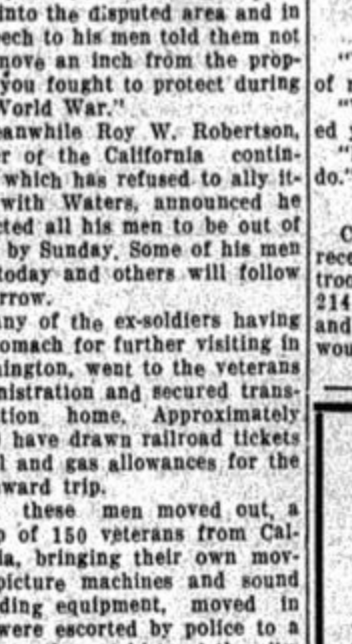

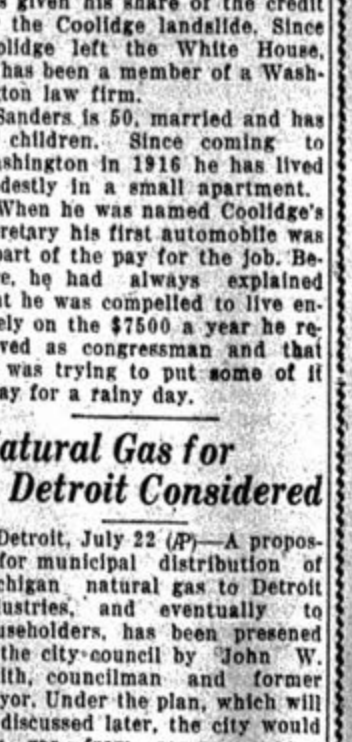

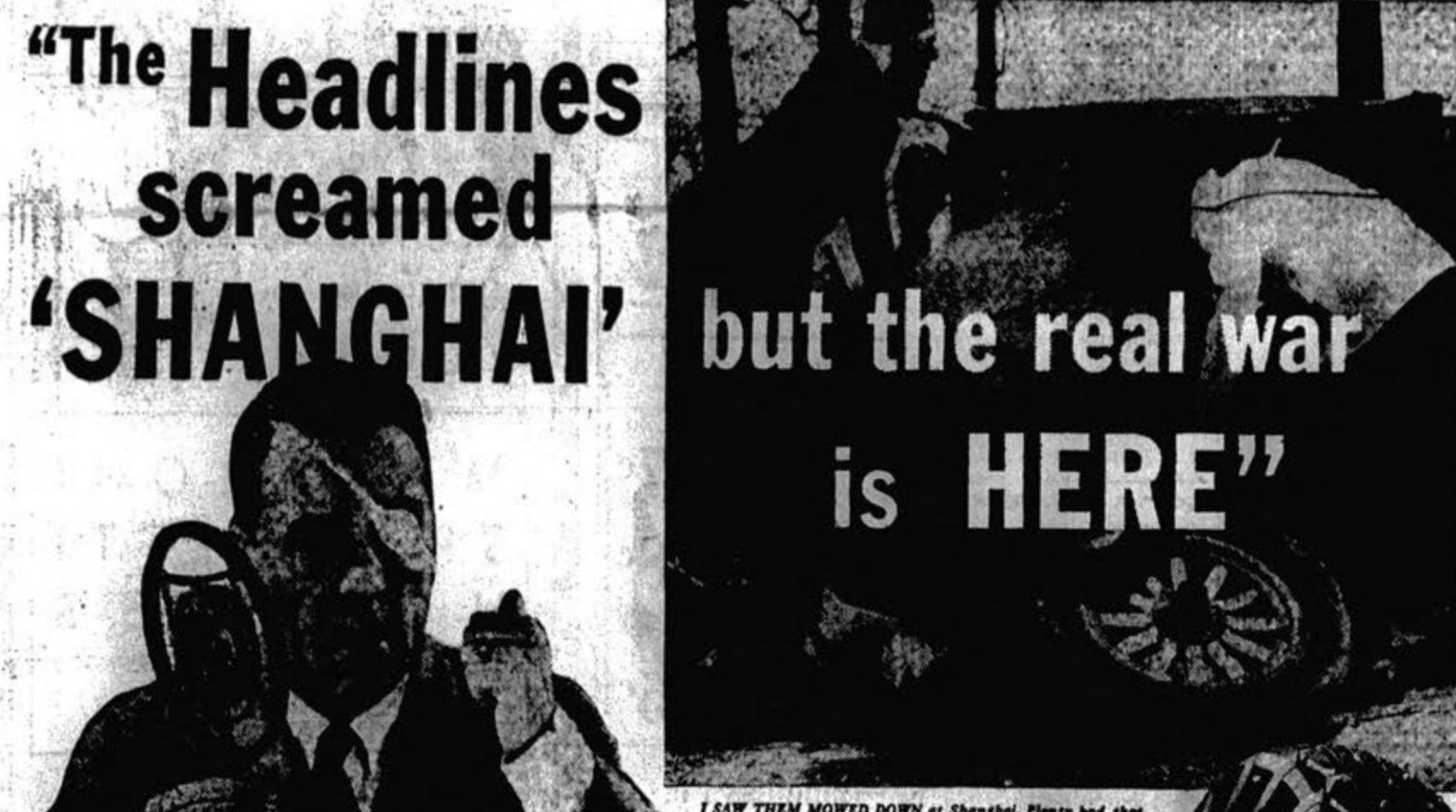
So it was necessary to rent the laboratory equipment from wholesale dealers in undertaking supplies, thereby assuring the authenticity of the scenes.
