





### RULES OF WOOD LOT ANNOUNCED

#### Cutting of Stumpage at Danforth Will Start Friday

Announcement was made yesterday by the Escanaba city council of the regulations which will govern the operation of the woodlot, which has been established in the Danforth community.

The stumpage on two forty-acre lots was recently purchased by the city from the J. Stephenson company and the Cleveland Cliffs iron company. The rules announced by the city council are as follows:

"Any of the unemployed of the city of Escanaba who are married may go to the city hall and get a card showing them they are entitled to ten cords of wood which card they will present to the city foreman on the wood-lot ground. He will show them where to cut and they will cut as directed by him.

"Each man will cut sufficient wood to take care of the wood to which he is entitled and to cut and make such wood as directed by the foreman.

"Each man is asked to pile the brush left from the timber cut by

him and not unnecessarily brush up the surrounding timber.

"The Escanaba city council respectively requests that all of the unemployed avail themselves of this opportunity of supplying themselves with wood for the coming winter and to cut same as soon as possible so it can be brought in while the roads are dry, also so it can be cut up and split so it will be dry for the coming winter.

"The council feels that any able-bodied man who will not help himself to this extent should not later be furnished with fuel at the expense of the public."

The wood-lot will be ready for cutting Friday morning of this week.

### Funds for Forest Roads Total \$35,000

Road allotments totaling \$156,000 were apportioned this week to the national forests and purchase units of the three lake states of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. It was announced Tuesday by the forest service office in Milwaukee.

The sum of \$17,500 was set aside for the Paint Lake road in the Ottawa national forest of Gogebble, Houghton, Ontonagon and Iron counties. The state of Michigan matches this money with an equal amount, so that the total expenditure will be \$35,000.

The mother of Roy Chapin who has many friends here has not been in the best of health and

has been spending her winters in Florida. Their old home was in Lansing where Roy Chapin was born. Roy Chapin owns an island, or part of one, near Sault, off the coast of Georgia, where his father's friend, Howard Coffin, has a great estate. President Coolidge spent some time with Mr. Coffin and Mr. Chapin down there a little while ago. President and Mrs. Hoover are also intimate friends. Roy Chapin has a background in every way and his life has justified it. It is highly creditable to President Hoover that his selections run along lines of such men.

### KIWANIS MEET HERE IN 1933

#### Escanaba Noses Out Sheboygan in Race for Convention

Milwaukee, Aug. 10 (AP)—Alexander Wiley of Chippewa Falls was elected district governor and Escanaba was chosen as the 1933 convention city at the closing session of the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan district convention of Kiwanis clubs. Wiley succeeds William F. Faulkes of Madison, I. D. Wright of Ironwood, Mich., was named lieutenant governor for the northern division.

Escanaba was awarded the 1933 convention of the Wisconsin-Northern Michigan district of Kiwanis International, which was held this year in Madison, Wis.

Escanaba was selected on the third ballot, a tie with Sheboygan on the first two ballots. Ray Perrin and Harold P. Lindsay presented Escanaba's invitation to the convention.

About one thousand delegates were registered at the Madison meeting, and it is expected almost that number will come here next year. Speakers of national reputation appeared on the program.

Captain and Mrs. E. A. Green of Retell, Wash., believe they are never too old to travel and see the country.

At the age of 90, they are touring by automobile, and have already put in four months of the two years they expect to spend in visiting all parts of the United States.

They spent the night at the home of Mrs. Myrtle Graham, 1910 First Avenue south, and departed yesterday morning for St. Ignace. From there they will travel through Ontario, Niagara Falls, New York, Massachusetts, Atlantic coast states, and will spend the winter in Florida. Next spring, they will start out for a tour of the southern states, and then will come north of a sight-seeing trip through western Canada before returning to Washington.

Mr. Green, a native of Lapeer, Mich., served in the Civil War, and only six years ago retired from his duties as captain of a sea-going boat. As a sailor, he has visited virtually every port in the world.

Mr. and Mrs. Green carry camping equipment, and when

ever they are fatigued or night-fall finds them some distance from lodging accommodations, they merely pitch up their tent.

"He does all the cooking," Mrs. Green said.

### No Split Ballots In Primary; Voter Must "Go Straight"

Delta county voters will be required to state their party preferences at the Sept. 13 primary election before they will be given a ballot. This is due to the fact that the Democratic party has a county ticket in the field, and the primary voting will not be on the Republican ticket, as it has in the past. Democrats have entered county nominees in the past, but this is the first time they have had opposition for offices within the party.

Electors at the primaries cannot vote for candidates on both the Republican and Democratic tickets. They must call for the ticket of their choice and vote a "straight" ticket for all the offices in which their party has a nominee. In this way they will be prevented from jumping over to another party to vote for a friend on another ticket. There will be no "split" ballots in the primaries, and Delta county voters will either be Republicans or Democrats.

### Dragging Destroys Grasshopper Eggs

While millions of grasshoppers have been killed by poisoning, and probably like number have died because of the parasites and diseases which attack the hoppers, there still are plenty of them that will lay a sufficient number of eggs to produce a bumper crop of them again next year.

An effective means of controlling these pests on some fields is to wait until the middle of September and drag and plow all old sod lands, thus either destroying or burying the eggs. Even sod lands having stumps can be dragged in and around the stumps, and although it means harder work, will remove the possibility of grasshoppers hatching out over most of the field.

Another good thing about this system of control is that by breaking up much of the old sod land and re-seeding, preferably to alfalfa, much larger yields of hay and pasture will be secured.

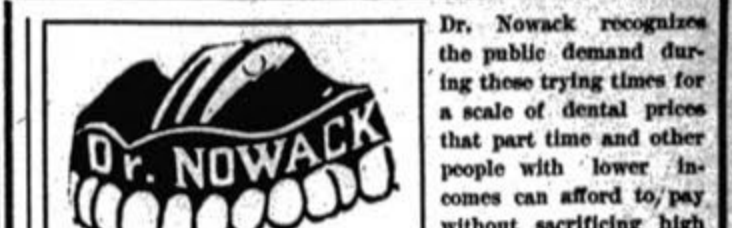
### Druggists Of U. P. To Meet In Iron Mt.

## JOBBER SEEK RAIL RATE CUT

### Claim High Costs Peril Fruit and Vegetable Industry

A demand that the railroads reduce freight rates at least 25 percent, which it is maintained is necessary for the existence of the fresh fruit and vegetable industry and also will benefit the carriers themselves, was voiced in a resolution adopted by the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Fruit Jobbers' association at their last meeting in Tomahawk, Wis., Saturday.

Tom J. Lynott, Escanaba, president of the association, stated that the campaign for lower transportation rates will be carried on throughout the country. The next meeting will be held in Escanaba, Sept. 17, he said.

The text of the resolution follows:

"Whereas, the fresh fruit and vegetable industry as a whole has been battling depression for the past decade and long before the general business depression struck the country and the world in 1929; and

"Whereas, this depression is now affecting the fresh fruit and vegetable industry to a degree as great or greater than any other industry, with low and unremunerative prices to the growers, shippers and receivers alike; and

"Whereas, the fresh fruit and vegetable industry in the seemingly vain belief that general business conditions would improve has con-

tinued to ship its products during 1931 in almost as heavy rail volume as in 1929, 1930, and 1931; and

"Whereas, the transportation charges paid to the rail carriers on these fresh fruit and vegetable shipments in most cases exceed the prices paid to the growers and or shippers thereon, and in many cases are as high as 200 percent of these prices, depending on the length of the haul;

"Therefore, the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Fruit Jobbers' Association in regular meeting assembled at Tomahawk, Wis., on Saturday, July 9, 1932, in the belief that this condition cannot continue, and that in order for the fresh fruit and vegetable industry to survive in its present structure, suggests to the rail carriers of the country that the transportation charges on all fresh fruit and vegetable products be immediately reduced by at least 25 percent.

"This suggestion is actuated by the belief that unless such a reduction is made it will be impossible for the producing sections which are located at great distances from the consuming markets to compete with (because of the reduced consumer purchasing power) products grown closer to such markets or with products either canned or otherwise preserved.

"Also, that with a greater demand for locally grown or canned fruits and vegetables such local production and canning will be stimulated to the extent that the demand for fresh fruits and vegetables from distant producing sections will fall away with the result that with but a few exceptions long distance rail hauls of fresh fruits and vegetables will disappear entirely, to the great detriment of the rail carriers and bring about the complete disruption of the present day fresh fruit and vegetable mar-

keting and distributing structure and disaster to the growers of fresh fruits and vegetables whose markets are located at great distances from the producing sections; therefore:

"Be It Resolved, that the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Fruit Jobbers' Association call upon the rail carriers of the country to at once reduce by at least 25 percent the transportation rates on fresh fruit and vegetable shipments from all producing sections; and

"Be It Further Resolved, that this resolution be placed before the governors of the states of Wisconsin and Michigan, the American Railway Association, the presidents of the railroads operating in Wisconsin and Upper Michigan, the Westches Valley Traffic Association, the Yakima Valley Traffic and Credit Association, the Western Growers and Shipper Protective Association, the Growers and Ship-

pers League of Florida, the American Fruit and Vegetable Shippers Association, the Western Fruit Jobbers Association, the International Apple Shippers Association, the United States Department of Agriculture, the Department of Agriculture and Markets of Wisconsin, and that copies hereof be sent to the different trade publications and to the press throughout Wisconsin and Upper Michigan."
