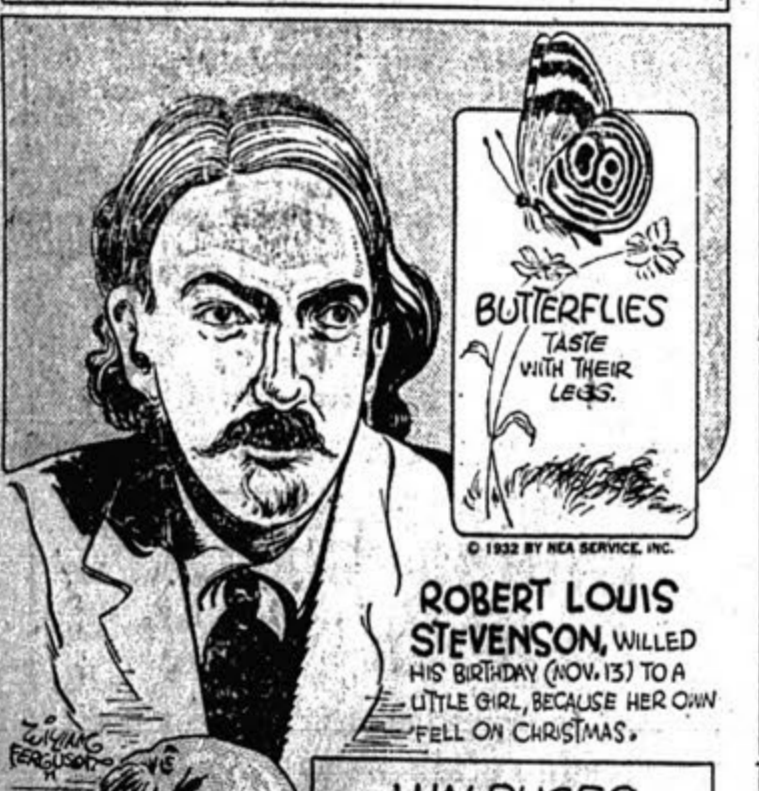

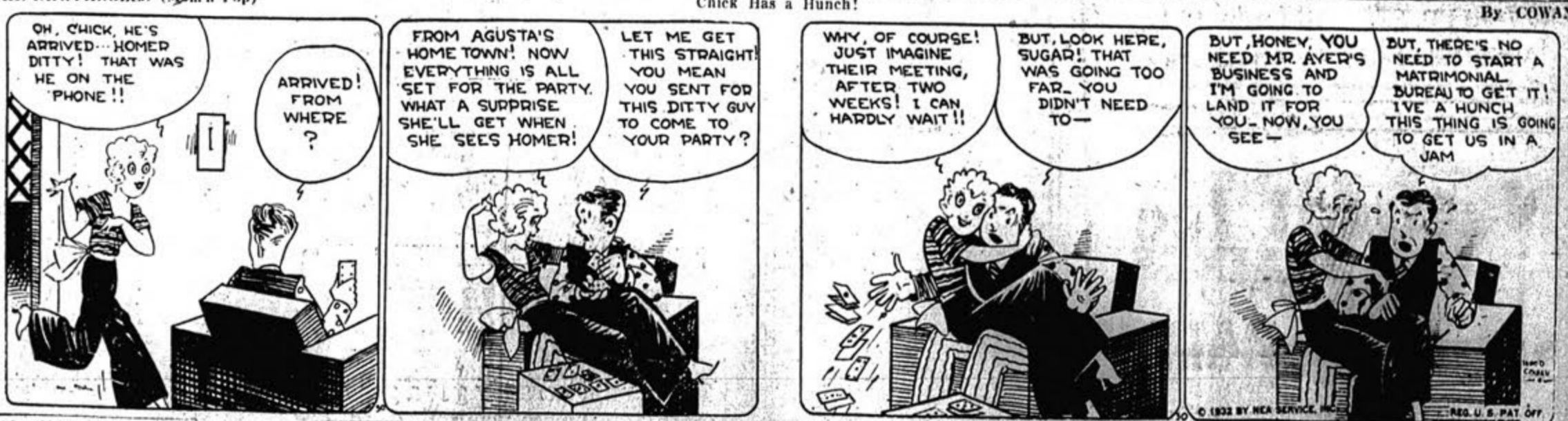
